Son Of Former Plains Resident Returns From Persian Gulf

Paul Doyal, who recently returned from duty in the Persian Gulf War, is the son of Carolyn Warren, a native of Plains and Pat Doyal of Conroe and grandson of the late Tom and Velma Warren of Plains.)

A small white posterboard sign adorned with little American flags and yellow ribbons greeted U.S. Army Pvt. Paul Doyal when he pulled into his driveway Saturday.

The 19-year-old Conroe soldier was sent to Saudi Arabia on Oct. 9. He was among the first local troops to return to the States.

Late Friday, his parents, Pat and Carolyn, received a call from Ft. Hood informing them their son was on his way home.

"All I had wished for was for him to call and tell me he was all right," his mother Carolyn recalled Saturday. "To know he was coming home was great!"

Killeen was only about 150 miles away, so his parents brought him home for the weekend.

Excited family members and friends streamed in and out of the house to welcome him home. Between hugs and before an overdue celebration, he recalled his tour of duty in the Gulf.

"It was bearable," the young soldier said.

Doyal's joy at being home was overshadowed by his concern for those he left behind.

"I left buddies sitting in foxholes in Kuwait," he said.

"I wish everyone could come home," he added.

But it was great to be home, he said with an enormous smile.

First on his agenda was a beer and a fresh ham sandwich, items he missed during the war.

Military food "wasn't like mom's" he said with a smile.

To illustrate his point, he offered to share a dehydrated, bagged military meal.

He admitted acquiring a new appreciation for the simple things in life, like good food, running water and a soft bed.

His first few weeks in the desert were spent "sleeping under the stars," he said.

Later, when the bombing began, he slept in foxholes.

But, the bombing was at a distance and easy to adjust to, he remembered.

"The scariest part was the gas," Doyal said as he recalled the fear of chemical warfare.

If it was 3 a.m. in the morning and the Iraqis bombed, Doyal said "you'd rip all the buttons off your sleeping bag just to get to your gas mask."

He went into the war expecting the worst, he said. So, his experiences didn't seem that bad.

On a rough sketch of the gulf countries, he traced his platoon's ad-

vancement from Saudi to Kuwait City during the February ground war.

He did not discuss the devastation or the gruesome realities of war, except to say the troops dealt with the prospect of death by joking about it.

The surrendering Iraqi troops fascinated him and Doyal talked at length about them.

"They were coming out of the woodwork," he said, recalling the numerous Iraqi troops walking towards them waving white flags.

"There really must be something rough up ahead," he remembered thinking as the enemy troops streamed passed him to surrender.

During the brief ground war, he said his platoon took about 300 POWs and his battallion a total of about 800.

While camped about two miles outside Kuwait City, Doyal said seven enemy soldiers walked through their own minefield to surrender.

One of them, who spoke English, told the U.S. soldiers they had no idea they were fighting America, Doyal said.

The U.S. troops were fairly well informed at least concerning the war, he said.

"Most news came down through the chain of command or letters, Doyal explained.

The letters were good for news about the states and for morale, he said.

Doyal said he and the other troops heard about all the stateside support and it meant a lot to them.

But, the greeting they received when they landed in Texas was more than he had expected.

People lined the five to six mile stretch of road from the airport to Ft. Hood, cheering the troops, he said.

"I didn't expect anything like that," he said. "That was nice, real nice."

The laughing, joking young man showed no battle scars.

Friends who gathered near said he appeared to be the same as when he left almost five months ago.

But Doyal said he had changed. For one thing, he said he had more self-confidence.

After a minute of thought he concluded, "I know a lot more about myself."

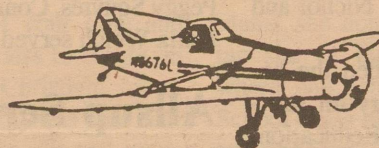

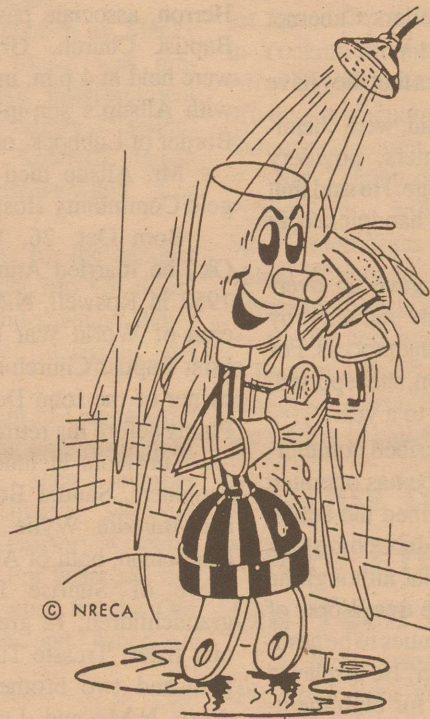


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Mrs. Johnna Brown Summers Selected As 'Super Teacher'

Newsom Family Describes Grape & Bee Industries

"All About Grapes," a review of the grape industry and honey marketing in the Plains area, was presented Monday evening for members and guests of Tsa Mo Ga Study Club.

Presenting the program were LaVerne and Hoss Newsom and Janice and Neal Newsom assisted by Nichol and Nolan Newsom.

Hoss Newsom described the beginning processes necessary for starting a vineyard citing self-education, variety selection and site selection. He began his local vineyard with 8000 Cabernet Sauvignon grape plants which were ready to produce wine grapes in about five years.

Newsom grapes are contracted to Tesha Cellars and will be bottled in November as Tesha Cellars Cabernet Sauvignon Celler Select Wine.

Some of the setbacks that they have experienced, Newsom said, were chemical damage, hard winters, powdery mildew and worm damage. He said that 18 acres of grapes are handpicked in two days.

LaVerne Newsom gave an overview of the Texas wine industry by describing the winemaking process. For their Cabernet Sauvignon, she reported, the process can take up to a year.

Neal Newsom described commercial beekeeping which he has operated several years. He described the action of bees in the hive to produce comb wax and honey. He noted that although he has sold his hives to The Bee Works of Roswell, N.M., he continues to be associated with that beekeeper. He displayed several types of honey for club members to sample.

In the business session, announcement was made of the March 16, Caprock District Convention of G.F.W.C. Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. Items are needed for the Country Store and members were asked to donate cakes, breads, cookies, and other items. Judging will be held for photography, needlework and arts and crafts items.
