Director To Be Elected For Yoakum County SWCD

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone three on the Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 9 at Johnnie's Restaurant in Plains, Texas announced David Turnbough, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 8:00 A.M.

Featured speaker will be Jim Rudd. Coffee and donuts will be served.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a

county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.

Zone three of the district includes all of the Northwest 1/4 of Yoakum County excluding a square six miles by six miles on the Southeast corner.

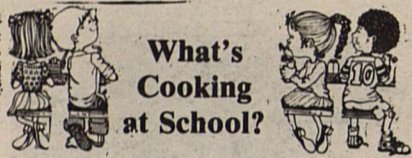
Cowboys Win At Odessa Meet

The Cowgirls traveled to Seminole this weekend for a dual match with the Maidens and Lamesa. They will host Denver City, Tuesday, Oct. 8.

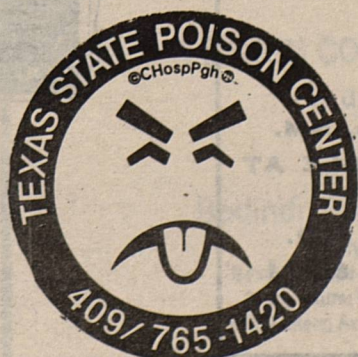

Jason Smith intercepted a first quarter pass and returned it to the 10 yard line where Brian Wilson took over with a toss to Justin Stowe for the first score of the game. Wilson ran the ball for the two point conversion.

With 30 seconds remaining in the quarter, Wilson again connected with Smith for pay dirt. Extra point try failed.

Bovina came roaring to life in the second quarter when Cory Kirkpatrick put the Mustangs on the scoreboard. Isabel Marruso scampered 54 yards for their next TD. Score at halftime was 14-12.

In the third period, Wilson again put the Cowboys on the scoreboard with a one yard quarterback sneak. Sterling Lovelace carried for two points and the score was 22-12, favor of the Cowboys.

Marruso escaped Cowboy defenders late in the third quarter and ran 81 yards for a TD. Kick was good.

Taking over on the 35 yard line following a Bovina punt, David Bitolas carried twice for eight yards. He then rushed to the 20 and a first down. Bernal threw to Brad McMinn for the first TD. A pass to Scotty Rains was good for two points.

Ladd Winn kicked off to the Mustangs who were once more forced to punt. Shannon Ward took the ball on the Plains 30. Bernal passed to Ward for 12 more and then threw a 58 yard pass to Rains for a Cowboy TD. Extra point try failed.

As the first quarter ended, the Cowboys again scored on a pass from Bernal to Ward. The PAT by Winn was good.
