Democrats Choose Delegates To Attend State Convention

Delegates to the Yoakum County Democratic Party convention met Saturday, March 28 at Johnnie's Restaurant in Plains.

Jim Barron served as Chair of the meeting and Linda Lowrey served as Secretary.

Elected to represent the county at the State Democratic Convention in Houston on June 5-6 as delegates were Linda Shoemaker Lowrey and Billy Ray Moore. Ms. Lowrey is the Criminal District Attorney and Mr. Moore, a Denver City businessman, is a member of the Denver City I.S.D. School Board and the Yoakum County Appraisal District Board.

Alternates elected were Johnnie Fitzgerald and Ty Earl Powell.

Fitzgerald represented Precinct 4 as Commissioner for many years. Powell chairs the Yoakum County Democratic Party.

A resolution was passed which acknowledged the need for a more streamlined Constitution in Texas, but not at the expense of voter control. Specifically, the Democrats oppose term limitations and the appointment of county officer holders. The delegates to the convention believe such decisions should remain with the voters.

A second resolution calls for a common sense approach to landfill regulations with variances being allowed for differences in geography and ground water levels.

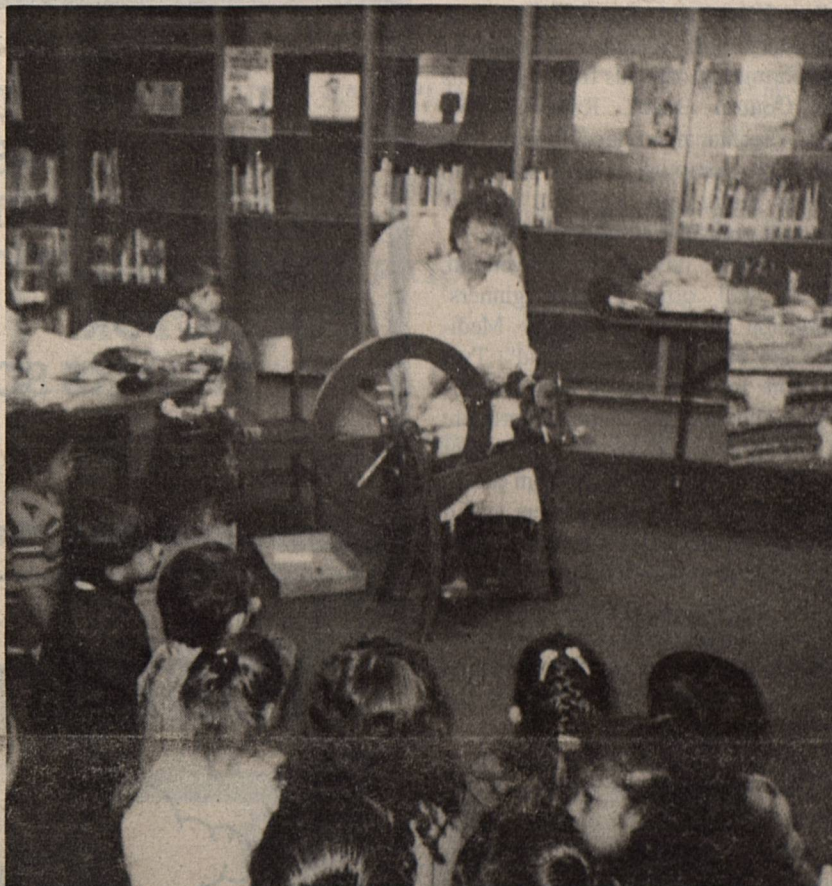

Roping Event To Benefit American Cancer Society

One of the richest team roping events in the Midwest will be held at AKSARBEN in Omaha, May 2-3 and will be televised by ESPN as 200 teams vying for \$100,000 in prize money.

The Midwest Horsemen's Association, Budweiser and a number of prominent Corporations are sponsoring the first annual "Rope-A-Thon", "Cowboys Roping for the Cure of Cancer", to benefit the American Cancer Society.

Cotton Ginners Association Plans 85th Annual Convention

Texas Cotton Ginners' Association (TCGA) plans to bring more than 5,000 people to Lubbock April 9-11 for its 85th Annual Cotton Trade Show and Convention.

"Our association has focused the majority of its attention on safety and environmental concerns this year and our convention reflects it," said Gene Beck, TCGA president.

The second day of the convention will feature a ginners' workshop entitled "Complying with Texas Air Pollution Laws and Regulations." The workshop will include enforcement and permitting officials from the Texas Air Control Board. Kelley Green, TCGA technical services director, will speak on compliance with state and federal regulations and will present ideas on good community relations.

The final day of the convention, TCGA will offer another ginners' workshop entitled, "Emergency Medical Care of the Mangled Hand". Two surgeons from the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center department of orthopaedic surgery plan to present a slide show with pictures from actual gin accidents. They will present useful information on how to deal with emergencies that involve hand injuries.

A similar seminar was held in February in Lubbock. CNA Insurance Companies, Broussard, Bush and Hurst of Texas and TCGA sponsored the event.

"Since Texas is such a large state, seminars like this one are usually regional. We were really impressed with the presentation given by Texas Tech's medical school. So, we invited them to our convention to let them give their presentation to our entire membership," said Tony Williams, TCGA executive vice president.

Environmental issues top the agenda of almost all industrial associations and the cotton gin industry is no

exception. This year's speaker, Charles G. Scruggs of Austin, has entitled his presentation "The Mind Manipulators - The Environmentalists and Bizarre-Loving Urban Media".

"After a disappointing 1991 season for some ginners, we have planned a convention that is looking to the positive side of the upcoming season," said Beck.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service's program will focus on how

to control some of the problems which plagued last year's crop. Some of the topics covered will be aphids and other insects, irrigation schedules, fertilization and limited tillage.

TCGA is sponsoring a tour of the American Cotton Growers Denim Mill in Littlefield for the ladies. The tour will take them through each process from the opening of the bale to the weaving and inspection.

The convention would not be complete without the fashion show,

though. This year's fashion show is labeled, "Cotton: The Magic for the

Spring," and will feature Courtney Stewart, National Maid of Cotton.

The gin show this year will have the Lubbock Civic Center packed from wall to wall.

"Every booth space is full and we have quite a waiting list to get in the show. We hope we can alleviate that next year. Every year our show and convention grows," said Williams.

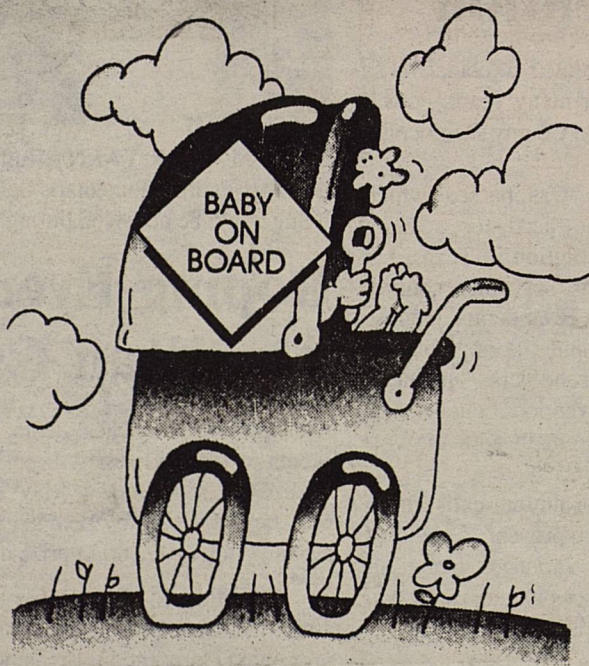

Whisenant gave a report on the last Federation meeting. All events

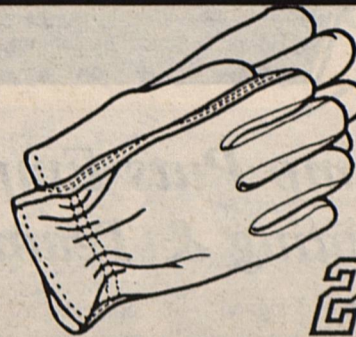
planned for the coming year were discussed.

ELECTRICITY — Handle With Care



Faulty wiring or malfunctioning electrical appliances are major causes of residential fires. About 35 percent of electrically caused fires are related to cooking equipment; 30 percent to components of the electrical distribution system including lighting equipment and cords; and about 20 percent to appliances such as clothes dryers, TVs and electric blankets. The remainder are associated with heating equipment.

TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS

1. Read the instructions or use and care manual before operating any electrical product and follow the recommendations.
2. Check the electrical cords and extension cords regularly for signs of damage. Repair and replace any cord which is pinched, cracked, frayed, or worn. Cords should not be run under rugs.
3. Check the fuse or circuit breaker boxes to be certain that the fuses or circuit breakers are the proper size for the house wiring.
4. Watch for trouble signs such as flickering lights, sparks from appliances, switches, or wall outlets, circuits that do not work, and switch plates and wall outlets that are warm to the touch. If any of these conditions are found, have them repaired immediately.
5. Do not use any appliance that is defective.
6. Do not leave appliances such as laundry equipment or dishwashers running when you are away from home. They could malfunction and cause a fire.
7. Overloading extension cords can cause fires. Most extension cords are not able to carry as much current as the normal house circuit without overheating so know the rating of an extension cord before you use it.

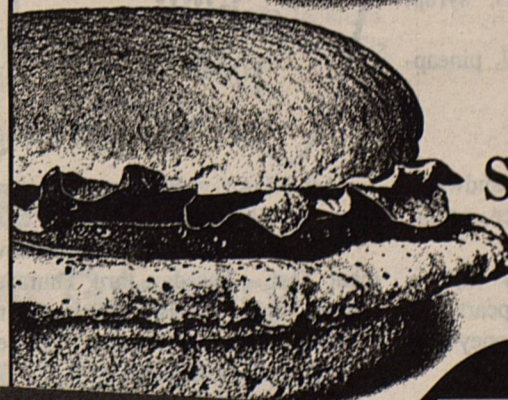

New Camp Puts Emphasis On Shooting & Team Play

A new camp designed to strengthen shooting and team play will be offered in June at South Plains College.

The first Lady Texan Shooting and Team Camp will be held June 4-6 at Texan Dome.

The camp, open to high school age girls, will stress shooting, with emphasis on shooting drills and shooting

contests, as well as team tournament play. Each camp participant will play approximately 10 games during the three day event.

"It's a unique concept," South Plains College women's basketball coach Lyndon Hardin said, "because it's something nobody has in this area."

"We play tournament games and give them a lot of playing time. The

rest of the time we spend on shooting."

The camp staff will include Cheryl Watson, the assistant women's basketball coach at SPC, several area high school coaches and Hardin, who recently completed his ninth season at the SPC helm.

The cost of the camp is \$75, with the fee to cover the cost of instruction, insurance, awards, meals, housing and a t-shirt for each participant.

Camp applications should be returned as soon as possible, as only the first 80 applicants will be accepted. A \$50 deposit should be returned with the camp application, and the remaining balance of \$25 will be due at the time of registration. The deposit is non-refundable after May 15.

Registration will begin at 1 p.m.

on June 4 in Gillespie Hall on the SPC campus.

"We'll work on the fundamentals of shooting," Hardin said, "the set shot, the jump shot. We're not going to make them a great shooter in three days, but we'll give them some things to work on."

"We feel that we can help them with shooting problems. We stress shooting, but they're going to play a lot of games, too. They're also going to learn the team concept."

Track Results

Illness and injuries left their marks on the Cowgirls showing Saturday in the Roughneck Relays in Sundown. Only 30 points were earned.

Rhonda Cowart won first place in the 400 meter run with a 64.5 performance.

Ogla Ramirez placed second in the 1600 meter run with 6:13 and second in the 3200 meter run with 13:49.

Kemi Cobb placed fourth in the 100 meter hurdles with 18:54.

Competing in the San Angelo Relays, the Cowboys finished seventh with 31 points despite good showing in Class A competition, where they outscored all opponents.

Twenty-nine teams competed in the meet.

Jason Smith set a school record with a 49.89 time in the 400 run. Michael Sainz ran the second fastest 800 in school history, finishing back of his state performance last year.

David Corrales had two full days of running. In the pre-lims, Corrales won the 3200 with 10:33.9 and was second in the 1600 with 4:51.6. In the finals, he placed sixth with 10:33.8 in the 3200 and fourth in the 1600 with 4:43.9.

Sterling Lovelace, Smith, Junior Lira and Sainz ran the 1600 meter relay in 3:28.67, third fastest time in PHS history.

Other competitors were Joe Valdez, 10:51 and 10:48 in the 3200; Ralph Coronel, 11:02 in the 3200, missing the finals by one place; Lenny Morrow, 2:07.9 and 2:08.1 in the 800; Ken McAdams, missing the finals by two places; Lira, leading his heat in the 300 hurdles before falling on the last hurdle; Stoney Garland, personal best with 41' in the shot and 129'4" in the discus.

The 400 relay had a big lead when the last hand off cost them the finals.

SPC Accepting Camp Applications

Applications are now being accepted for Texan Basketball Camp with two one-week sessions to be held at South Plains College in June and July.

The camp, under the direction of South Plains College men's basketball coach Ron Mayberry, will be held June 14-18 and July 26-30.

"I think our camp has grown and grown," Mayberry said. "But at the same time, it has stayed consistent in that we're the least expensive and we're people oriented."

The purpose of the camp is to provide an opportunity for boys and young men to improve their basketball skills in a fun environment. The fundamentals of basketball are stressed, with sportsmanship, team play and self-confidence emphasized as well.

"We stress fundamentals, team basketball and individual attention," Mayberry said. "The kids have a good time."

"It's a learning camp. They can learn something about basketball, and they can also have fun. That's the key."

The camp, open to boys in third grade through high school, will be held in Texan Dome on the SPC campus. Other facilities for use by the campers are an indoor swimming pool, indoor racquetball courts and tennis courts. In addition, campers also may spend time at the SPC Student Center, which features a video arcade, pool and ping-pong tables and a giant screen television.

Camp participants may commute daily from their homes or spend the week on campus in a college residence hall.

The cost of the camp is \$180 for overnight campers, \$150 for day campers who eat in Texan Hall and \$95 for day campers who do not eat in the dining hall. Campers who do not plan to eat in the dining hall are requested to bring a sack lunch.

Special discounts are available for families wishing to send more than one child to the camp.

Included in the camp fee is instruction, insurance, awards and entertainment, as well as a camp report card, certificates, a t-shirt, official camp photo and a basketball for each participant.

The camp schedule will include ball handling, dribbling, passing and shooting drills, various contests and game situations.

Mayberry, who recently completed his seventh season at SPC by guiding the Texans to their first-ever appearance at the NJCAA national tournament, is one of few American coaches ever to be invited to direct a basketball camp and clinic for boys and coaches in the Grande Canary Islands in Spain.

Camp applications will be accepted as they are received and should be returned as soon as possible. A \$50 deposit should be sent with the application, and the remaining balance will be due at the time of registration.

The deposit is non-refundable after May 20 and July 5. A \$15 charge will be made on all refunds.

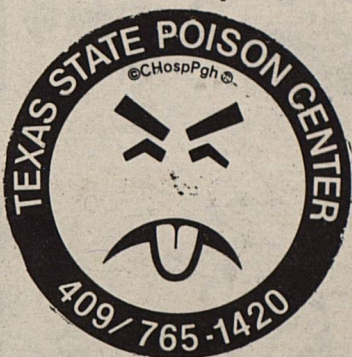

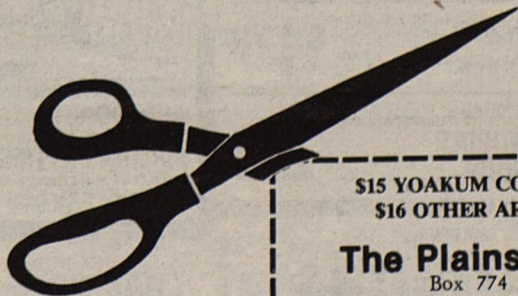
