ASCS Offers Explanation Of Conservation Reserve

"Much has been written in recent weeks about CRP rental payments, much of it contradictory, depending on where it was published or who was being quoted. The facts are these:

OMB did sequester the CRP program for FY 1991 (as it did in FY 1990, when no reduction was ultimately necessary because of excess carryover funds).

Until the budget agreement was announced Sept. 30, the possibility of a reduction was very real. In fact, until legislation to implement the budget agreement is law, and final FY 1991 appropriations are in place, full payment cannot be guaranteed.

Payments cannot be made on Oct. 1 because we must wait for the final CRP appropriation to be enacted. We anticipate that this may occur about Oct. 20. Following enactment, the law requires that the funds be apportioned by OMB. While no problems are anticipated, we must deal with these procedural hurdles.

ASCS regrets the necessary delay of these important payments and hopes to make 100% of payments due, possibly as early as Nov. 1."

Cowboys Open District Play With Victory Over O'Donnell

District play began Friday night with the Cowboys claiming a big win over perennial foe, O'Donnell.

It was tough going for the Cowboys early in the game when an interception on the second play from scrimmage allowed O'Donnell to take an early lead with a field goal.

But the Cowboys bounded back on their next possession with Mario Medina carrying the ball four times for gains of three, seven, eight and three yards. Dusty Rafferty picked up five and Monte Pierce gained nine. Pierce threw a 24 yard pass to Dain Guetersloh to put the Cowboys on the O'Donnell five yard line. A five yard toss from Pierce to Guetersloh put the Cowboys on the scoreboard. Chris Chavez kicked the PAT.

The Eagles took advantage of another interception from the Cowboys, taking over on Plains' 16. Four plays later, O'Donnell's Rene Hernandez crossed the goal line and a good PAT made it O'Donnell, 10; Plains, 7.

On their next possession, the Cowboys momentum was temporarily stalled with a 33 yard punt by Guetersloh only to find Dan Rushing picking off the next O'Donnell pass at their 26. With good blocking from fellow Cowboys, Rushing carried the ball in for a touchdown. Chavez' toe was good for another point.

The first half scoring ended with a nine yard pass from Pierce to Guetersloh. Again the kick was good, and the Cowboys led at halftime, 21-10.

Cowboys defense held the Eagles to 55 yards offense in the second half.

With 3:16 left in the game, Pierce scored the final TD of the night on a four yard quarterback sneak. Kick was no good. Final score was Plains, 27; O'Donnell, 10.

Medina carried 20 times for 116 yards; Pierce, 11 for 12; Rafferty, four for eight; Jose Ramirez, two for six; Jason Smith, one for two and Wade Redman, two for six.

Pierce threw 16 times for eight completions and 64 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. Guetersloh had five receptions for 37 yards and two TDs; Medina one for 15; Shane Lowrey, one for seven; and Smith, one for five.

Plains had a total offensive effort of 214 yards. Dwane Talley was leading tackler with nine; Stoney Garland, six; Redman and Ramirez, five each.

For some, it's football practice until 7 p.m. that same day.

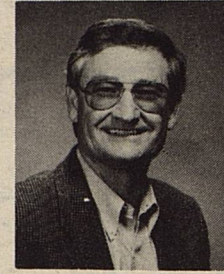
Why do students put themselves on such a schedule?

Plains Junior Varsity Cowboys traveled to O'Donnell Thursday evening, losing 22-28.

Trey Peebles recovered a fumble in the first quarter to set up the first Cowboy drive. Lira scored from the two yard line. The point after was no good.

O'Donnell got on the board in the second quarter with two touchdowns, bringing the halftime score to 16-6.

In the third quarter, Brian Wilson threw a 15 yard pass to Jason Lewis for the Cowboys six points. Lira ran the two point conversion. In the fourth quarter, O'Donnell added another TD but failed to make the point-after.

Wilson connected with Lira again for the Cowboys' final scoring. Lira ran the two point conversion. Michael Bernal picked off the pigskin in O'Donnell's last drive, leaving the final score at O'Donnell, 28; Plains, 22.

Earlier in the evening, the Eighth Grade Wranglers mastered their O'Donnell counterparts, 26-12. Their first touchdown came on the first play of the second quarter with Ladd Winn taking the ball in on a quarterback sneak. A pass from Winn to David Bitolas was good for two more points.

With 3:56 remaining in the first half, Winn completed a 44 yard pass to Bitolas for the second TD. Point-after was no good.

O'Donnell fumbled early in the third quarter and Brad McMinn recovered at the 40 yard line. Winn completed a nine yard pass to McMinn and Bitolas carried for a first down. Winn then hit Shannon Ward with a 22 yard aerial; Ken McAdams carried on the next three plays to just inches short of the goal line. Winn carried the ball over on a right sweep. The PAT was no good.

Coming right back with a score, O'Donnell's point-after attempt was no good. Winn then suffered an interception at the 46 yard line of O'Donnell which led to a second touchdown. The PAT was no good.

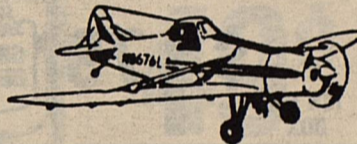

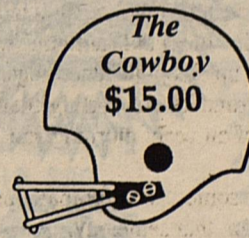

During the business session, Annette Cleveland was elected delegate to District II TFMC Conference in Levelland Oct. 20. Lois Miller, club president, will also attend.

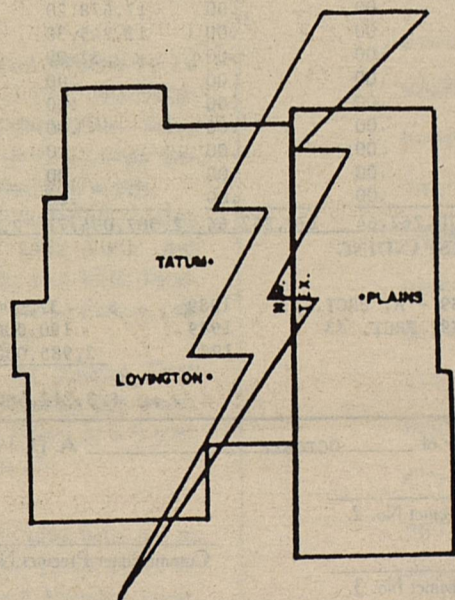

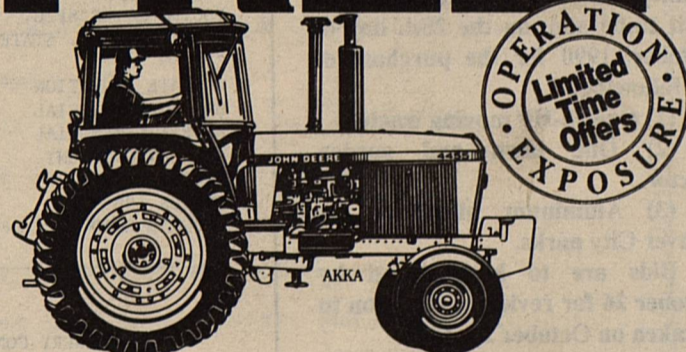
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
