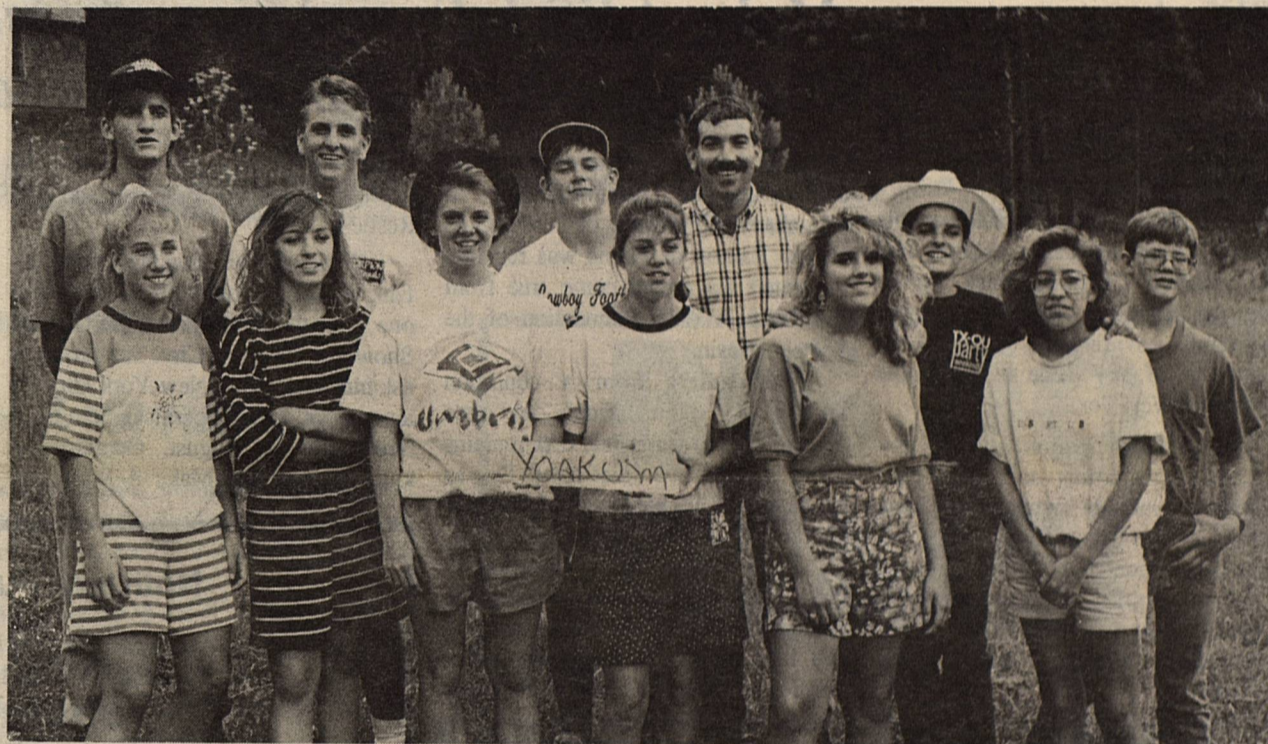

## U.S. Senator Phil Gramm Announces Availability Of Emergency Farm Loans

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced that farmers in 30 Texas Counties are eligible to apply for low-interest emergency loans to help recover from crop losses brought on by extreme weather conditions throughout 1991.

Four counties have been named as primary counties due to freeze which occurred between Oct. 1 and Nov. 30, 1991. They are Baylor, Hall, Parmer and Wichita Counties.

Cochran, Lamb and King Counties were also named as primary counties due to drought, hail, flood and freeze which occurred between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 1991.

For those who cannot obtain credit through normal channels, the U.S. Farmers Home Administration will make loans available at below-market interest rates to family farmers. Terry and Yoakum.

Gramm said all 30 counties have eight months to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses.

In addition to the above counties, 22 other Texas counties have been named as contiguous counties and

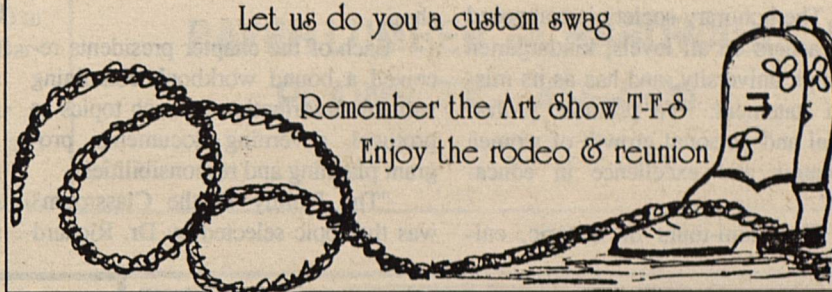

## Delta Kappa Gamma Members Hold 63rd Annual Convention

Some 1200 women educators from all parts of the state met in Waco June 18-20 for the 63rd annual convention of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. J'Ann Payne Aman served as convention chairman along with co-chairman Charlotte Carpenter and Dr. Vicki Gilliam, all of Waco.

Linda Harris and Myrle Duncan represented Gamma Lambda Chapter, which is comprised of women teachers from Plains, Denver City, Seagraves and Seminole.

The Hilton Hotel served as convention headquarters and registration, general and executive sessions, and workshops took place in the Waco Convention Center.

The honorary society is composed of teachers on all levels, kindergarten through university, and has as its mission statement: "To promote professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education".

Five mini-tours of historic, cul-

tural and scenic attractions in Waco introduced the visitors to the Waco area on the morning of June 18. An afternoon workshop session for members featured the theme of communicating a positive image while a second workshop conducted by former Dean of the Texas House L. DeWitt Hale trained members from the 17 areas in legislation.

During the same time period, the 302 newly-elected chapter presidents participated in a leadership development workshop designed to ease them into their two-year leadership responsibilities. Joyce Packard of Waco and Dr. Mary Ann Waldon of League City served as co-chairmen of the workshop.

Each of the chapter presidents received a bound workbook containing valuable information on such topics as protocol, governing documents, program planning and responsibilities.

"The Family in the Classroom" was the topic selected by Dr. Richard

D. Grant Jr., noted psychologist from Austin. The "hands on" presentation dealt with the dysfunctional family, which affects the behavior of the child, and suggested practical techniques to use in the classroom.

A tribute to past state presidents followed the presentation, along with a reception and autograph party during which time members obtained signatures in the newly released book on the past state presidents of Texas. Exhibits included chapter projects, yearbooks, newsletters and videos of chapter histories.

Texas president, Ruth Johnson of Dallas, conducted the executive board meeting on Friday morning, at which time Patricia Bray, international first vice president of Tallulah, La. brought greetings from the international organization.

Board members discussed the budget, voted on various recommendations, conducted state business and accepted invitations for future conventions.

At the same time, members attended one of a selection of nine special interest workshops covering such topics as gender equity, developing

creative and critical thinking skills, suicide and crisis intervention, literacy, AIDS, retirement, site-based management, financial planning, and educational issues in the State Legislature.

The birthday luncheon honored state honorary members and 50-year members, honors chapters, 5-star newsletters, scholarship recipients and members who published articles during the year. State newspapers received certificates for publication of educational news and of news of the society.

Two members received the state achievement award. They are J'Ann Payne Aman of Waco and Betty Roberts of San Angelo. A parliamentary procedure and model meeting highlighted Friday evening, followed by a reception for first time attenders.

A memorial service on Saturday morning honored the memory of several hundred members who have died since the last convention. The service took place in the First Baptist Church sanctuary and featured the State Chorus, composed of some 75 voices.

Following the general session, members enjoyed a sack lunch and participated in a variety of program

...Continued from Page 4 and other committee workshops followed by planning meetings of the 17 areas and their chapter presidents.

The convention closed on Saturday night with a formal dinner honoring the chapter, state and international presidents and the 12 original founders.

The international society of women educators was started in Austin on May 11, 1929 when Dr. Annie Webb Blanton invited 11 other teachers from all over Texas to join the new educational society for women.

From the nucleus of a dozen members in Texas, the organization has grown to some 19,000 members in Texas and over 175,000 members in 3,100 chapters throughout each of the United States and seven provinces of Canada, as well as Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland, Great Britain, The Netherlands, Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Costa Rica and Puerto Rico.

In March of this year Germany became the 14th member nation. These newest members of the society include five charter members from the area previously known as East Germany.

Representatives of the Germany state organization will participate in their first international convention in Louisville, Ky. in late July with several thousand members from all state organizations expected to attend.

One of the main thrusts of this honorary society is the awarding of scholarships to members for additional degrees and of world fellowships to teachers in non-member countries.

The headquarters of the international organization is in Austin, and area chapters there will host the convention in 1993.

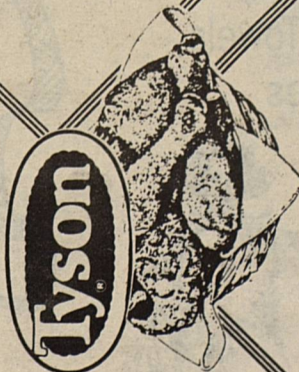

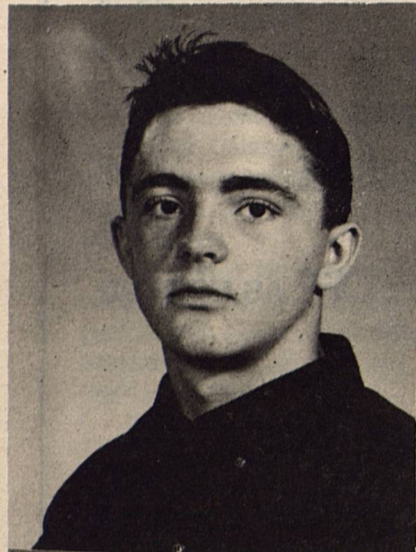

### PHS Junior Among Top 30

Ace Williams, son of Walter and Nita Buchanan; and Don Williams of Hart recently attended the Jay Novacek Football Camp at East Texas State.

Instruction and programs were presented by 21 of the Dallas Cowboys, including Emmitt Smith, Troy Aikman and Jay Novacek. Also coaches from several colleges were instructors.

Williams was listed among the top 30 players out of approximately 80 attending. A non-contact scrimmage concluded the week long camp. Playing fullback and outside linebacker, Williams' team won four touchdowns to one.

### A Penny Saved

Belt-tightening by The University of Texas System has saved \$214 million in the last five years!

When the Higher Education Coordinating Board asked public universities how they have increased efficiency and saved taxpayers' money, U.T. System Chancellor Hans Mark told the System's 15 component institutions to sharpen their pencils.

They did. From 1987 to 1992, while enrollments were growing 12.4% and legislative appropriations remained relatively flat or declined, the cost-cutting helped the U.T. System bridge the chasm of trying to serve more students with less money.

Chancellor Mark said that saving millions through more efficient administration, automation, energy conservation and other devices wasn't the System's only contribution to helping solve the state's budgetary problems.

Pioneering efforts in winning funds under the Federal Disproportionate Share Medicaid Program enhanced Texas general revenues by \$435 million!

### Progress Report

School dropouts in Texas are steadily declining.

Of the 1.37 million students enrolled in grades 7 through 12 last year, only 53,965 quit classes. That's a rate of only 3.9%.

### Selling Point

El Paso has still another reason to sell itself as a tourist mecca and retirement center.

It seems that living in the Sun Bowl City -- or even visiting there -- may be a cure for stress.

Researchers at The University of Texas at El Paso have discovered that the city's water supply contains surprising amounts of lithium -- a metallic salt used to treat manic-depressive patients.

Scientists think this may be why the city has one of the lowest rates of admissions to mental hospitals in the United States.

### Air Apparent

Is it possible that Texans may one day brag that the world's first successful "flying saucer" was designed and built in Texas?

Doug Hance, Jr., an aerospace researcher at The University of Texas at Arlington, thinks so. He is at work on a design that he believes will make helicopters and other tilt-rotor vehicles as outmoded as a DC-3 airplane.

Hance, a U.T. Arlington honor graduate in engineering, built his first model airplane when he was four years old and has never stopped. He dislikes referring to his project as a "flying saucer", terming it a "lenticular aerodyne".

He described it this way to a reporter from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram: "Its round, lens-shaped outlines make it a wing in all directions. It wouldn't have to bank to make turns. It could change directions at nearly right angles. It could stop, hover, drop or go backwards in an instant."

When will he have a working model? Maybe in two years - if he can get the necessary funding.

### News on Education...

#### Child's Play

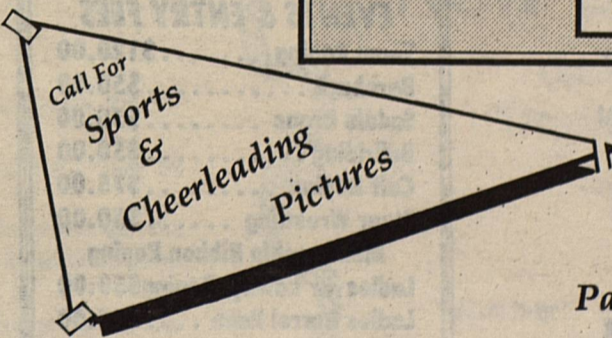
