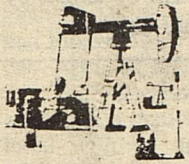

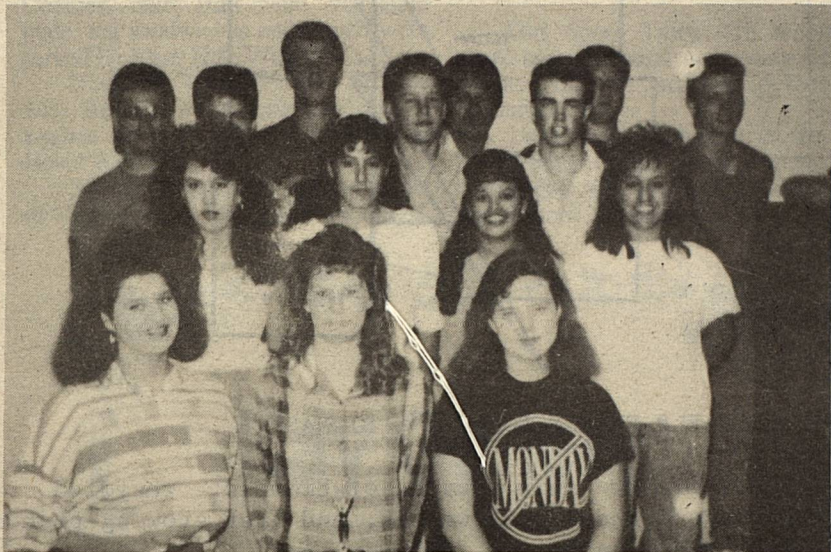

Third place went to Vee Ann Fitzgerald, Sterling Lovelace, Justin Stowe and Phillip Cowart.

Earlier in the year, Shane Lowrey wrote a research paper on Space Exploration which was chosen as one of the top five in the State. This qualified him to compete in National contest which will be held in June in Winston-Salem, N.C.

PISD Board Of Trustees Ok's Band Uniform Bid

Jerry Parrish and Eddie Earnest were administered the oath of office following the canvassing of the school board election results at Monday night's meeting of the school trustees.

Parrish unseated Jack Spears, garnering 125 votes to Spears' 114 for the Place IV seat. Eddie Earnest, Place V, was unopposed.

Re-organization of the board resulted in Melvin Lowrey being named president; Jack Palmer, vice president; and Eddie Earnest, secretary.

Board approved payment of election officials.

Band uniform bids which were submitted at the April 10 board meeting were reconsidered and the board agreed to accept the bid of \$29,523.82 submitted by Sol Frank Uniforms Inc.

Students approved for transfer into the Plains Independent School District were Sally Burrus, Clint Burrus, Patrick Elmore, Renee Garcia, Briana Garza, Kyle David Kight, Sterling Lovelace, Dusti Murae Meeks, Thomas W. Morcom, Timothy Mojica, Jim Mojica, Clemente Trevino and Becky Linee Wilmeth.

The 1989-90 Plains I.S.D. calendar was amended and board voted to contract with Region XVII Education Service Center for services for the next school year. Supt. Andrews was appointed as Plains' representative to the center's advisory committee.

Board adopted the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Plan as presented.

Trustees authorized Supt. Andrews to begin bidding procedures for roofing as specified with bid opening to be June 8 at 3 p.m. and action June 12.

Reports were given by the business manager, Wanda Ashburn, on general operating, cafeteria and tax areas. Larry Devitt presented a transportation cost report and a review of various projects.

Principals presented information about recent school activities and Mr. Alexander reported on the TEAMS test results.

Resignations of Jim Baldwin, Lorri Bristow and Jerry Stickrod were accepted as submitted.

Three PHS Students Win State In Literary Events In Austin

State UIL Academic contests were held Saturday May 6 in Austin with three Plains High School students competing. They were Chad Guetersloh, Lance Morrow and Layne Morrow.

Guetersloh won the state championship in Science with a score of 75. He also had the high score on the chemistry portion of the science test, a 50. Macky McWhirter was presented with a plaque for being the sponsor of the Class A state champion.

In Number Sense, Lance Morrow placed second in state with a score of 337. The team consisted of Lance, Chad and Layne and they won the state championship with a combined score of 1020. The Number Sense students are sponsored by Richie Cullins.

In Calculator, Lance Morrow won the state championship with a score of 326 and Guetersloh placed third in state with a score of 299. The Calculator team which consists of Lance, Chad and Layne won the state champi-

onship with a combined score of 879. Eric Banfield was presented a plaque for being sponsor of the Class A state champion.

School, City Election Results

Voters went to the polls here Saturday to choose two school board members and three councilmen.

Incumbent Jim Warren led in amount of votes with a total of 143, with incumbent Hershel Smith and newcomer Kerry Rust each receiving 96 votes. Kent Welch had 95 votes and Amos Shifflett had 32. A total of 165 votes were cast in the city election.

In the school board election, Jerry Parrish won over Jack Spears for Place IV, while unopposed Eddie Earnest was returned to his position on the board in Place V. Parrish received 125 votes, Spears, 114 and Earnest, 205.

Drug Related Seizures Often Aids County Coffers

Criminal District Attorney Linda Lowrey reports that individuals arrested and charged with drug offenses stand to lose more than their liberty.

Since June 19, 1988, Department of Public Safety Troopers McClure and Crawford have seized a 1983 Harley Davidson motorcycle and \$5,600 in cash. On Sept. 19, 1998, as part of the county's largest drug raid, five vehicles were seized by the Yoakum County Sheriff's Department.

Following hearings in District Court, all seized items were forfeited to Yoakum County. The vehicles and motorcycle will be sold with the proceeds joining the \$5,600 in cash in a special fund administered by the County Commissioners' Court.

Ms. Lowrey further reports that when a vehicle is seized, a civil suit is filed in District Court. Notice of the suit is then sent to the vehicle's owner and any lienholder. The State must prove that it is more probable than not that the vehicle was used to aid in controlled substance transactions. The five cars were seized after the owners sold a controlled substance from the vehicles. With money, the State must prove that it is more probable than not that the money was derived from controlled substance transactions. This burden of proof was satisfied in all of the forfeiture proceedings.

The prior owners of the \$5,600 and the motorcycle are currently in jail awaiting transfer to Texas Department of Corrections. The prior owners of the five vehicles seized in the drug raid are defendants on the May 22 felony docket.

The items seized by the troopers could have been forfeited to DPS, but the troopers chose to have the proceeds go to Yoakum County in order to help offset the cost of the undercover operation conducted here in 1988. Three of the defendants who were charged with selling dope to undercover agent are serving prison sentences following their pleas of guilty.

Commissioners' Court

Commissioners of Yoakum County met in regular session May 8 at 10 a.m.

Bids on a self-propelled broom for Precinct 4 were opened, with only one bid being submitted, which was accepted. It was from Bee Equipment Sales Inc. in the amount of \$15,000 trade difference.

Proposals for Public Officials and Employees Liability Insurance coverage were opened for study, with Texas Association of Counties submitting a bid. Action will be taken at a later date.

Extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment, including hospital bills in the amount of \$93,401.09.

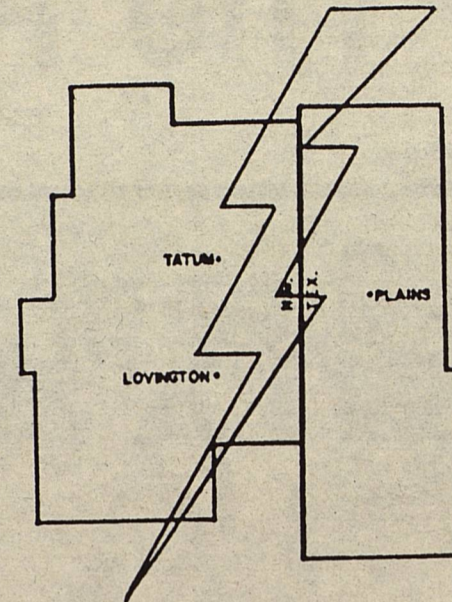
Literary Workshop Slated May 19-20

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NOTICE AFFORDING THE OPPORTUNITY FOR A PUBLIC HEARING

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is presently planning the extension of FM 2196 in northeast Yoakum County, westward over an existing County pavement from the intersection of FM 1780 to the intersection of SH 214.

The proposed project is approximately 12 miles long and consists of reconstructing the present 18 feet of County pavement into 30 feet of asphalt surface with 24 feet of travel lane and 3 feet of paved shoulders. Presently Yoakum County has 80 feet of right of way and an additional 20 feet of right of way will be required along the south side only.

Although additional right of way will be required, no houses or businesses will be displaced. Information concerning benefits and services which may be available to affected property owners as well as information about the tentative schedule for right of way acquisition and construction can be obtained from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation office in Brownfield.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and design, environmental studies and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection at the office of the resident engineer at 800 West Webb Street in Brownfield, Texas, and with the office of the Yoakum County Judge in Plains.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for the highway project by delivering a written request to the resident engineer's office at 800 West Webb, in Brownfield on or before June 12, 1989.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be published about the date and location of the hearing. Verbal or written comments may be presented either at the hearing or submitted within 10 days after the hearing to the resident engineer's office, P.O. Box 1147, Brownfield, Texas 79316-1147.

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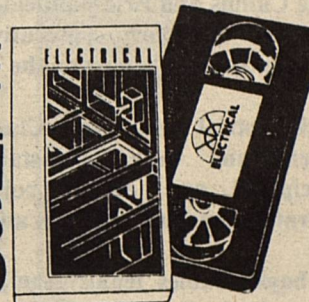

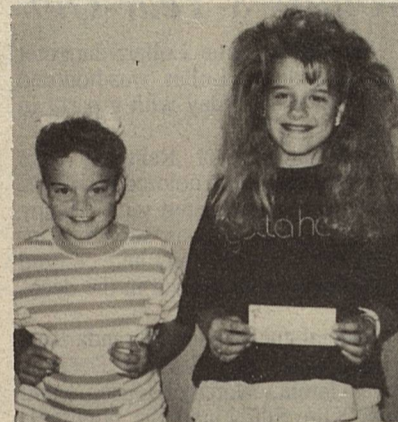

Order forms must be turned in before May 19.



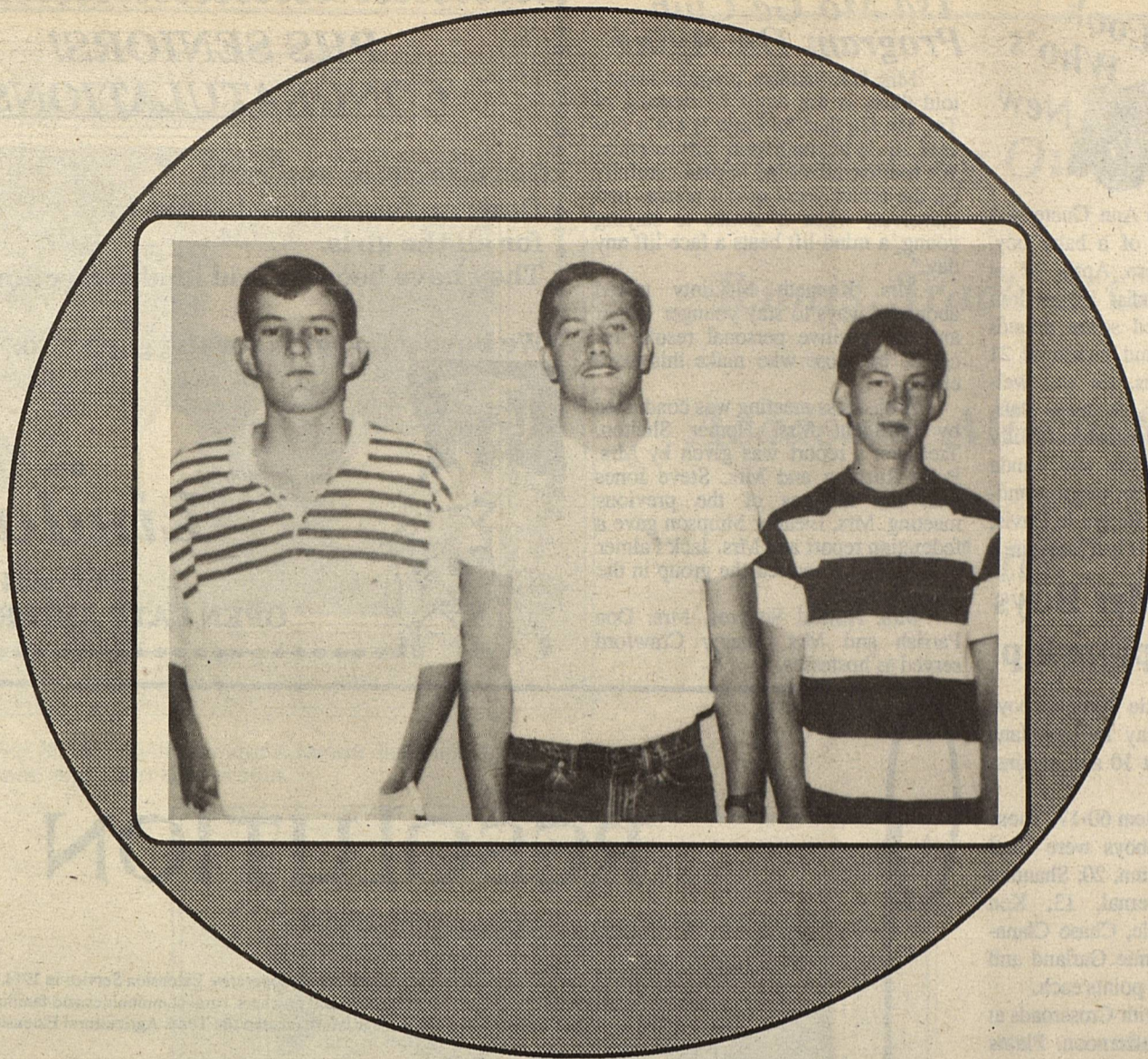

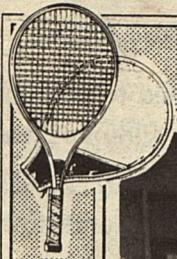

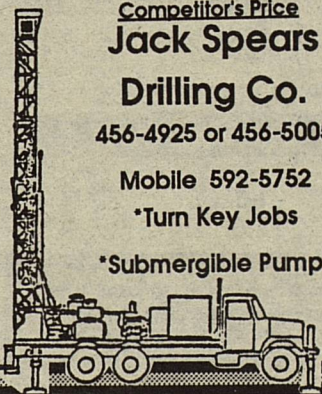
