

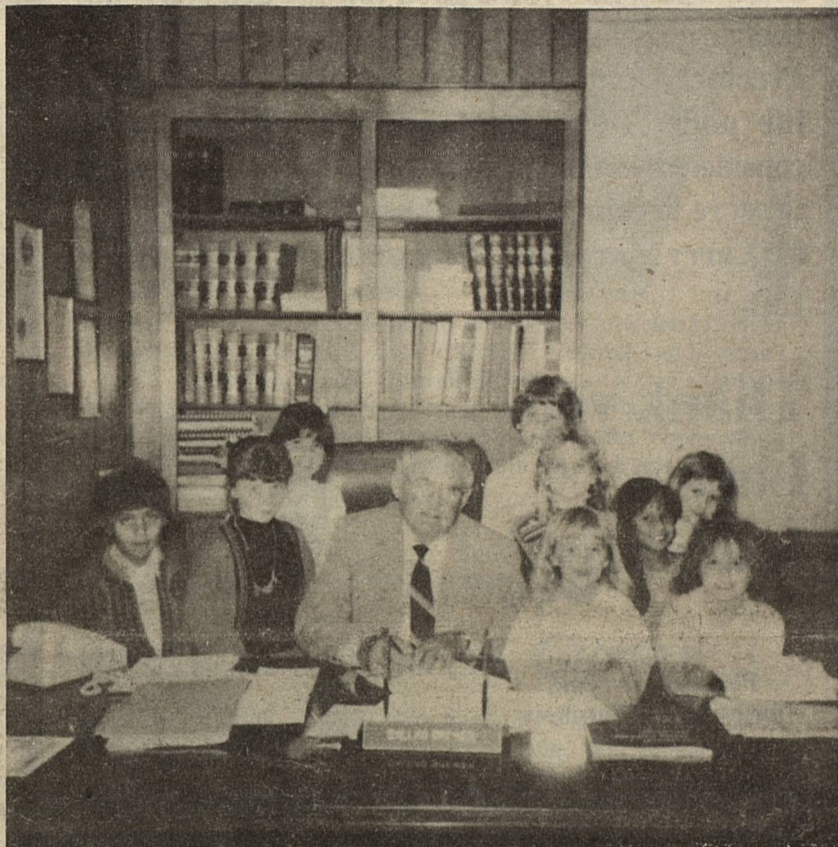

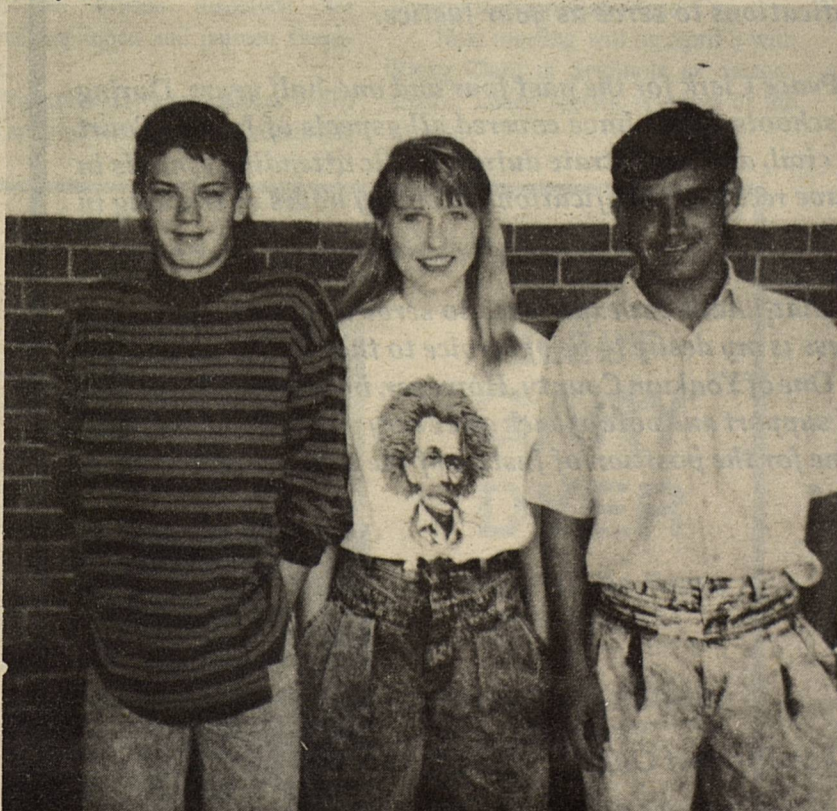

Dinner Theatre Set For March 13

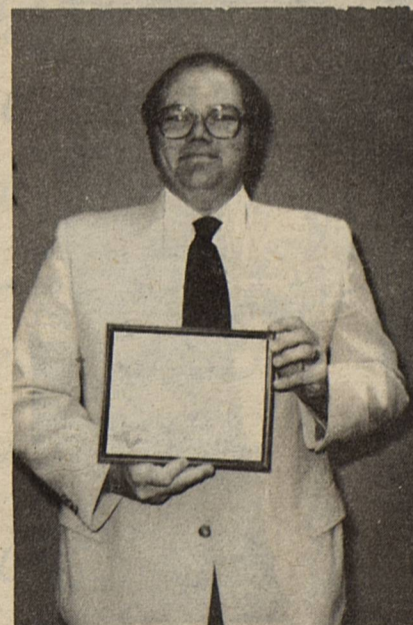

Crew members are Monte Pierce, Blaine McWhirter, Henry Gonzales, Matt Record and Shawn Booth. Director is Joyce Pierce.

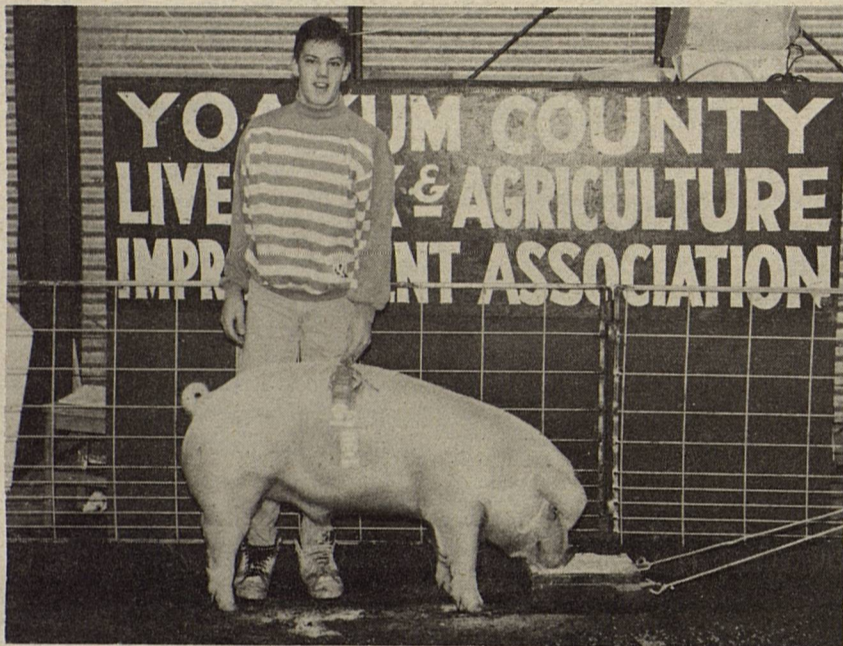

Yoakum County's 38th annual Junior Livestock Show became history Feb. 17, a show dedicated to Gene Bennett of Denver City. Bennett was a charter member of Yoakum County Livestock and Agricultural Improvement Association.

Grand Champion Steer, exhibited by Shawn Bethany of Denver City, was purchased by Yoakum County State Bank for \$1250. Reserve Grand Champion Steer was shown by Marcey House. Plains State Bank and New Texas Gin bought the animal for \$800.

Grand Champion Barrow was shown by Bryan Mahler of Denver. It was purchased by Yoakum County State Bank for \$450. Reserve Champion Barrow was exhibited by Jimmy McGinty. It sold to Melvin Lowrey for \$350.

Asa Costen of Denver City was exhibitor of the Grand Champion Lamb, purchased by H&M Well Service, was shown by Chris Durham of Denver City.

Best of the Show Rabbit was exhibited by Casey Chambliss of Denver City. It sold to Hamilton Tire Company of Denver City for \$225.

Brandy Lester was crowned 1990 Livestock Show Queen by Jo Lena Powell. Showmanship awards went to Kelly McGinty, steer, Amanda Koncaba, swine and Yancey House, lamb, in the junior division. Senior showmanship honors went to Brandon McGinty, steer, Bryan Mahler, swine, and Dusty Rafferty, sheep.

Sold in the premium sale were 11 steers, 53 lambs and 89 barrows. Floor price for animals included 75 cents, steers, Lubbock Stockyard; 62 cents, lambs, Monford of San Angelo and 46.25, barrows, Plains Hog Company of Lubbock.

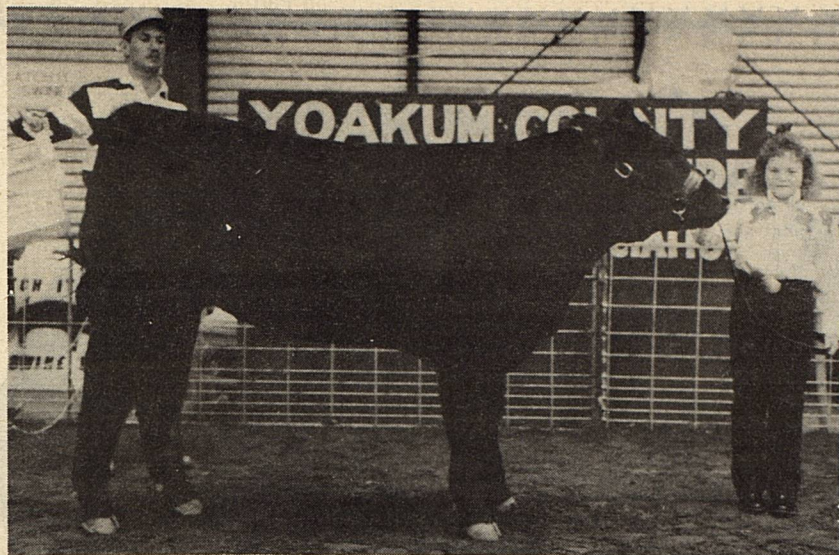

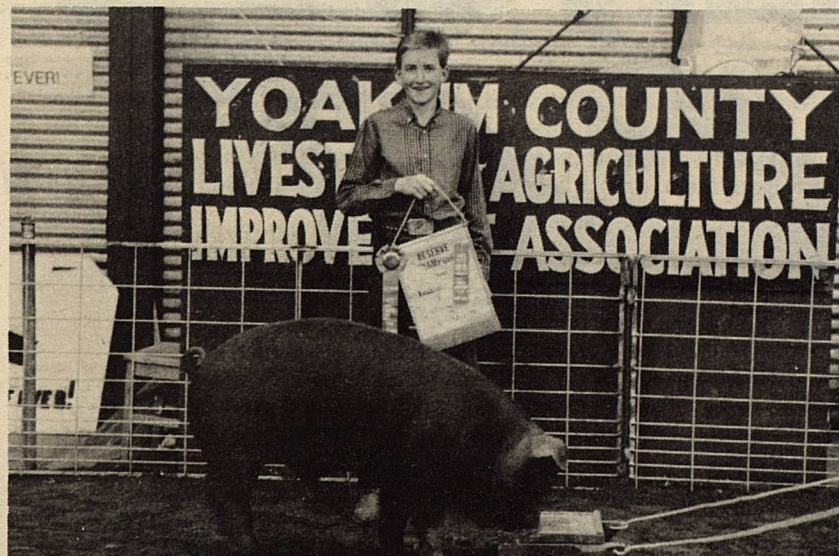

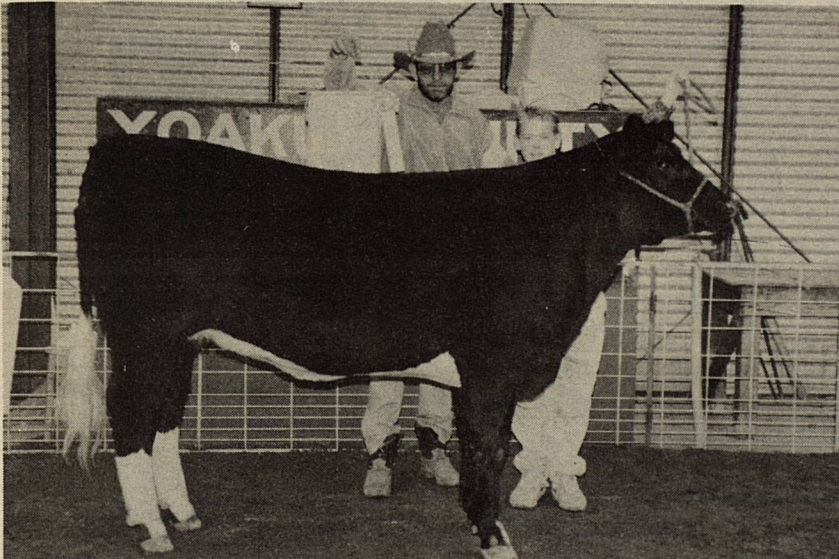

RESERVE CHAMPION STEER - Marcey House, daughter of Phyllis and Wayne House of Plains.

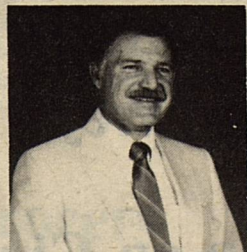

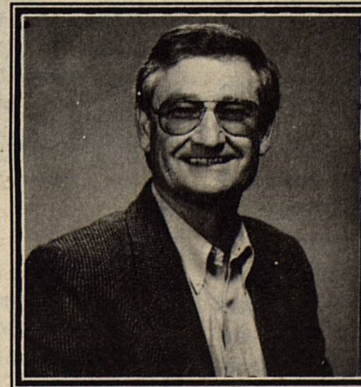

From The Superintendent's Desk

The following is a synopsis of an article concerning minority enrollment in public schools that I read in "Research Briefs", a Texas Education Agency publication.

"Based on 1989-90 fall enrollment counts, the Texas public school population is now 49.72 percent minority, up from 48.99 percent in 1988-89. In all likelihood, minority enrollments in the 1990-91 school year will exceed 50 percent of the total.

The number of minority students increased by 45,958, while the number of white students declined by 1,328, resulting in a net increase of 44,630 students statewide. The new students represent growth of 1.36 percent since 1988-89.

The total students enrolled as of October 2, 1989 numbered 3,316,102. Enrollment counts are taken at the beginning of October in the annual Fall Survey of Pupils.

Not surprisingly, the state's student population continues to become more Hispanic, with 33.08 percent of total student enrollments belonging to this ethnic group. The number of Hispanic students grew by 3.73 percent over the previous year, almost triple the statewide growth for all students.

The percentage of student classified as white is at 50.28 percent for the current year. Black students account for 14.5 percent of the total and Asian and American Indian students for approximately 2.1 percent.

However, when examining the growth in Hispanic enrollments, 102 counties grew by more than 5 percent. Hispanic students are displacing students of other ethnicities.

Over 56 percent of 1989-90 students are enrolled in grades K-6. Enrollments in grades 7 and 8 account for 14.8 students and grades 9-12 for 26.3 percent. Approximately 2.5 percent of students are served in the early education and pre-kindergarten for the disadvantaged programs.

Over 70 percent of the approximate 45,000 student growth since last year is attributable to increases in grades 3 through 6. Another 21 percent of that number is enrolled in grades 7 and 8 and almost 12 percent each are enrolled in grades K through 2 and in the early childhood programs. The number of students in grades 9-12 declined from 1988-89.

Over 500 of the state's 1,058 districts lost students between 1989-90. These districts were typically small; half of the districts with 1,600 or fewer students in average daily attendance declined in enrollment.

Much of the new growth is occurring in suburban districts. Approximately 63 percent of the net increase in students over the last year occurred in the 60 districts in the suburbs of major urban areas.

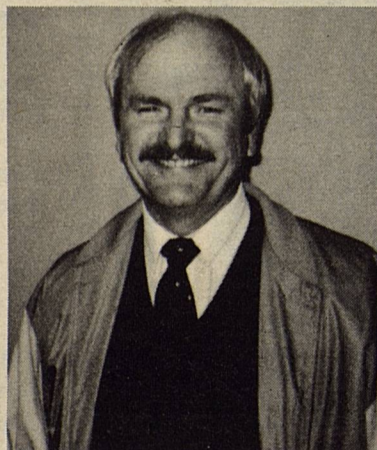
The Fort Worth area experienced the highest percentage growth for an Education Service Center Region with a 2.70 percent increase. The El Paso area was the second fastest growing region at 2.67 percent, followed by the Houston area with 2.53 percent, a possible further indication of the recovering Houston economy.

The Corpus Christi, Victoria, Mt. Pleasant, Abilene, and Midland areas experienced slight declines in enrollments when compared to 1988-89.

During the past five years, Texas public schools have grown by nearly 276,000 students, a 9.1% increase that is roughly equivalent to the total student populations of the Houston, El Paso, and Corpus Christi Independent School Districts.

8. Authorized to conduct marriage ceremonies.

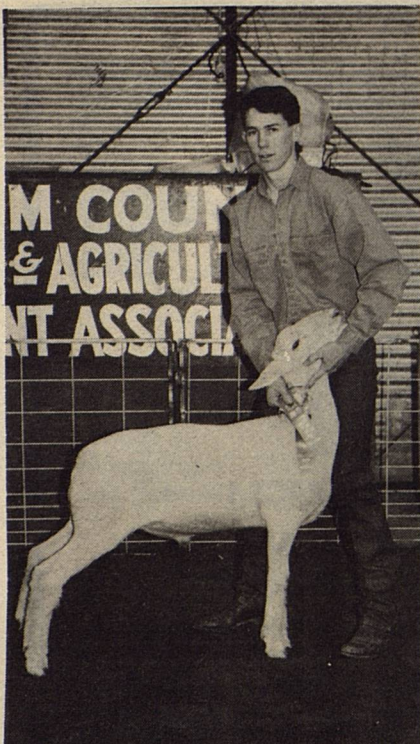

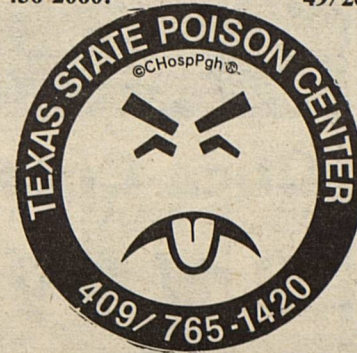
