Jones Retires From SWCD Board, Two Elected To Serve

R.M. (Bob) Jones has announced his retirement from the Yoakum County Soil and Water Conservation District Board, a position he's held since 1960. He was presented an engraved watch at the annual election meeting Monday in recognition of his thirty years of service to the board.

Chris Winn was elected to succeed Jones.

Jones and his wife, Irene, have resided in Yoakum County 38 years. He has served on the ASCS County Committee, as a director of Yoakum County Co-op Gin, on the FmHA board and as director on the Regional Oil Mill Board. He currently farms, raises cattle and enjoys fishing.

He was named Conservation Farmer of the Year before his election to the board.

Re-elected to the board was David Turnbough of Denver City. Turnbough represents zone one with Winn representing zone two. As two of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Turnbough and Winn will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District law.

The board coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations. It has authority to enter into working agreements with these agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

Plains Cowboys Beat Bovina 34-2

Plains Cowboys returned triumphant Friday night from an outing against the Mustangs of Bovina. The 34-2 victory was played on Mustang turf.

The game started slow with neither team able to move the ball and yellow flags flying through the air. Bovina scored first on a blocked Cowboy punt out of the end zone, taking a two-point lead.

A 12-yard pass from Monte Pierce to Jason Smith started the Cowboy's first scoring drive. Dusty Rafferty carried for five, Mario Medina got two more and a seven yard pass from Pierce to Dain Guetersloh put the Cowboys on the scoreboard. Chris Chavez' kick was not good.

Halftime score was Plains, 7; Bovina, 2.

In the second half, the Cowboys came out rolling with a start on their own 37. Medina had carries of five, 13, one, four and nine yards with Pierce picking up nine. Pierce then found Guetersloh for a 33-yard TD. Chavez' kick was good.

The Cowboys padded the score with another TD on a three yard run by Medina. PAT was no good.

Pierce brought the Plains fans to their feet with an interception of a Mustang pass and a 56-yard run for pay dirt. Point after kick by D'Shan Seaton was not good.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Cowboys forced a Mustang fumble with

Justin Stowe getting the ball for Plains. Dan Rushing scored on a 26-yard pass from Pierce. Seaton's kick was good.

Final score was Plains, 34; Bovina, 2.

Medina carried 24 times for 125 yards and 1 TD. Rafferty was five for 17; Smith, one for three and Jose Ramirez, two for nine. Pierce threw 27 times with 11 completions for 160 yards, three TDs and three interceptions.

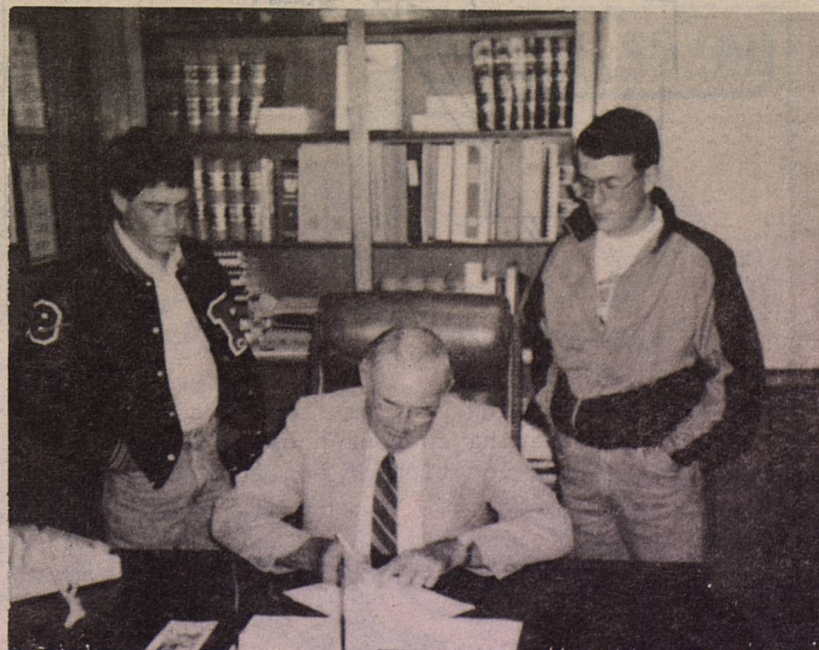
Shane Lowrey had three receptions for 61 yards; Smith, three for 28;

Guetersloh, two for 40 and two TDs; Rushing, two for 35 and one TD.

The Cowboys compiled a total offense of 315 yards.

Outstanding defensively and holding the Mustangs to 70 yards offensively, the Cowboys defenders found Jose Ramirez as leading tackler; Dwane Talley, second.

Pierce intercepted a pass for a TD and recovered a fumble. Stoney Garland caused a fumble and made one recovery.

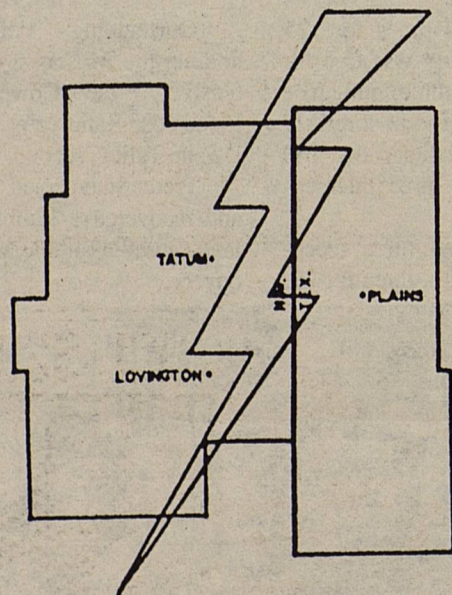

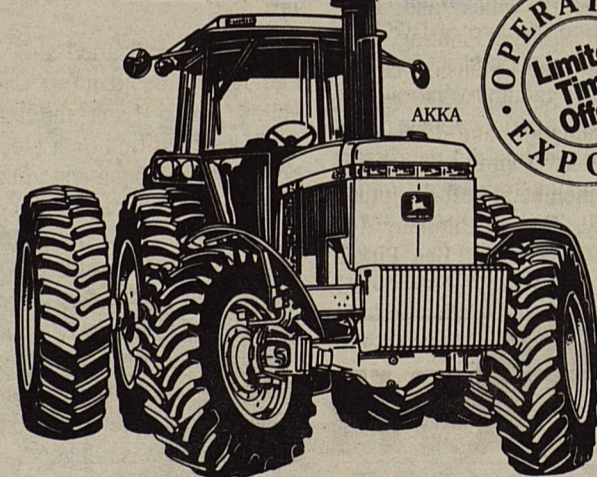

It is here! TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills Test) will be administered on October 16, 17, and 18. The writing test will be given on the 16th, the reading test on the 17th, and the math test will be administered on the last day. In the past, grades 3, 5, 7, and 9 were tested in the spring. Since the test has been renamed TAAS (formerly TEAMS), it has gone from a two-week window in the spring to one-day each test in the fall.

More difficult questions have been added to the test raising the ceiling. Writing has also been added to the exit test.
