



1989 Young Farmer Award Presented To Don Parrish

Don Parrish was awarded the 1989 Outstanding Young Farmer Award by Yoakum County Young Farmers during the annual Agricultural Tour Wednesday.

The honoree and his wife, Sue Ann, farm irrigated and dryland cotton, grain sorghum and wheat. President of Yoakum County Marketing Club, Parrish also runs stocker cattle. He is involved in numerous educational programs in the field of agriculture.

More than 40 Yoakum County agriculturalists and Plains High School ag students attended the tour which also saw recognition paid to result demonstration cooperators who conducted research based practical application of the latest in agricultural technology and charter members of Yoakum County Marketing Club.

Cooperators included Chuck Dorminey, Eddie Earnest, Dell Knight, Wayne House, Tim Addison, Hoss and Lavern Newsom, N.S. Clanahan, Larry Morrow and Kenneth McGinty. Charter members of the Marketing Club are Parrish, Addison, Ron Craft, Rickey Bearden, Marvin Dearing, Ace Hamm, Gary Jackson, Brad Palmer, Jim Risley and Tracy Welch.

First stop on the tour was the Royce Randall farm where ostriches and other exotic livestock are raised. The ostrich industry is a thriving new industry in the U.S., offering diversification for farmers and ranchers.

Next, the group heard Larry Morrow comment on peanut production with special emphasis on new varietal developments better suited to the High Plains' short growing season. On the Wayne House farm on the state line, Puss Perkins of BASF described benefits and best application of Pix plant growth regulator.

Dr. James Supak, TAEX cotton agronomist, discussed harvest management for quickness of the 1989 crop. Next stop was the Brad Palmer farm where bell peppers are nearing harvest. He discussed production practices such as windbreaks and irrigation timing.

Traveling southward down the state line, the group viewed pima cotton production on the Kent Hilburn farm. Dr. Supak discussed differences in upland cotton (species *Hirsutum*) and Pima cotton (species *Barbadense*). Dr. Jim Leser described different in-


sect management practices needed for the "Old World Cotton".

Next stop was to view equipment and discuss applicability of conservation tillage in the area with the Jim Risley farm providing an assortment of "row-till" type implements and some excellent cotton under this management program.

Final tour stop was the Chuck Dorminey Ranch for demonstration plots showing the effectiveness of chemical weed and brush control on rangeland. Due to lack of moisture, the plots show a limited response at this time and may be included in the 1990 tour to better evaluate the practice.

Edwin Livengood discussed the upcoming underground water conservation district election and asked for support of the effort. Plains State Bank and Yoakum County State Bank sponsored a barbecue lunch catered by Big John's of Big Spring.

Transportation was provided by Plains ISD with superintendent Dean Andrews and ag science instructor Joe Pierce serving as drivers.

Community Education Classes Offered At Plains Schools

Community Education Classes are once again being offered to adults and children in the Plains Independent School District although attendance is not limited to residents of the district.

Fees and minimum attendance must be met the first night of class or courses will be cancelled. Class fees have been assigned according to the cost of the instructor for a minimum enrollment. Most courses will require a minimum of 10 participants in order for the class to be offered.

Smoking will not be allowed in the building.

Persons may enroll in all classes by mail or by calling Mary Pettigrew or Arlon Alexander at 456-7490 or 456-7445. Senior citizen discounts are no longer honored.

Woodworking will be a 10 weeks course beginning Sept. 26 in the high school shop. Hours are 6 to 9 p.m. with a fee of \$15. A minimum of 15 students is required.

Micro-softworks will meet in the high school computer lab. Classes will continue for eight weeks, beginning Sept. 26. Fee is \$20 with the course to be taught from 6 to 8 p.m. Only 12 persons may enroll.

High school home economics room will be the location for a Beginning Clothing course. To begin Sept. 26, classes will be from 6 to 9 p.m. and continue eight weeks. Fee is \$20.

Low Impact Aerobics will be offered for eight weeks with classes from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m. Monday and Wednesday. Beginning Sept. 25, fee is \$20.

A minimum of eight weeks and maximum of 12 is the Oil Painting Course. Beginning Oct. 5 it will be taught from 6 to 9 p.m. Thursdays for a fee of \$32.

Persons interested in Machine Monogramming (freehand) may attend a three weeks class in the home economics room of PHS. Beginning Oct. 10, it will be held Tuesdays from 7 to 9 p.m. Fee is \$10.

Calligraphy will be taught in a three weeks course. Classes will be from 6 to 8 p.m. Mondays with a fee of \$10.

Welding will be offered beginning Oct. 2. Classes will be 6 to 8 p.m. Mondays with a fee of \$20. The course will be four weeks.

Seagraves scored again on a 37 yard run by Anderson on the first play of the fourth quarter. The PAT was good.

Henry Gonzales scored one a two yard run which was set up by a 36 yard pass from Pierce to Booth. The PAT by Garland was good.

Anderson scored the final TD of the game on a six yard run. The PAT was good and the final score was Seagraves 28, Plains 14.

The Cowboys had 15 first downs, 47 yards rushing and 186 yards passing.

The leading tackles for the Cowboys were Rodney Garland, Chris Gayle and Tony Yeager.


DECLARING CANDIDACY FOR THE SANDY LAND UNDERGROUND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT



To The Citizens of Plains:

Federal legislation and regulation to improve the environment has had a tremendous impact on Plains and Denver City. The Cities' largest environment problems, the treatment of sewage and the disposal of solid waste, will cost the Yoakum County citizens more in the 1990s than energy. Neither Plains or Denver City landfills will meet the new EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) regulations.

The Texas Department of Health projected that eighty percent of the landfills in this 14 county area will be closed by May, 1991. Some small cities cannot afford to maintain a landfill operation under these new regulations. These cities will have to contract with private firms who are quoting prices of \$35.00 per household, or contract with other cities. The City of Plains and Denver City Councils and County Judge and Commissioners are discussing the possibility of entering into a joint agreement for an area landfill. As information and plans progress we will try to keep you informed.

If a joint agreement could be reached and there is one landfill for all Yoakum County we feel that we would keep the charge to our household customers much below the prices that would be charged by private firms.

The City has a letter from the Texas Department of Health listing all the new regulations, if you are interested in reading them or obtaining other information, please come by City Hall.

AVOID POWER LINE CONTACTS!

SAFE STEPS - Ladders

When a metal ladder contacts the service line that carries electricity from the main power line to a residence, a weekend chore may turn into a fatal shock. No service is ever "safe" to touch because it is made up of an insulated or sheathed cable. Never use a service entrance or cable as a prop for any household tools or equipment.

WATCH YOUR STEPLADDER!

1. It is best to use a non-conductive ladder made of fiberglass or dry wood when working near power lines.
2. Always carefully check the location of all power and service lines when using a ladder. Note especially where the service is connected to the house.
3. Never place a ladder in a position where it could slide or slip into a service or power line. Never use any part of a service as a brace for the ladder or as a handhold near one.
4. When moving with a ladder, carry it in a horizontal position to avoid accidental contact.

It will soon be time to light your gas heaters for the winter months. The City will check for gas leaks for you before you do this. Call 456-2288 for this service.

Did you know that the distinctive odor of natural gas is put there by the City as a safety measure? Natural gas has no odor when it comes from the ground, so the City adds the odor before it delivers the gas to you.

So, if you should ever smell gas, go next door or across the street to call the City. Do not do anything that might cause an electrical spark. The City will send an employee to locate the source of the odor. Do your part by calling the City whenever you smell gas.

ORDINANCE 98

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE MAXIMUM RATE OF SPEED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES; ALLOWING FOR SPEED ZONES; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of PLAINS, Texas, upon the basis of engineering and traffic investigation, find it necessary to establish maximum speed limits, and create speed zones in certain areas all within the Corporate Limits of the City of PLAINS, Texas.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of PLAINS, Texas, also finds it is necessary to immediate preservation of the public health and safety to provide for the immediate enactment of such measures, constituting an emergency;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Subsection (A). Speed restrictions. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway or highway in the City Limits of the City of PLAINS, Texas, at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions then existing, having regard to the actual and potential hazards when approaching and crossing an intersection or a railway grade crossing, when approaching and going around a curve, when approaching a hill crest, when travelling upon any narrow or winding roadway, or when special hazards exist with respect to pedestrians or other traffic or by reason of weather or highway conditions; and in every event, speed shall be so controlled as may be necessary to avoid colliding with any person, vehicle or other conveyance on or entering the highway in compliance with legal requirements and the duty of all persons to use due care.

Subsection (B). Where no special hazard exists that requires lower speed for compliance with Subsection 1 (A) of this Section, the speed of any vehicle not in excess of the limits specified in this Subsection or established as hereinafter authorized shall be lawful, but any speed in excess of the limits specified in this Subsection or established as hereinafter authorized shall be prima facie evidence that the speed is not reasonable or prudent and that it is unlawful:

The speed zones established by this Ordinance shall include all of S.H. 214 within the Corporate Limits of the City of PLAINS; the maximum legal speed shall be as follows:

Beginning at the North City Limit, the maximum legal speed for both northbound and southbound traffic shall be 55 MPH for a distance of 0.678 mile to the intersection with Moreland Street extending to the west; thence 45 MPH for a distance of 0.318 mile to the intersection with the South City Limit.

And all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than Ten (\$10.00) nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

SECTION 3. That the hazards and dangers to public health and safety create a necessity requiring all rules providing that no Ordinance shall be finally passed on the day of its introduction be suspended; and this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure, to take effect from and after the date of its first publication


