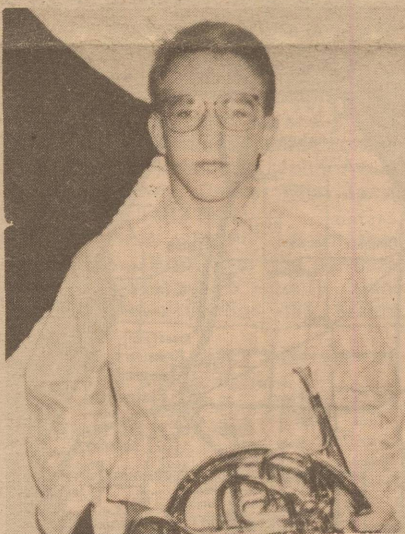

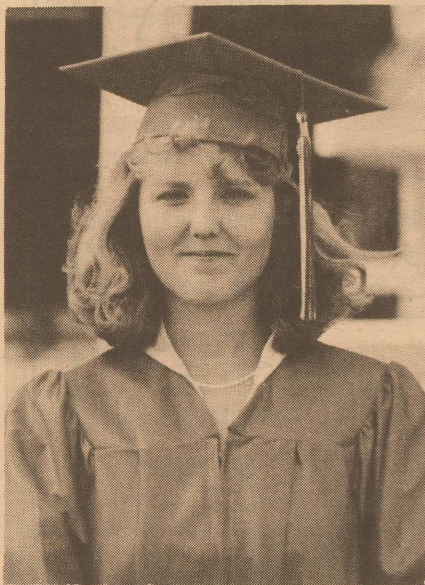
## Mrs. Robert Young Honored With Surprise Birthday Party

## Eastern Star Installs Officers

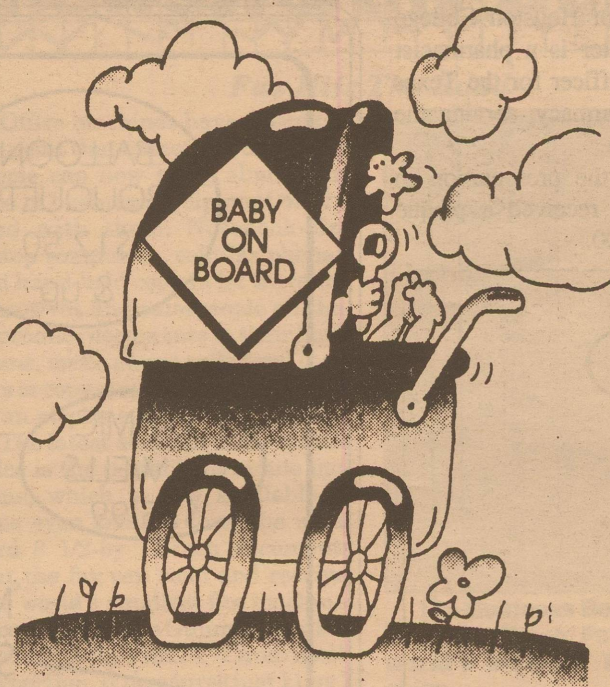

## Plains High School Graduate Initiates Scholarship Award

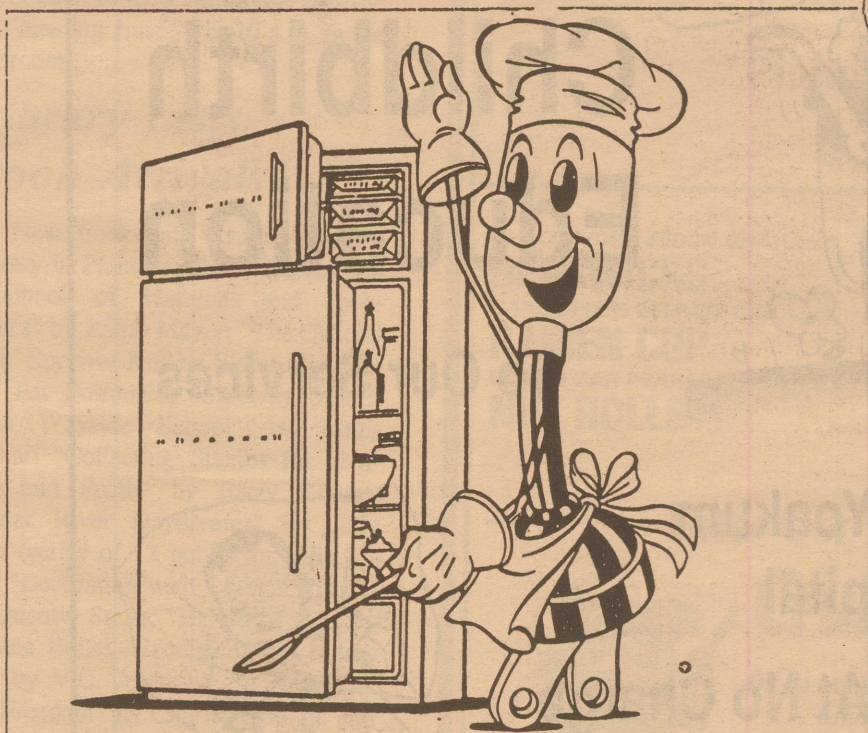

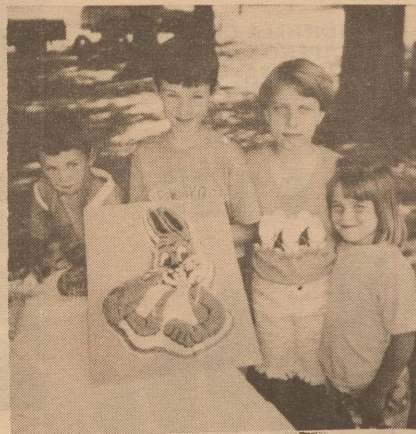

Also attending were Mmes. W.M. Overton, H.N. Parks and Ann Thompson.

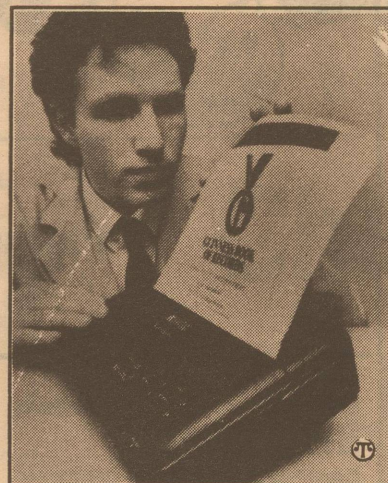
## newsworthy trends

### Fax Hits The Road

Office machines have shrunk to the point that executives and salespeople can now bring almost any type of business equipment on the road with them. Notebook-size laptop computers, cellular phones, and hand-held copiers let traveling executives and salespeople on-the-go produce documents in their hotel rooms, make phone calls from their cars or copy magazine articles while on an airplane.

The latest addition to the mobile office is the portable facsimile machine, which is now available in sizes even smaller than the standard 8 1/2-by 11-inch documents that the fax can send and receive. The world's smallest fax machine, as certified by the Guinness Book of Records, is the FAX PF-1 from Ricoh Corporation. It measures just 11 by 7 by 2 inches and is small enough to fit comfortably inside a briefcase, backpack, or pocketbook, leaving plenty of room for other things.

The portable fax machines permit you to send and receive faxes at any location; the beach, a hotel room, even a car. To fax from your car, just plug into the cigarette lighter for power, and connect to a cellular phone. On the beach, the portable fax can be operated off an attached battery pack, and hooked up with an "acoustic coupler" to the receiver of a portable, cellular or pay phone. To fax to the office from a hotel room, the portable machines can be plugged into an AC wall outlet, and connected to a standard phone jack. Carrying your own fax machine can be a real money as well as a time saver, as hotels often charge as much as five dollars a page for the use of their fax

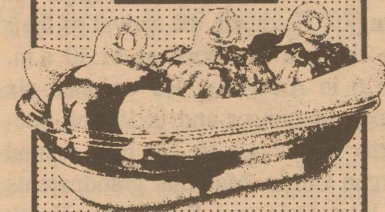
machine. An additional benefit is that a portable fax can also serve as a small convenience copier.

For business people on the move, portable fax machines offer unprecedented flexibility as well as improvement in overall productivity. With a portable fax, executives gain instant access to their office files—they just phone their office and request a copy of any document, which can then be instantly faxed to a car, hotel or other location. In addition, sales leads and service calls also can be faxed to staff already on the road, to ensure a quick response.

With the new portable fax machines and other compact mobile office equipment, commuters and traveling business people may soon be able to get as much work done on the road as in their office.

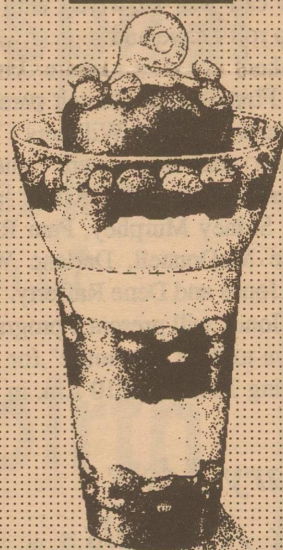

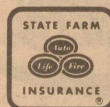

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."
