'Texas ALLTEL' Signs Announce Name Change

Another page in telephone history was turned when the ALLTEL sign was placed on the headquarters building of Texas ALLTEL in Grandview, Texas Jan. 15, 1991. The sign replaced one whose name dated the founding of the company in 1957 when a group of investors headed by telephone pioneer C.J. Wimer purchased two small exchanges south of Fort Worth consisting of 100 magneto-operated stations. Named Texas Midland Telephone Company, it's headquarters was moved from his Dallas office to Grandview to better serve its customers.

As the company expanded throughout the years, it functioned under many names including Great Southwest Telephone Company, Telephone Service Company, Trinity Valley Telephone Company in Winnie, Romain Telephone Company in Plains and CP National.

On Sept. 6, 1990, the Public Utility Commission of Texas approved the change of name to Texas ALLTEL reflecting ALLTEL Corporation's purchase of the company. The signs going up at all the Texas locations made the transition complete and signals that ALLTEL is in the neighborhood to stay.

Texas ALLTEL serves over 16,000 access lines in 26 exchanges from its headquarters complex in Grandview and through operations offices in Winnie and Plains.

ALLTEL Western Region provides telephone service to more than 74,500 customers in seven states. The parent company, ALLTEL, provides telephone service to more than 1.1 million customers in 25 states, and has subsidiaries or investments in companies that provide cellular telephone, long-distance and information services, communications products, and other related services.

Producers Need To Review Current Conservation Plans

Now is the time for Yoakum County ag producers to review their Conservation Plans to assure themselves that they are in compliance with the conservation provisions of the Farm Bill, says Edwin Livengood of the Soil Conservation Service in Plains.

During the review, producers need to keep in mind that residues need to be maintained until April 1 and that rotations for the 1991 year need to be planned. Some conservation plans call for grass to be planted this year. If this is the case, the recommended planting dates begin pretty soon for many grasses, continued Livengood.

Producers who are actively applying Conservation Plans maintain their eligibility to apply for USDA program benefits. Program benefits include CRP payments, any ASCS programs, Federal Crop Insurance, any FmHA loans, and any SCS cost share programs. Producers are responsible for keeping eligibility records such as crop rotations current at either the ASCS office or the SCS office.

Developing and applying a Conservative Plan is voluntary. However, if a producer requests any program benefit, an implemented Conservation Plan is required by the USDA agency that receives the request.

If any producer has any question, Livengood concluded, he needs to contact the Soil Conservation Service in Plains as soon as possible.

Programs and services of the Soil Conservation Service are offered on a

nondiscriminatory basis to anyone without regard to race, religion, color, sex, age, handicap, marital status, or national origin.

Commissioners' Court

Yoakum County Commissioners court convened in special session Monday with all members present.

Bids were opened for the sale of vehicles confiscated by the Sheriff's Department. Bids accepted included a high bid of \$2,502.25 from Jerry A. Randall for a 1983 Harley Davidson motorcycle; Phyllis Keehnen's bid of \$900 for a 1976 Chevrolet Camaro; Vincent Diaz's bid of \$400 for a 1975 Buick, 1977 Olds Cutlass and 1979 Chevrolet Monte Carlo.

Patrick Shinkle, representative of Texas Local Government Investment Pool, introduced TexPool, an investment service for public funds provided by the Texas State Treasury. It offers local governments the opportunity to join with the State of Texas and other public entities to get the highest earnings possible on public money under the safest conditions. No action was taken.

Carol Bailey, Regional Director, of the Department of Human Services, Child Protective Services, discussed a change in procedure for payments to foster parents in order that they might receive funds in a more timely manner. The change would have the payments made by the auditor's office. Action was postponed for further study.

Bids were opened on hot and cold mix from two companies. Danny's Service Company's bid was accepted. It included picked up at plant in Denver City, \$31.50; delivered to precinct yard in Plains, \$32.50; and delivered to precinct yard in Denver City, \$32.

Asphalt bids were opened and studied with acceptance of Fina's bid on AC-5, AC-5 with 2% latex, AC-10, MC-30, MS-1 and MS-2 for all four precincts. Elf Asphalt's bid for CRS-2, AE-P, CRS-1P, MS-2 diluted 20/80, and MS-2 diluted 30/70 was also accepted.

Motion was approved to advertise for bids for the purchase of a new dump truck for precinct 4 with the offer in trade of two used dump trucks, one 1982 model and one 1967 model. Bids are to be received Feb. 25.

The court will also advertise for bids to purchase a used late model backhoe tractor with trade-in of one used backhoe with bids to be received Feb. 25 and for bids to purchase a four-wheel drive front-end loader with minimum of 150 HP with trade-in of one 1978 John Deere loader with bids to be received Feb. 25.

In other action, the court acknowledged notification by Phillips 66 of company trucks traveling on county roads. Two securities were authorized for release and extra hire and disbursements were approved for payment.

Physicians Urge Anti-Smoking Efforts

Most smokers—nearly 90 percent—started puffing cigarettes before they were 20 years old, says Texas Medical Association. In November, during the American Cancer Society's Great American Smokeout, TMA urges prevention education targeted to youth.

"Since smoking starts in adolescence, advertisers target kids," says Joel S. Dunnington, M.D., chair of TMA's Ad Hoc Task Force on Tobacco Use Prevention. Two men's brands use images of a rugged cowboy and cartoon character, says the Houston radiologist, while women's brands use glamorous, sophisticated models in their early 20s.

Although cigarette advertising is banned on television, children see brand names on television because tobacco companies sponsor sports events and display huge signs in sports stadiums, explains Dr. Dunnington. Ads also are beginning to appear in video games and movies.

Consequently, young people tend to overestimate smoking acceptable. A

1989 survey of Texas middle and high school students showed two-thirds believe 50 percent or more students their age use cigarettes, when only 15 percent smoke daily or weekly.

To help prevent youth from starting smoking, follow these tips:

* Set a no-smoking example. Children whose parents smoke are four times more likely to take up the habit than other children, Dr. Dunnington explains.

* Remind teen-agers that the norm for their age group is not to smoke. Correct misperceptions about the prevalence of smoking. Only 30 percent of adults smoke, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

* Teach children how to critique ads. What they don't show is that "nicotine is more addictive than cocaine and other drugs," says Dr. Dunnington. What's more, "smoking is the single largest preventable cause of death in the country."

* Don't underestimate how young

children are when they start to experiment. More than half (55 percent) of Texas seventh graders surveyed in 1989 reported having smoked at least one cigarette.

* When taking children for sports physicals or yearly check-ups, ask the physician to stress the immediate effects of smoking on athletic performance and appearance (bad breath, yellow teeth). Sometimes teen-agers will heed the advice of expert adults other than their parents.

YOAKUM COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT AD VALOREM TAX EXEMPTIONS PROPERTY REPORTS AND RENDITIONS

EXEMPTIONS:

1. Texas school districts offer a \$5,000.00 residence homestead exemption off of appraised value and additional exemptions to persons who are over 65 or disabled.
2. A mobile home owner must now provide a copy of a title issued by the Texas Department of Labor and Standards together with the residence homestead exemption in order to qualify for a residence homestead exemption.
3. Yoakum County offers a \$3,000.00 homestead exemption off of appraised value on the Farm to Market and Lateral Road Fund and a \$25,000.00 exemption off of appraised value to persons who are over 65.
4. The City of Denver City and City of Plains both offer exemptions to persons who are over 65.
5. Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District offers a \$25,000.00 exemption off of appraised value to persons who are over 65.
6. All taxing units offer an exemption for certain service connected disabled veterans on one designated property. Surviving unmarried spouses are also entitled to these exemptions of a deceased veteran or a surviving minor child.
7. If you received a residence homestead or disabled veterans exemption on your present property in 1990, it will not be necessary to make a new application for 1991 unless you receive a written request in the mail from the appraisal office. If you were at least 65 years of age or disabled on January 1, 1991 and have not previously filed for the over 65 disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application by April 1, 1991. Or if you have never received a residence homestead exemption on your present homestead, an application must be filed with the appraisal office on or before April 1, 1991. All exemptions not previously granted must be filed on or before April 1, 1991.

LAND PRODUCTIVITY VALUATION:

If your acreage was appraised based on productivity for 1990, it will not be necessary to file a new application for 1991 unless you receive written request in the mail from the appraisal district office.

RENDITIONS:

Business Personal Property renditions are mandatory according to State Law. Real Property renditions are an option available to owners of real property.

DEADLINE:

All forms must be filed before April 1, 1991 with the Yoakum County Appraisal District office located at 500-10th Street, P.O. Box 748, Plains, Texas 79355. Forms are available upon request and may be obtained by writing to the above address or calling 456-7101.

Rep. Jim Rudd To Chair House Committee

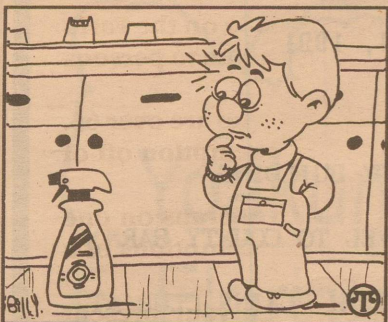

Letter To Editor

(Editor's Note: The following article was written to the Lubbock A-J by Linda Powell, a Yoakum County teacher in response to the A-J Editorial Page.)

Dear Editor:

The editorial page of the Lubbock A-J generally reflects a conservative attitude, except for the educational issue of public school spending per student. Then apparently, it is okay to take from the haves and give to the have-nots. If that is the theory (there's no proof that more money for Lubbock or other tax poor school districts will improve their educational ability) then why not apply equality to other areas of life?

If Yoakum County's school tax money is to be divided with those that don't have, I'd like for sales tax money reimbursed to Lubbock to be prorated among towns that don't receive as much per capita, because we don't have the businesses to raise this revenue.

(Too many of us shop in Lubbock, rather than our hometowns.)

Also, if absolute equality in spending for a child's education is deemed proper - why not equality in access to day care facilities, health, entertainment and enrichment activities? Obviously, children in Lubbock have an advantage in these areas.

Having formerly taught in Denver City High School for ten years, my students did not learn more because I was paid a higher salary than teachers in tax poor school districts. Students learn more when they have caring, quality, and committed educators. It is not the materials, classroom, resource equipment, buses, or uniforms that produce an educated person. It is parental and community support, along with a teacher willing to put in preparation to get students involved in their own learning process. These we have in Plains and Denver City.
