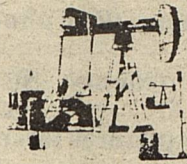

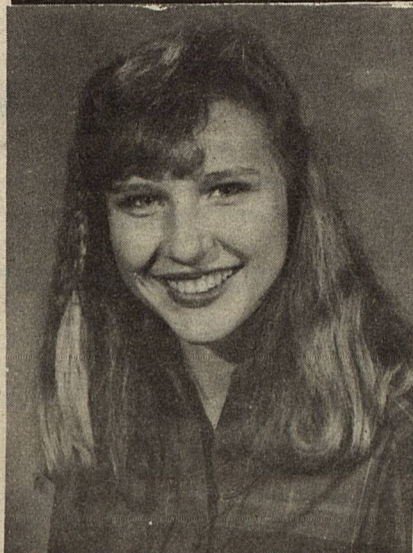

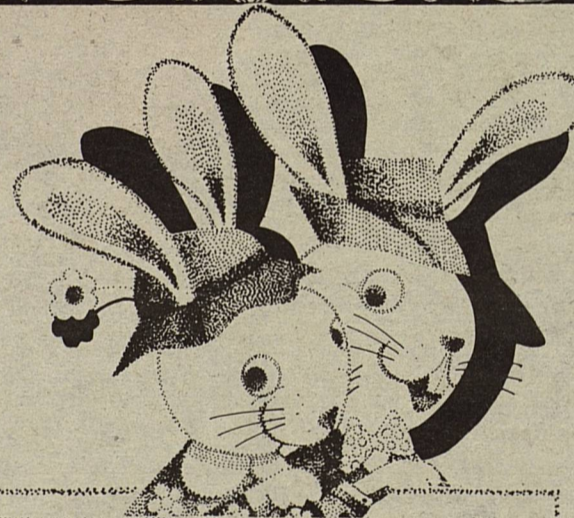
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History Of State Capitol Reviewed By Librarian

Latrell McDonnell, Yoakum County Librarian, presented a program on the celebration of the State Capitol, May 5-8, at Austin for the GFWC Tsa Mo Ga Study Club.

Mrs. McDonnell attended the Centennial celebration with her family. Her daughter, Pam, was a member of the Preservation Board and provided material and history to her mother to return to the Library for safekeeping.

A parade began on Congress Avenue May 7 and official ceremonies began at noon the following Saturday. Speeches by state officials, dedication of National Historic Landmark Plaque and presentation markers for the restoration of the Capitol Great Walk were presented during the week. Indian tents were set up on the Capitol grounds with full Indian dress and tribal dancing activities continued throughout the week of celebration.

The Capitol dome glowed with special Centennial commemorative lighting and the Goddess of Liberty was also an outstanding display, Mrs. McDonnell said.

The citizens of Austin celebrated from May 14-19, in celebration of the move into the new Capitol Building, designed from and resembling the National Capitol, differing with the Texas Capitol being several feet taller. The Capitol has 392 rooms, is 566 feet long, 308 feet high and is open to the public from 6 a.m. until 11 p.m. seven days a week. Transportation is furnished by State Department of Texas Highways from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. on a bus called "Dilly."

Mrs. McDonnell said that Austin became the location of the Capitol because of its beautiful hills and waters. The Capitol is located on one of the beautiful hills. The building is stately from the products of granite walls to cast iron columns. Granite from South Austin and granite from Burnet was used for the walls, and the cast iron columns were made by prisoners from the newly-founded state prison in Rusk.

A vote decided the location of the Capitol in 1872 with ballot voting tal-

lying Austin 64,000, Houston 35,000 and Waco 13,000.

When the Constitution was approved in 1876, it pledged to benefit education. Transportation and financing a new state capitol building was the most unusual provision. Texas gave up 50,000 acres at a price of 50 1/2 cents per acre for funds, with half being used for education. The land sold to an Englishman and is located in the Panhandle, consisting of 9 or 10 counties, well-known as the XIT Ranch.

A railroad was built from Austin to Burnet, down the Colorado River, to transport the granite for the Capitol Building, Texas pride being the large

reason for using Texas granite. The final cost paid to contractors for the Texas State Capitol was \$3,224,593.45 and in the end, XIT Ranch land was traded for \$1.07 per acre.

Senator Temple Houston praised builders for the greatest State Capitol in the United States. Bill Green, historian for the State Preservation Board, encourages all to visit and enjoy the beautiful State Heritage of ours, Mrs. McDonnell concluded.

Mrs. Ed Hunter, program leader, assisted in showing the film, "Our Granite Glory," Texas State Capitol 1988, concluding the program on Texas Heritage.

Mrs. Roy Lowrey read scripture and led the club in the Club Collect. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Billy Winn and Mrs. Macky McWhirter to 23 members.

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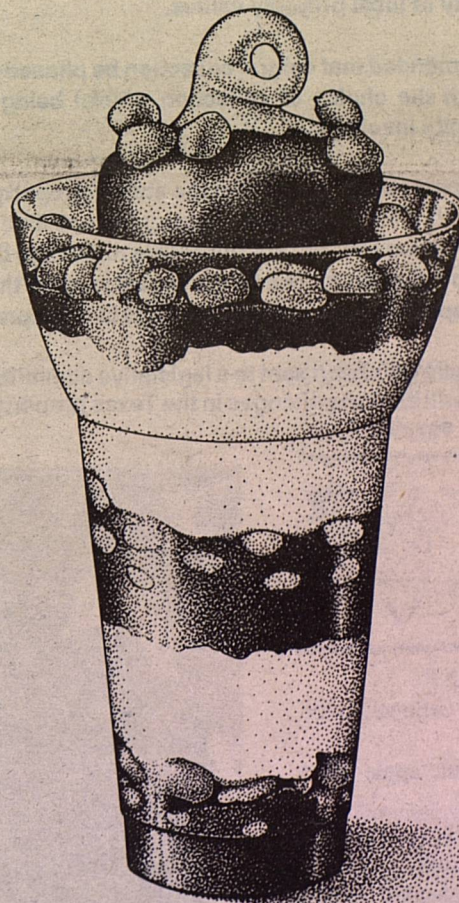

From The Superintendent's Desk

Recently, a Select Committee on Tax Equity met to formulate recommendations to present to the legislature. The committee concluded that Texas local governments needed revenue alternatives to the property tax which is the single most important revenue source for cities, counties and school districts. Their recommendations included an expanded sales tax base and a higher motor fuel tax to relieve some of the burden placed on local governments by the growing demands for more services. This solution would avoid an over-reliance on the property tax.

In the area of property taxes, the committee called for an exemption of business inventories not held for retail sales, changes in property tax abatement laws, a property sales disclosure system, and mandatory consolidation of property tax collections.

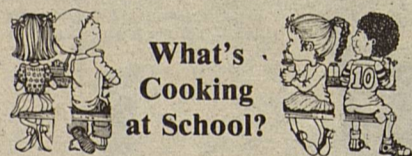
The law now provides for abatement, or relief, from ad valorem taxes on certain property for the purpose of encouraging development or redevelopment of the property. The committee supported a policy of allowing taxing units to grant abatements to companies undergoing major modernization or expansion, under certain conditions.

The availability of full sales information would help insure that property appraisals are as close to market value as possible and, consequently, improve the fairness and equity of local property values.

The committee recommended that central collection be phased-in over a period of five years with the choice of collection official being determined locally by all taxing units involved.

At this time, several proposed bills affecting the state's property tax system have been pre-filed with state legislators. Among the pre-filed bills, which would affect our local taxing system, are proposals to change the composition of the appraisal board of directors and a proposal to make the county tax assessor-collector responsible for all tax collections in an appraisal district.

Although these bills have only been sent to a legislative committee for study, it is evident that there will be some changes in the Texas property tax system during this legislative session.

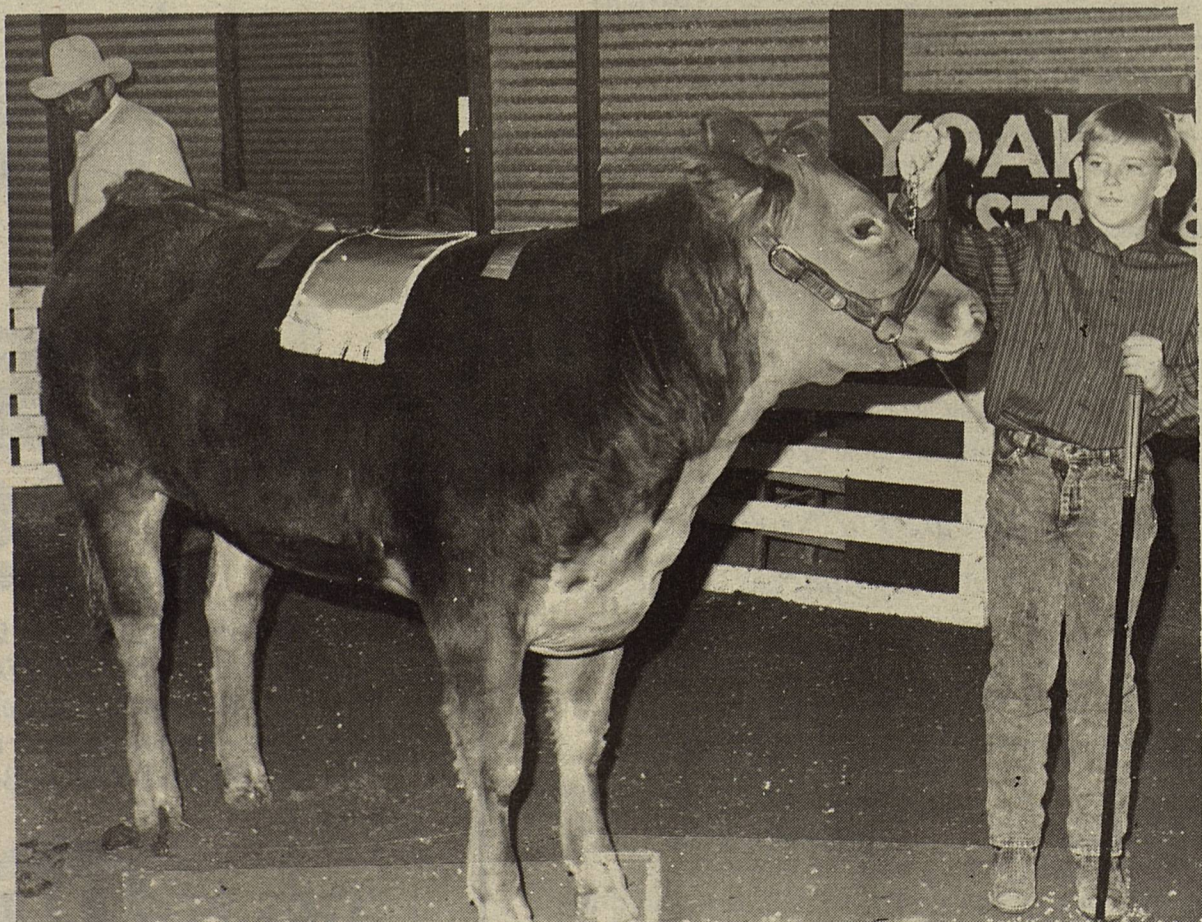

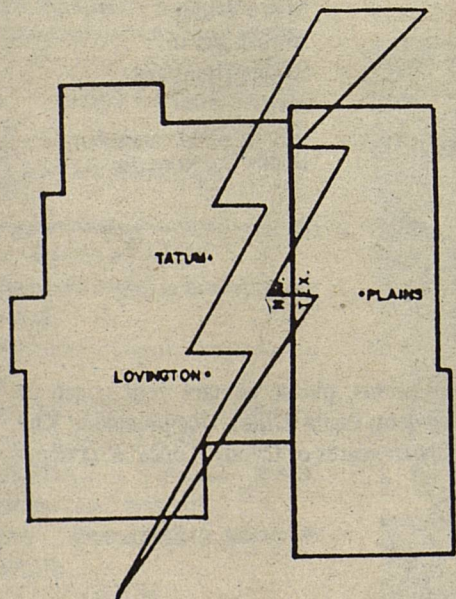
Residents Attend Poetry Meet

Held at Sul Ross College, the event was very well attended.



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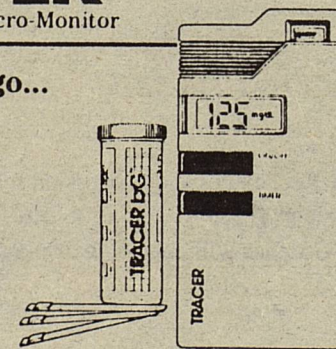

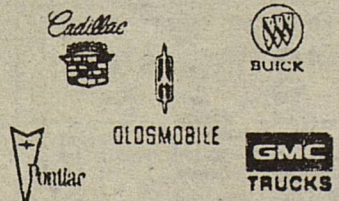
