## Conference On Ag Policy Set For March 26 In Lubbock

Ways farmers and ranchers can reduce their use of chemicals, and the potential impact such steps will have on crop and livestock production and the environment, will be examined in Lubbock, March 26, 1990, at a conference on agricultural policy sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says Kirk Lewis, Yoakum County Extension Agent.

The public discussion will feature national environmental and government policy leaders, research scientists, educators and enforcement agency representatives, according to Kirk Lewis, Yoakum County Extension Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is supported by the Texas Agricultural Forum.

It will be from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. at the Holiday Inn-Civic Center, 801 Avenue Q. Registration is \$20 and includes lunch.

Environmental issues facing agriculture will be outlined by Katherine Reichelderfer of Washington, D.C. She is with "Resources for the Future", a policy and planning group.

The ability of technology to replace chemicals in production agriculture will be addressed by Dr. John R. Abernathy, resident director of research at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.

The director of economic analysis for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Keith Collins, will explore the alternatives and consequences of environmental policy.

The economic impacts of reduced chemical use will be examined by Dr. Ronald Knutson. He is an Extension Service economist and director of the Agricultural and Food Policy Center, Texas A&M University System, College Station.

The Texas High Plains perspective will be presented by Dr. Kary Mathis, professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech University.

Whether USDA or the Environmental Protection Agency will control agricultural chemical policy will be discussed by Mack Gray. He is assistant to the chief of the Soil Conservation Service, USDA, Washington.

The role of research and the Extension Service will be reviewed by Dr. Milo Shult, associate director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station.





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**Abandoned Wells**

It is conservatively estimated that 150,000 (25%) of Texas' water wells are abandoned.

Abandoned wells constitute a hazard to public health and a danger to ground water supplies.

Intentionally or unintentionally, unsealed abandoned wells can act as conduits or channels for contamination to reach ground water. Intentional misuse may involve dumping hazardous wastes, sewage or simply household garbage down a well. Surface runoff draining into a well is an example of unintentional contamination.

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
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ENERGY MANAGEMENT  
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Hot water is an absolute necessity for most modern day families. But the energy required to provide continual supply of hot water can be costly particularly when we're not attentive to good energy management. In most cases, energy cost for hot water is second only to heating and air conditioning expense. Studies have shown that water heaters account for 17-22 percent of home energy consumption.

Money can be saved through diligent energy management. A "traditional" water heater can be made more efficient by installing an "insulation jacket" around it. Thermostat settings should be no higher than 120 degrees Fahrenheit (or 140 degrees if you have an automatic dishwasher). Repair leaky hot water faucets - a hot water faucet dripping at the rate of two drops per second can waste 2,500 gallons a year, water that you paid to heat. Take showers instead of baths and install a flow restrictor on the shower head. Operate clothes washers and dishwashers only with a full load, and use shorter cycles, and "cold" and "warm" settings for laundering when possible.

And finally, a little common sense goes a long way: Don't use hot water when cold or warm will do!

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## New Video Tape Available At Extension Office

A new videotape which will help Yoakum County farmers reduce bark contamination in their stripper-harvested cotton is now available for loan at the county office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

County Agent Kirk Lewis said the tape presents the latest ideas for managing bark, which can cause price discounts to the producer of \$5 to \$18 a bale. On the Texas High Plains, losses from bark contamination average over \$5 million a year, the county agent said.

Bark is woody material from the cotton stalk. If it gets into lint for the textile mills, it causes difficulties in processing, imperfections in the yarn or fabric, and a lower value of the end product.

Dr. James R. Supak, Extension Service cotton agronomist at Lubbock, supervised production of the videotape for the Barky Cotton Task Force and Plains Cotton Improvement Program, with funding from Cotton Incorporated.

The videotape examines problems with bark and what causes them, and offers ways producers can manage the problems. These include cultural practices, timely use of harvest-aid chemicals and stripper modifications.

It was produced by the broadcast bureau in Texas Tech's Office of News and Publications.

## Pat Henard's Brother Dies

Services were held recently for Robert F. Henard, 70, of Lovington, N.M., in the Third and Central Church of Christ with Sam Kitching and Doy Young officiating. He was the brother of Pat Henard.

Burial was in Plains Cemetery under direction of Smith-Rogers Funeral Home of Lovington.

Henard died in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital at 7:20 p.m. Tuesday after a brief illness.

He was born in Wellington and moved to Lea County, N.M. in 1959 from Yoakum County. He married Helen Nelson Aug. 9, 1942, in Wellington. He helped to establish the Plains Junior Livestock Association and had served as secretary of the Yoakum County Rodeo Association.

He was a rancher and the 4-H agent of Lea County. He was administrator of the Lea County extension office and had served as Lea County agricultural agent for 20 years. He retired in 1983 and was an elder at the Third and Central Church of Christ.

He was a member of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, the New Mexico and American Hereford Association, the Texas Hereford Association, the New Mexico Association of Agricultural Agents and a fraternity for agricultural agents, Epsilon Sigma Phi.

Other survivors include his wife; and daughter, Frances Henard of Lovington.
