County Art Association Holds Reception For Wyatts

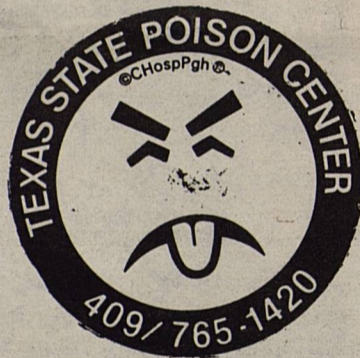

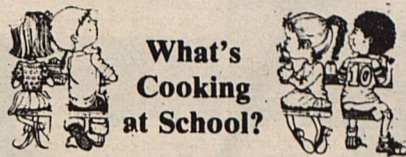

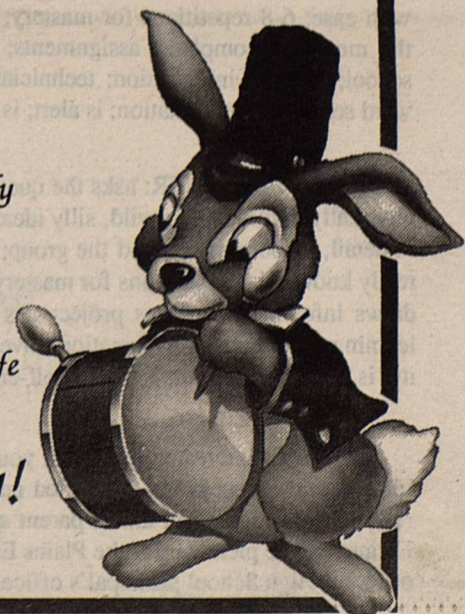

PLAINS GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM BY BRENDA CANADA

The Plains Gifted and Talented Program is designed to meet the special and differentiated educational opportunities above those of the regular curriculum. This program shall provide an educational environment which encourages the development of critical thinking, investigative skills, indepth analysis of ideas, higher level thinking processes, and personal responsibility for self-learning. While the Plains Gifted and Talented Program is designed to meet the unique needs of the gifted and talented student, it shall appropriately reinforce and be compatible with other programs in the school district.

The Texas Education Code 21.651 defines a gifted and talented student as the following: "A student who by virtue of outstanding mental abilities, is capable of high performance. The student may demonstrate, singly or in combination, above-average achievement or potential in such areas as creative and productive thinking, and leadership ability. The phrase does not include students who demonstrate above-average achievement or potential in areas relating to physical abilities."

ELEMENTARY PROGRAM KINDERGARTEN-FIRST GRADE

Kindergarten and first grade students will need to be carefully evaluated throughout the year. All kindergarten and first grade students will be considered as potentially gifted/talented students.

Listed below are a few of the well-known characteristics of gifted/talented children in the grades K-1 which you might review to see how many best describe your child. Please think of these behaviors in comparison to other children of the same age.

likes to read; can read; advanced vocabulary; inquisitive--asks unusual questions; playful/dramatic; understands complex math concepts; independent; learns easily; collects things; organizes; mentally advanced for age; original/inventive in ideas; interested in adult issues.

SECOND-FOURTH GRADES

Students will be pulled out of their regular classes for a 30 minute per day Gifted and Talented Class.

MIDDLE SCHOOL PROGRAM

Students admitted in the Gifted and Talented Program may take the Gifted and Talented class scheduled.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

Students will be given an opportunity to sign up for the Gifted and Talented Class as an elective. These classes are open to all students in high school on a voluntary basis. This class will be weighed the same as other honors classes.

Characteristics of a bright child and a gifted learner are listed below:

BRIGHT CHILD: knows the answers; is interested; is attentive; has good ideas; works hard; answers the questions; top group; listens with interest; learns with ease; 6-8 repetitions for mastery; understands ideas; enjoys peers; grasps the meaning; completes assignments; is receptive; copies accurately; enjoys school; absorbs information; technician; good memorizer; enjoys straightforward sequential presentation; is alert; is pleased with own learning.

GIFTED LEARNER: asks the questions; is highly curious; is mentally and physically involved; has wild, silly ideas; plays around, yet tests well; discusses in detail, elaborates; beyond the group; shows strong feelings and opinions; already knows; 1-2 repetitions for mastery; constructs abstractions; prefers adults; draws inferences; initiates projects; is intense; creates a new design; enjoys learning; manipulates information; inventor; good guesser; thrives on complexity; is keenly observant; is highly self-critical.

If you are interested in having your child nominated for the screening and identification process for the Gifted and Talented Program, please fill out and return nomination form and a parent questionnaire by Friday, April 24, 1992. Forms may be picked up at the Plains Elementary School, Plains Middle School, or Plains High School principal's office.

Kindergarten Registration To Be Held April 28-29

Plains Independent School District will hold kindergarten registration on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 28-29, 1992. If you have a child who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1992, please bring them to register on one of these days.

If you know of a child in our community who will be five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1992, please pass this information on to them. It is very important that we know how many children will be in our kindergarten

classes for 1992-93 so that we may properly plan for the school year.

You may register your child between 8:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. on either day. It is not necessary for children to be present for registration. Each child who registers will be required to present a birth certificate, immunization record and social security number.

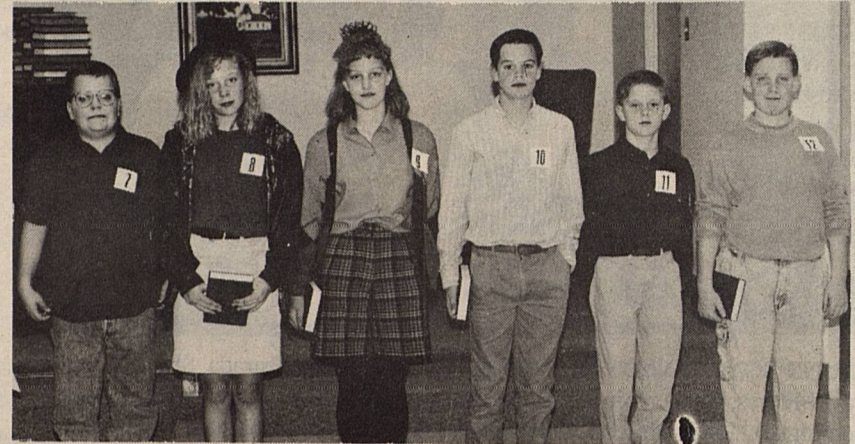
