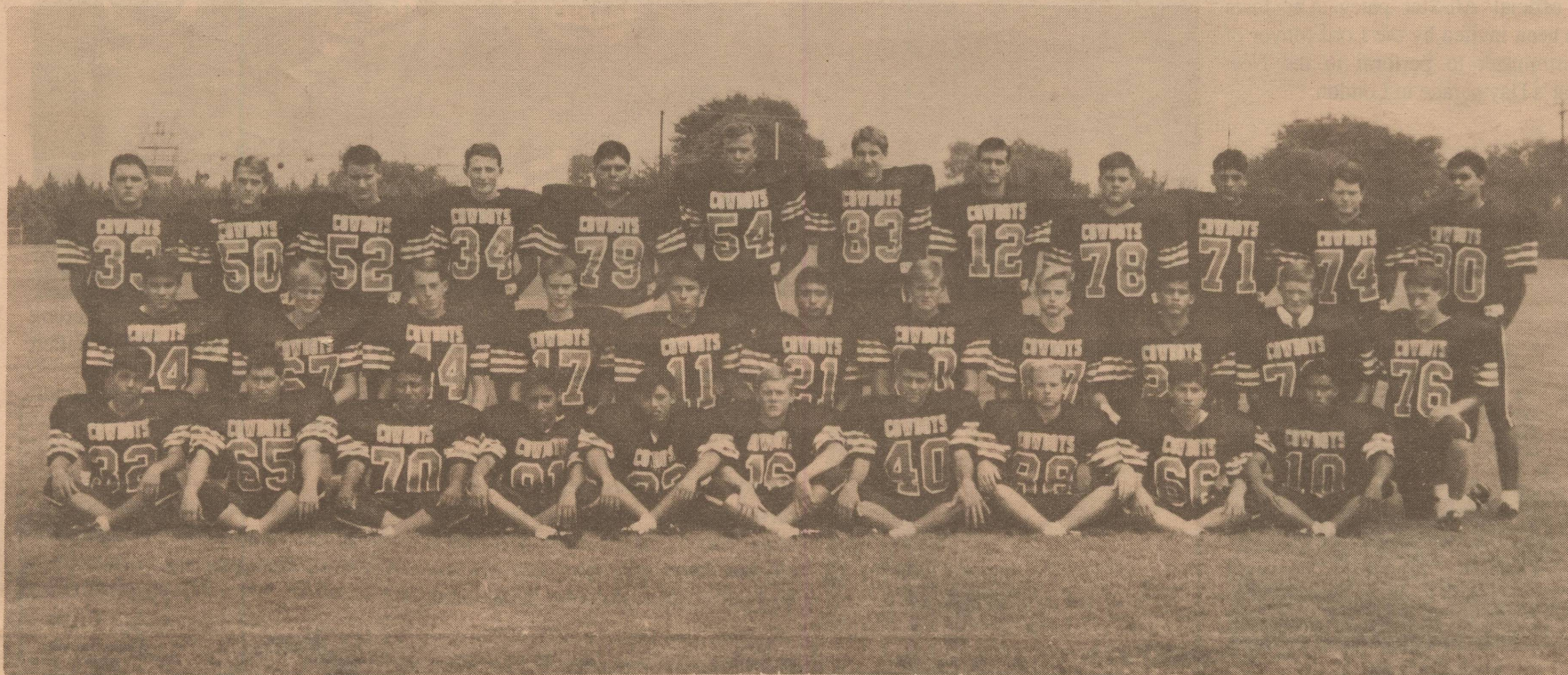

## Farm Tour Planned

The Yoakum County Farm Tour will be held in Plains on Tuesday, Sept. 22. The tour will begin from Stanford Park at 8:15 a.m. and conclude at 11:30 a.m.

The tour will include many areas of agriculture such as cotton, grain sorghum, peanut and vegetable production as well as conservation practices and water quality.

A barbecue lunch will be served at 12:15 p.m. for those attending the tour. The recipients of the Farmer of the Year and Young Farmer of the Year Awards will be announced just before the noon meal.

A Farm and Trade Show will again be a part of this year's activities. Numerous booths will be available for those interested in farm supplies and farm equipment; also informational booths and exhibits will be set up at the park.

In conjunction with the Farm Tour, the Yoakum County Young Farmers will host a Jackpot Trap Shoot at the shooting range west of town at approximately 2 p.m.

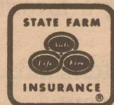

### NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 8,321 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 7,319 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$ .901 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Plains I.S.D. School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .237 that will provide \$ 8,232 per student in state and local revenues.

heart-shaped satellite cakes. Presiding were Brenda Snyder, Jeanette White and Cindy White.

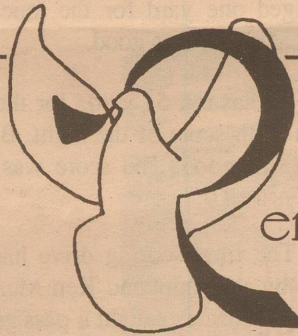
Teal bows decorated the groom's table which offered chocolate cake and coffee. Presiding were Sonja and Cindy McElroy.

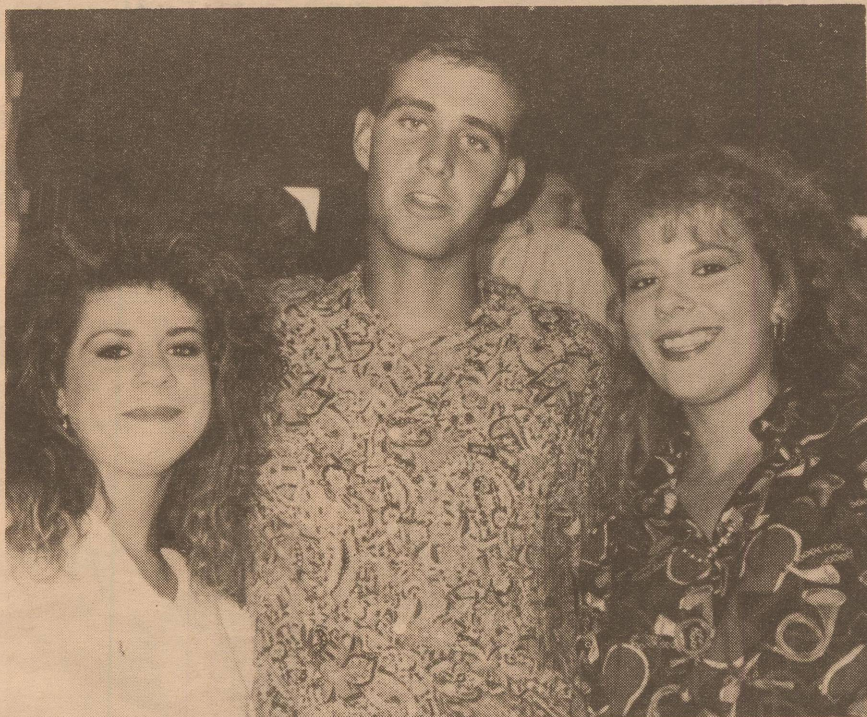

### Junior Varsity Opens With 34-14 Victory

Plains Junior Varsity opened their season with a 36-14 victory over the Farwell Junior Varsity Steers.

They took on the Morton JV on Thursday, Sept. 10.

Morton scored on the opening kickoff. The extra point try failed.

After holding Plains on downs, they took over again and scored on this drive also. The PAT again failed.

The Cowboys took the ball and made good yardage only to lose the ball on a fumble.

After turning the ball over to Morton, Pete Flores intercepted a Morton pass. He carried the ball 25 yards to the Morton 35. The Cowboys moved the ball to within the one yard line only to run out of time in the first half.

Plains opened the second half kicking off to Morton. They moved the ball well until the Cowboy defense stiffened and took over the ball on downs.

Plains moved down the field well on runs by Eric Ramos, a pass to Pete Flores and a reverse run by Lance Cole brought the Cowboys to the 26. Morton stopped this drive with an interception at the five yard line.

The Cowboys were again able to stop the Indians on downs. Flores ran the ball for 21 yards; Ramos took the ball for a first down to the 38 yard line; and Cole carried to the 46 yard line. Ramos continued to move the ball to the 20, then to the one yard line. Chase Clanahan carried the ball into the end zone on a quarterback sneak with ten seconds left in the game.

The conversion try failed. Final score was Morton 12, Plains 6.

### Cowboys Hammer Farwell 40-0

The Plains Cowboys opened the '92 season with a convincing win over the Farwell Steers.

On their first possession the Cowboys moved the ball with good runs by Jose Ramirez and Ace Williams. Shannon Ward ran for a 22 yard gain, then David Bitolas carried the ball in from the one for the first TD. Victor Bernal kicked the extra point.

The Cowboys took over on their own 31 yard line. Ward took a pass from Brian Wilson into the end zone on the first play of the drive. The PAT was no good.

Plains began their next scoring drive with a 22 yard pass from Wilson to Brad McMinn. Williams carried for one yard. McMinn caught another pass good for 17 yards. Ramirez ran the ball in for the TD from the eight yard line. The kick failed.

The halftime score was Plains 19, Farwell 0.

On their second possession of the third quarter, the Cowboys mounted another scoring drive. Williams carried for 18 yards. Bitolas had runs of nine and eight yards, then carried the ball into the end zone from the three yard line. Bernal's extra point was good.

Scotty Rains started the next drive with a 17 yard catch from Bernal. Bernal carried twice for three and five yards. Junior Lira ran for six, then plunged one yard for the touchdown. Bernal's kick was good.

Bitolas ran 54 yards for the Cowboys sixth score of the night. Bernal's kick was good. The score was Plains 40, Farwell 0.

The final scoring drive had good runs by Williams and Ken McAdams. Ricky Gonzales caught a pass good for 27 yards. Bernal carried the ball in on a quarterback sneak for the TD. His kick was also good. The final score stood Plains 47, Farwell 0.

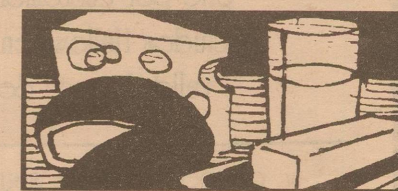
Offensively, Plains had a total of 345 yards.

Wilson threw seven times with three completions for 70 yards. Bernal threw two completions for 46 yards.

McMinn caught two passes for 39 yards; Ward one for 31 yards; Gonzales one for 27 yards; and Rains one for 19 yards.

Bitolas ran 11 times for 94 yards; Ramirez, 13 for 63; Williams, seven for 35; and Ward, two for 22.

Defensively, the Cowboys held the Steers to 91 total yards. Junior Lira and Dan Partin each had an interception and Michael Salas recovered a fumble. Ramirez was the leading tackle and McAdams followed.

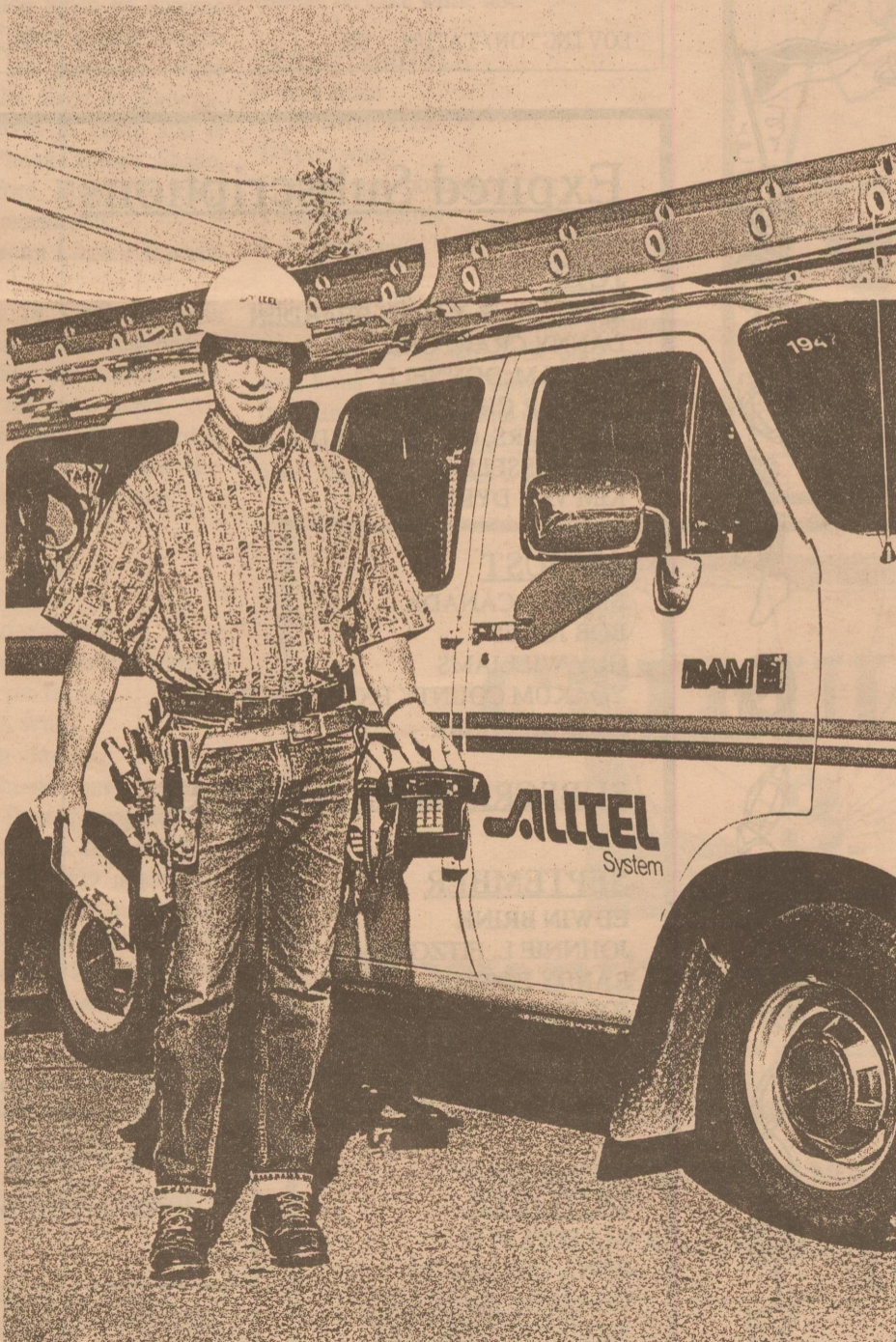

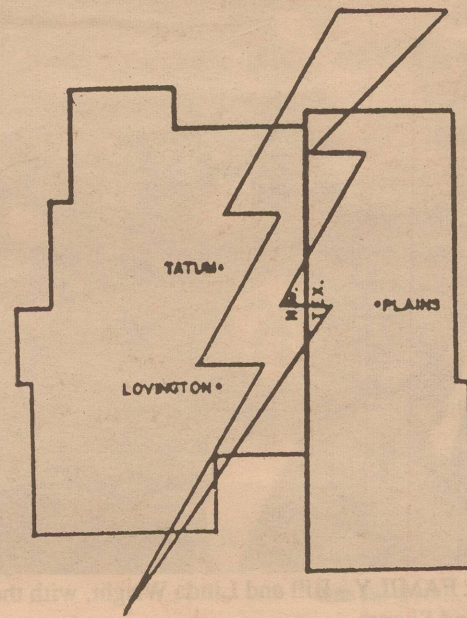

## Kitchen Korner



MRS. BILL WRIGHT

Family favorite recipes are shared this week with Plains Pride cooks by an "almost newcomer", Linda (Mrs. Bill) Wright.

Linda and her family moved to Plains from Gordon when he became the new pastor of First Baptist Church in March. They are parents of three children. Greg, 26, lives in Canyon. Laura Kay, 23, lives at home and is attending South Plains College. Shane, 21, lives in Hereford. Both boys manage Dairy Queen restaurants.

Crafts are among Linda's favorite hobbies.

While living in Gordon, Linda worked as secretary for the superintendent of schools. She did Braille work for a youngster for nine years. Although they were residents of Gordon for 15 years, Mrs. Wright says she "really has enjoyed living in Plains".

2 cups sugar  
2 cups flour  
In medium size sauce pan, bring to boil:  
1 stick oleo  
1/2 cup Crisco Oil  
4 Tablespoons cocoa  
1 cup water  
Pour sauce pan ingredients over flour and sugar mixture and stir well. Then, add:  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
2 eggs, slightly beaten  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Mix well and pour into greased pan. Bake 25 minutes at 375 degrees.

ICING  
(Start making icing five minutes before cake is done.)

In a sauce pan, melt  
1 stick oleo  
4 Tablespoons cocoa  
6 Tablespoons milk  
Bring to a boil. Remove from heat and add:  
1 box powdered sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup chopped pecans  
Spread on cake while hot.

PEANUT BRITTLE  
2 cups sugar  
1 cup white Karo  
1/2 cup water  
1 1/2 cup raw peanuts  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 teaspoon soda

Cook sugar, Karo and water in skillet until it spins a thread. Do not stir. Add peanuts and cook until mixture turns a golden brown. Remove from fire and add vanilla and soda. Stir thoroughly and pour into buttered pans. Break into pieces when cool.

### PUNCH BOWL CAKE

1 box yellow cake mix  
1 large can crushed pineapple  
1 large package instant vanilla pudding  
1 large can cherry pie filling  
1 large carton Cool Whip

Bake cake as directed; let cool. Break cake into chunks; put in bottom of punch bowl. Pour pineapple, including juice, over cake. Mix pudding as directed and pour over pineapple. Next cover all with cherry pie filling. Cover with Cool Whip. Do not stir. May top with coconut and pecans if desired. Serve with spoon. "It's easy and beautiful!"

### CARAMEL CORN

2 or 3 quarts of popped corn  
1 1/3 c pecans  
2/3 cup slivered almonds (blanched)  
1 1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup oleo  
1/2 cup white Karo

Combine sugar, butter and Karo. Bring to a boil until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Mix corn and nuts in large pan, pour syrup over and mix until coated. Spread on cookie sheet to dry. Break apart and store in tightly covered container.

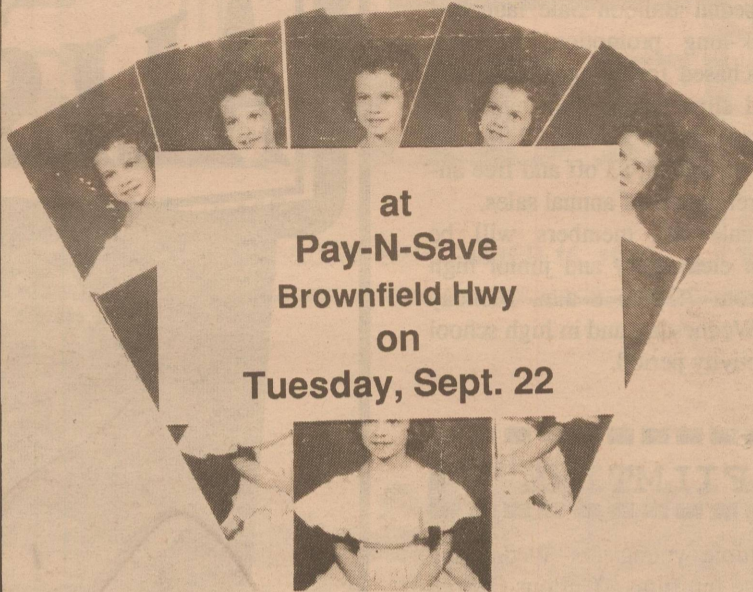

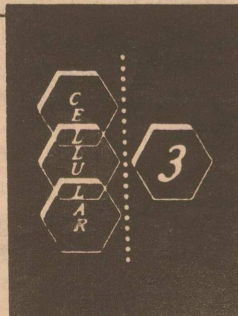
