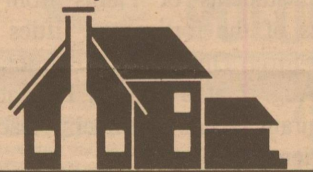

Robin is the 12-year-old daughter of Peggy and Newell Squyres.

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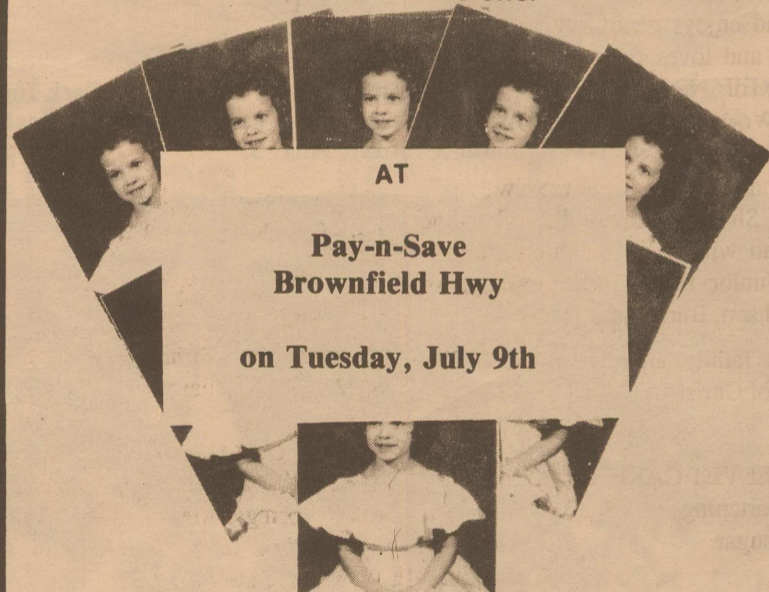


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CANDI SEATON

RED VELVET CAKE

1/2 c shortening
1 1/2 c sugar
2 eggs
2 T cocoa
2 oz red food coloring
1 t vanilla
1 t salt
1 c buttermilk
2 1/2 c sifted cake flour
1 1/2 t soda
1 T vinegar

Cream together shortening, sugar and eggs. Make paste with cocoa and food coloring and add to creamed mixture. Mix salt and vanilla with buttermilk. Add alternately with flour to creamed mixture.

Mix soda and vinegar and fold into mixture. Do not beat. Bake in two (9") layer pans - 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Grease bottoms of pans and flour lightly.

ICING:

5 T flour
1 c milk
1 c sugar (granulated)
1 c butter
1 t vanilla

Cook flour and milk until thick, stirring constantly. Let cool and add to the sugar, butter and vanilla.

Cream together. Beat until consistency to spread. When finished, looks like whipped cream.

Red Velvet Cake can also be made using a German Chocolate Cake Mix and substituting 2 oz of red food coloring for 2 oz of the water.

CHEESE CAKE

Crust:
18-20 graham crackers
3/4 stick butter or oleo, melted
2 T sugar

Mix together and press onto bottom of 9 inch pie plate.

Filling:

1 large and 1 small pkg. cream cheese
3/4 c sugar
3 egg yolks
1 t vanilla

Blend together until smooth, then fold in 3 stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into graham cracker crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes or until top is light brown or has started to crack in places.

TOPPING:

1 pint sour cream
3 T sugar
1 1/2 t vanilla

Mix together well. As soon as pie is baked, pour topping over it. Set in refrigerator for six hours or overnight.

MARY'S SUGAR COOKIES

1 1/2 c sifted confectioner's sugar
1 c butter
1 egg
1 t vanilla
1/2 t almond flavoring
2 1/2 c Gold Medal flour
1 t soda
1 t cream of tartar

Mix sugar and butter. Mix in egg and flavorings. Measure flour by dipping method or by sifting. Blend dry ingredients; stir in. Refrigerate two to three hours.

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Divide dough in half and roll out on lightly floured pastry cloth to 3/16" thickness. Cut with floured cookie cutter. Sprinkle with sugar. Place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake 7 to 8 mins. or until delicately golden. Makes 5 doz. 2 to 2 1/2 inch cookies.

BUTTER DREAM COOKIES

(Puerto Rican cookies)
Bake at 350 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.

CREAM:

1/2 c butter
1/2 c shortening, add gradually
1/2 c sugar, creaming well.

BLEND IN:

1 t almond extract

2 1/4 c sifted Pillsbury's Best Enriched Flour; mix well.

SHAPE dough into balls using 1 level tablespoonful of dough for each cookie. Press a maraschino cherry into top of each ball, allowing cherry to show slightly. Place on ungreased baking sheets.

BAKE in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 8 to 10 mins.

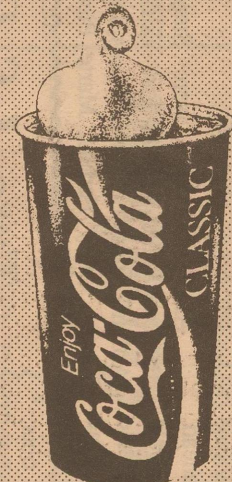

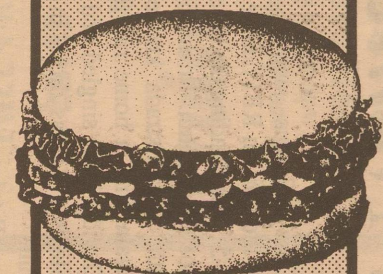
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Baseball Season Ends, All-Stars Named

Nuptial selections on the organ were presented by Billie Blundell. She accompanied Jo Lena Powell as she sang "Walk Hand in Hand".

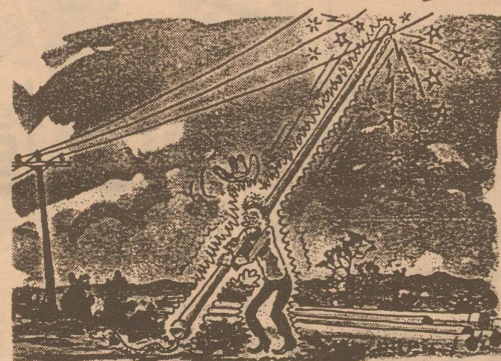
Guests were registered by Staci Tuggle at a table laid with a white crocheted cloth with a vase of peach flowers.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Editor:

Approximately two and a half months ago, my father, Johnnie Brown, was diagnosed as having lung cancer. As I sat in the hospital room listening to the doctor's terrifying words, I couldn't help but wonder why such a horrific thing was happening to such a wonderful man and family. The doctor wasted no time in telling us the cause of the cancer - none other than years of cigarette smoking.

I'm not writing to say how devastating cigarette smoke is to those of us who don't smoke ~ asthma, lung disease, chronic childhood infections ~ it's a documented fact how dangerous secondary smoke is to the non-smoker.

What isn't so much a "documented fact" is the effect on a family upon hearing a loved one has lung cancer, and that the disease could have been prevented.

If you are a smoker and care anything at all about your family's health, as well as your own, and I have no doubt that you do care, PLEASE STOP SMOKING! The emotional impact on a family dealing with cancer is enormous; it's something no one in his or her right mind would want their family to go through.

I can't imagine the psychological and physical addiction of nicotine. All I do know is that it must be tremendous to risk the health and well-being of an entire family. Luckily, my family is a strong, close-knit group that can make it through this difficult time. I feel sorry for those families that aren't so lucky.

If you can't stop smoking for yourself, do it for your family.
