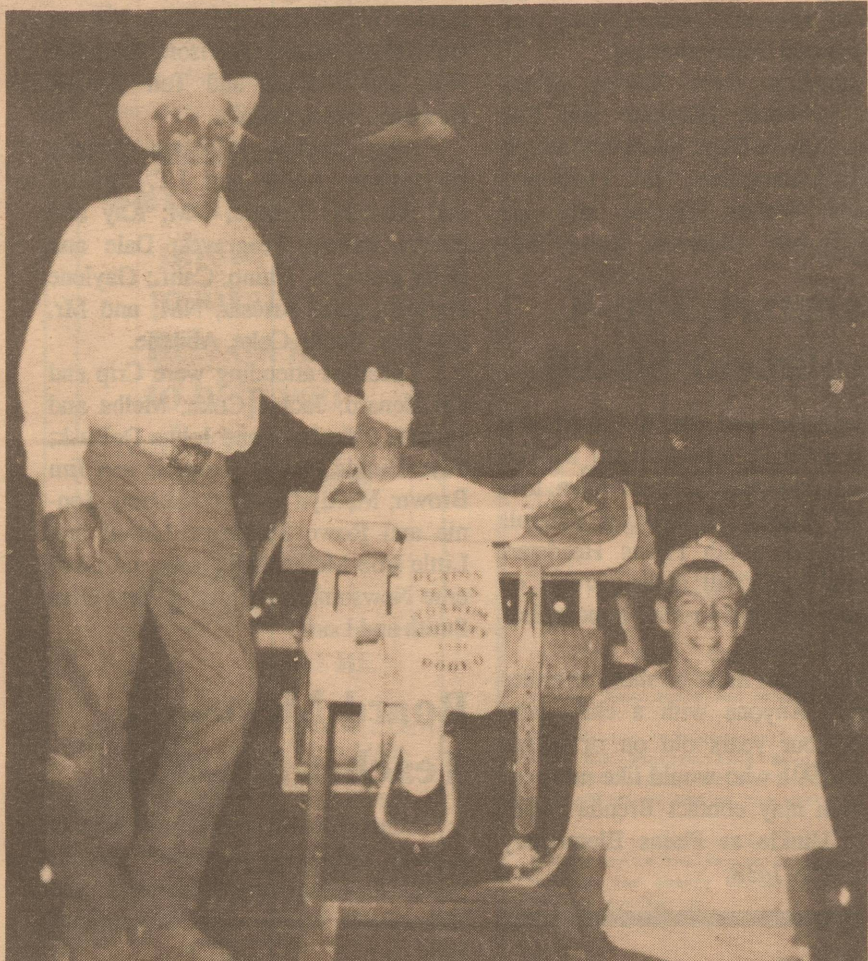

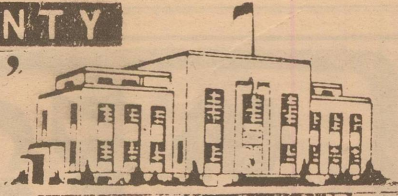

# YOAKUM COUNTY Commissioners' Court



Yoakum County Commissioners Court convened in special session July 1.

Motion to advertise for bids to purchase one new asphalt distributor for precinct 2 was approved. A resolution expressing appreciation to Capt. Dan Sanders and all the young men and women from Yoakum County who served in the Persian Gulf War was unanimously approved.

A letter was read from Dennis Poole, who was approved for employment as Yoakum County Extension Agent, Agriculture June 16, asking that his application be removed.

A \$50 per month raise for Teresa Howard upon completion of a six months probationary period effective July 1 was approved. Extra hire and disbursements were also okayed for payment.

The court met July 8 in regular session. Treasurer's quarterly report and the monthly report of taxes collected were approved.

Election judges and alternate judges were appointed and the maximum number of clerks set at six for each polling place. A branch office for absentee voting was established and deputy clerks for absentee voting were appointed.

A petition from Texas ALLTEL for the right and authority to lay, construct, operate and maintain a communications cable under and across a county road was approved.

Correspondence was received and read from Jerry Casstevens, South Plains Association of Governments Executive Director, stating that in accordance with HB 69, local governments would not have to match state funding to complete the required regional solid waste management plan.

Extra hire and disbursement lists were approved for payment including a transfer of \$50,000 of budgeted funds to the hospital fund.

At the request of Gene Valentini, representing SPAG Dispute Resolution, the current \$5 dispute resolution center fee was raised to \$10 per each civil case filed.

In afternoon session, the court voted to enter into joint election agreements with Denver City and Plains Independent School District for the Aug. 10 elections required by the 72nd Legislature.

The court convened July 22 in special session. Eileen Fillipp and Johnnye Conner, representing Yoakum County Art Association, met with the court to request help in the preservation of the Art Association building. They stated that payment of taxes on the building by the association has become impossible due to the new appraisal figures. The court will study the matter.

Bids were read on the purchase of a new asphalt distributor for precinct 1 with the nod given to Nichols Machinery Company in the amount of \$78,500.

Tax Collector/Assessor Wanda Smith presented a list of delinquent or insolvent taxpayers assessed on the 1990 tax rolls. The list was ap-

proved with a go-ahead to proceed with collection of delinquent taxes on personal property in the amount of \$4,331.77. The list of lands and lots delinquent on June 30, 1991 for 1990 taxes was also approved and procedure to collect in the amount of \$37,297.89. A list of errors in assessments found on the 1990 tax

rolls in the amount of \$2,307.70 was also approved.

Hospital Administrator Ed Rogers discussed a tentative contract with Jorge Saurez, MD in the future and OB coverage. Both will be studied prior to action. A motion to pay Dr. James Chudleigh \$2,000 per month for emergency room coverage and two Seminole doctors \$500 each was approved.

Betty Munn was appointed alternate election judge in precinct 106 for the Aug. 10 election, replacing Marjorie Freeman.

In special session July 24, the court accepted the recommendation

of Dr. Bob Robinson, District Agent Extension Service, to employ Terry Milligan as Yoakum County Extension Agent, Agriculture. Milligan's salary of \$10,000 as the county's portion will begin in August.

Convening again July 29, the court entered into an agreement with Jorge Saurez, MD to be effective 24 months beginning with date medical practice begins at the end of doctor's residency and special training, about November 1992. Agreement is on file in Yoakum County Courthouse.
