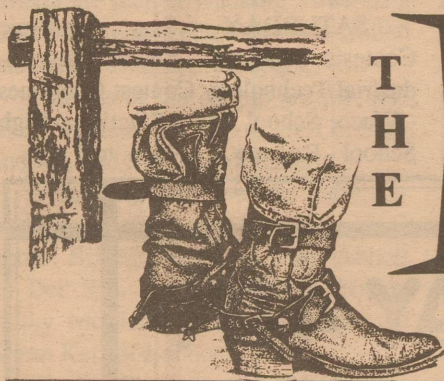

Moreno graduated from Coronado High School in Lubbock and attended Texas Tech University. He is employed with Lubbock UPS.

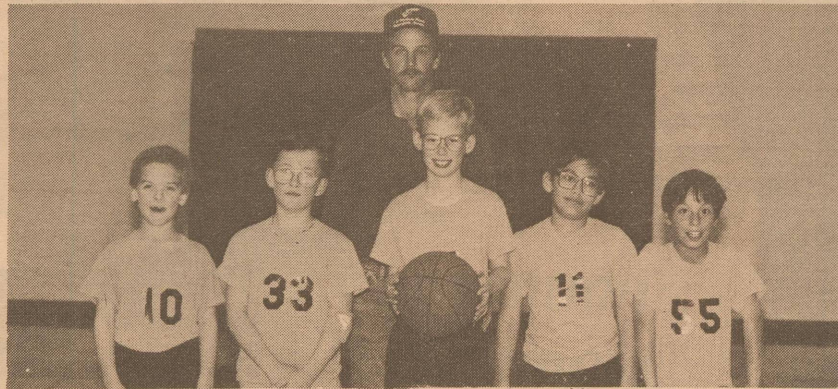

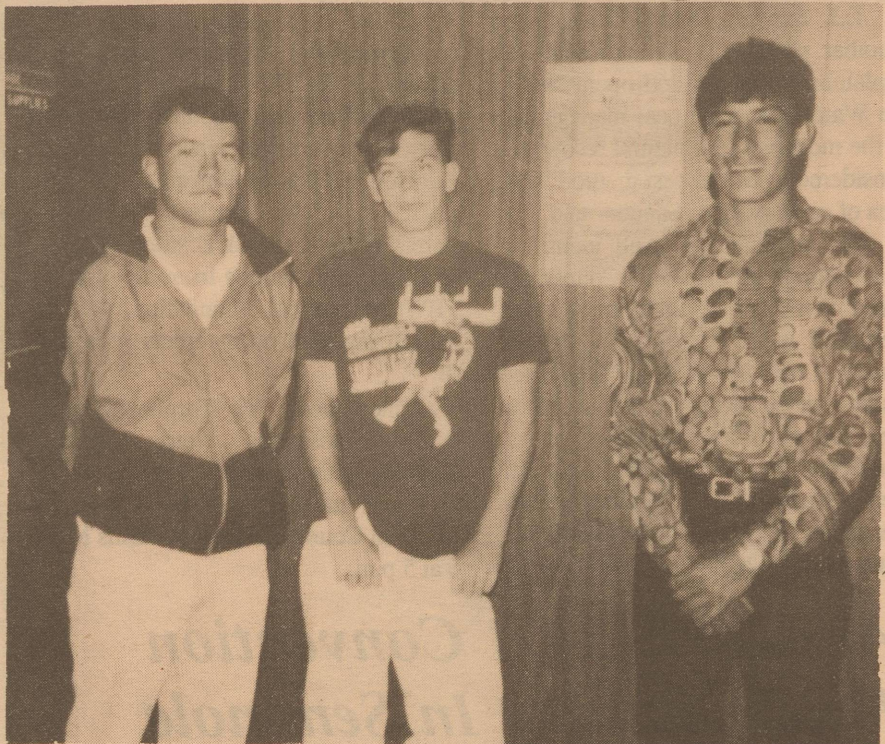

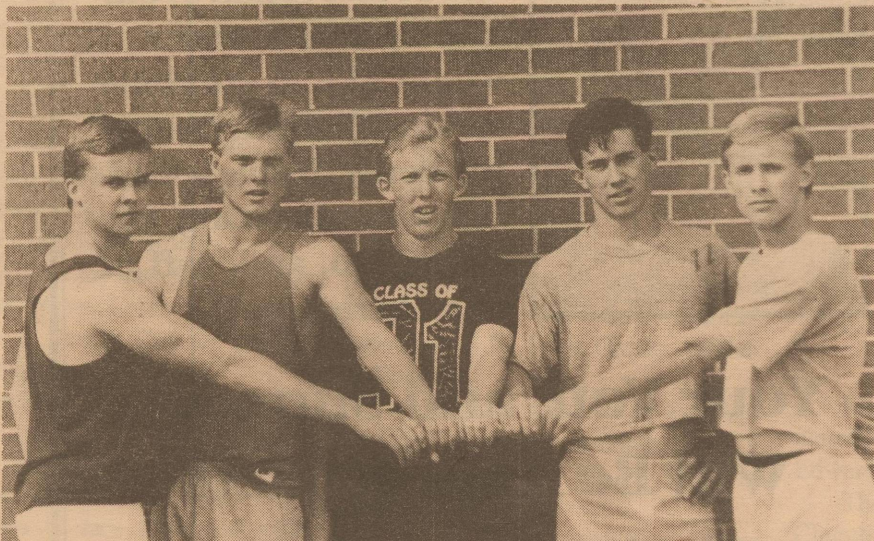
Cowboys Do Well In Meet

Water Conservation Program Given For Study Club

Kathy Jones, secretary of Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District, was director of a Texas Water Conservation program given Monday for Tsa Mo Ga Study Club.

L.J. Sanders, Sandy Land board member, presented a slide presentation explaining purposes and operations of the Water District. Local management of the most precious natural resource is considered to be the best method in the area of conservation, Sanders said.

He explained the well identification program in Yoakum County and stated there are approximately 2,000 identified wells or windmills in the county. Local services, he explained, include water testing, pesticide detection, soil moisture monitoring, irrigation demonstrations and irrigation efficiency studies. Other services include the sponsorship of a scholarship program which awarded a \$1,000 scholar-

ship to Dan Rushing, PHS senior, earlier this year; homemaker's information; educational programs; and assistance in application for grant money where appropriate.

David Turnbough, Denver City board member, explained the development of the LEPA irrigation system which will be demonstrated this summer on the farms of Danny Bell, Tim Addison and Darrell Barron.

During the business session, Zareta Winn, Caprock District Trustee, reported on donations from the club to TFWC Historical Foundation. Wilma Powell reported on members who are ill.

One guest, Vi Turnbough, attended. Hostesses were Virginia Sanders, Janie Crawford and Sit Jones.

Next meeting will be a tour of Yoakum County Library in Plains May 6 at 5 p.m.

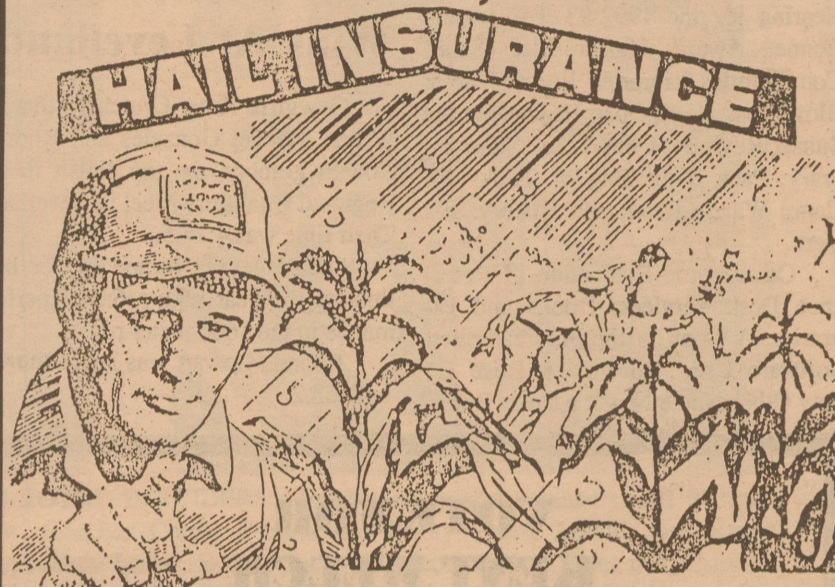

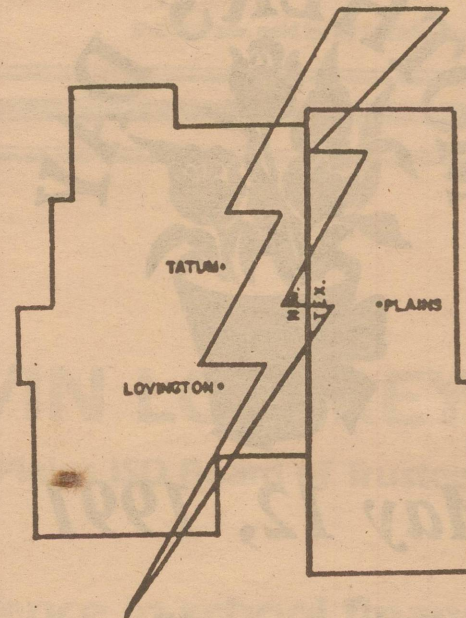
