## Cross Country Team Wins Another Meet

Plains Cowboys captured their third team victory of the season in the Frenship Cross Country Meet last weekend. David Corrales turned in a performance breaking his own and Michael Sainz's school record of 15:30. His first place finish was 15:14.

The Cowboys had five runners under the 17 minute mark for the first time in school history. Ralph Coronel, Lenny Morrow, Edward Escobar and Ricky Gonzales were under 16:53. Sainz ran a good race but was slowed by a sore knee.

Junior Varsity Cowboys turned in a good performance back of Ken McAdams and Jason Robertson.

Individual performances for the Cowboys included Corrales, 15:14; Coronel, 10th, 16:21; Morrow, 12th, 16:33; Escobar, 13th, 16:43; Gonzales, 15th, 16:52 and Sainz, 17th, 17:12.

Team scoring included Plains, 51 points; Brownfield, 60; Abernathy, 91; Levelland, 94; Frenship, 130; Slaton, 140; Springlake-Earth, 166; and Smyer, 175.

Junior Varsity scoring included McAdams, 9th, 18:27; Robertson, 11th, 18:51; Ralph Ramirez, 15th, 19:46; Jimmy Robertson, 16th, 20:09; Kirk Parrish, 17th, 20:42 and Gilbert Ortiz, 18th, 20:47. The team finished first with 65 points.

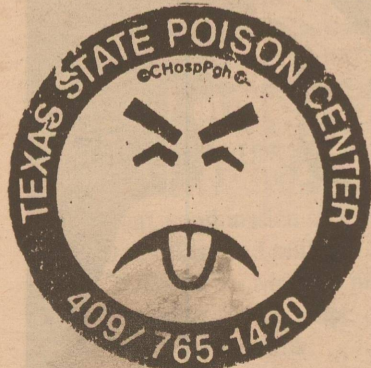

# Football

Plains met a swarm of Hornets in Sudan and though the Cowboys came very close to pulling off an upset, Sudan hung on for the win.

The Hornets opened the scoring on a run with 7:35 left in the first quarter. The PAT was good.

They scored again just after the beginning of the second quarter, on a 54 yard run. The kick was no good.

The Cowboys forced a break in their favor when Ken McAdams and Jose Ramirez dropped Sudan's punter on the 31 yard line after a bad snap. Ramirez carried to the 16. Victor Bernal's throw to Brad McMinn was good for 12 yards. David Bitolas reached the two, then Ramirez scored on the next play. The kick failed.

On the following kickoff Scotty Rains caused Sudan to fumble and Bitolas recovered the ball on the Sudan 25 yard line. Ramirez and Bitolas gained good yards for the Cowboys. Bernal then found McMinn in the end zone for the TD. Bernal's kick was good.

Halftime score was Plains 13, Sudan 13.

Sudan took advantage of a Cowboy fumble and drove 58 yards to

score. Faking the kick, they passed for the two point conversion.

With 2:18 left in the third quarter the Hornets added their final TD on a three yard run. The kick was good.

Getting the breeze behind them in the fourth quarter seemed to revive the Cowboys. Jr. Lira got five yards on a run. A toss to McMinn added 20. Bernal then connected with Shannon Ward who took the ball to the 25 yard line. A penalty on Sudan moved the ball to the 15. Ace Williams ran for two yards. Ramirez scored on the following play. The two point conversion was not successful.

Plains stopped Sudan cold on the next possession and after the punt started on their own 45. McMinn gained 10 yards on a pass. Bernal found Lenny Morrow on the next play good for 32 yards and taking the Cowboys to the five yard line. Ward caught the touchdown pass. The kick was good.

Plains got the ball back with less than a minute on the game clock. Time ran out on the Cowboys final possession. The score was Sudan 28, Plains 26.

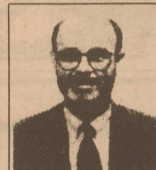
Offensively Ramirez rushed for 100 yards. Bernal completed ten of 19

Defensively, Stoney Garland, McMinn and Morrow led in tackles.

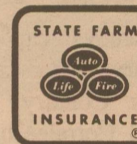

ABOVE GROUND PRECAUTIONS FOR

UNDERGROUND SERVICE

Transformers, junction boxes and meter pedestals for underground power lines are almost always installed above ground. Unless you are digging, trenching or drilling, you are not likely to come into contact with the buried conductor - except where it enters an aboveground enclosure.

AVOID UNWANTED CONTACT WITH UNDERGROUND POWER:

- Make sure that all transformer enclosures are kept locked - and alert your electric utility when they are not!
- Never allow children to play on or near enclosures or other electrical facilities.
- Don't allow garbage cans, junk or wood piles to be stacked on or near enclosures.
- Don't allow construction of fences or outbuilding to contact enclosures or to restrict access to them.
- Immediately report any damage to enclosure structures or foundations to your electric utility.
- Never assume that an enclosure is safe to touch - some damage may cause metal cabinets to become energized and dangerous.

CAUTION: Always call your electric utility before digging.
