Water District to call election

Collection to begin in Plains for steel cans & plastic recyclables

Beginning March 6, Yoakum County residents will be able to recycle plastic containers and steel cans. Collection bins will be located just south of the Precinct 4 county barn at the intersection of Highway 84 and 214; and in Denver City on the corner of 4th and Main Street.

The collection program is sponsored by Yoakum County Extension Homemakers Economics Committee with the cooperation of Teen Court, 4-H, and county and city governments, according to Joan Chandler, Yoakum County Extension Agent-HE.

What is a steel can? "Steel Can" is a new term for most people. But, they've been around all our lives. Steel cans are those food and beverage containers and other common household containers whose base metal is steel. They are usually called "tin" cans. More than 90 percent of food containers, including the large #10 cans (a mainstay in food service operations), are made of steel. Most metal juice containers are also made of steel.

Today, the American public uses approximately 100 million steel cans per day and they are 100 percent recyclable. During the 1980s, the steel industry recycled more than twice the amount of all other industries' materials combined.

Steel food and beverage cans are simple to prepare for recycling. Labels may be left on, however, removing the label is simple and may make rinsing the can easier. The cans do not have to be flattened or have the ends removed. Remember that the lid removed from a food can is also recyclable - just safely tuck it back inside the can.

The only preparation required is rinsing. Extra water need not be used for this. The cans may be placed in the dishwasher, or simply rinsed in the soapy water used in the sink for washing dishes.

What plastic containers will be recycled? Our plastic collection bins will be for plastics numbered "1" and "2". To help Texans identify plastics when sorting them for recycling, The Texas Legislature passed a law that requires coding of plastic containers and bottles. The identifying symbol consists of a number placed within a triangle of arrows.

Number "1" plastic, also identified as PETE, is commonly used for carbonated beverage bottles. Number "2" plastic, or HDPE, is used in containers for milk, juice and other liquids.

Plastic containers should also be rinsed following the method described for steel cans. Caps should be removed and thrown in the garbage. If possible, crush the plastic containers so that they occupy less space.

Plains will also have a bin for collecting aluminum cans. These should be rinsed also. The committee encourages residents of Denver City to continue using the Boy Scout aluminum collection bin or the other aluminum collection programs already in place.

Valeria especially enjoys making baby afghans. She's also made special afghans for her nieces and nephews, allowing each to select his or her favorite color and size.

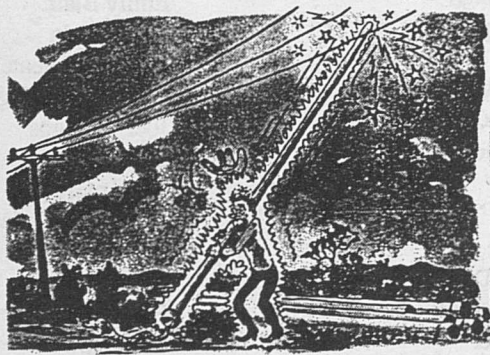

Letter To The Editor

This letter is prompted by the frenzy of recent suicide deaths in which the so-called Suicide Doctor, Jack Kevorkian, "assisted." As this is written, Kevorkian has been involved in three such deaths in five days, and each death was accompanied by widespread coverage in all the media.

The greatest danger in this saturation of media attention is that it may give terminally ill people the impression that Kevorkian's way is the only alternative to futile, expensive and often painful medical care. That is absolutely wrong.

For terminally ill patients and their families, there is another choice, and it is called hospice care. It is a form of care for the terminally ill that enables them to live fully and as pain-free as possible before they die, allowing them to spend their last days in dignity, making peace with themselves and their loved ones.

Hospice treats all the needs of such patients through a team that includes physicians, nurses, counselors, therapists, clergy, aides and volunteers. In most cases, the patient can be cared for in the home, with a relative or close friend serving as the "primary caregiver." Hospice also tends to the needs of the patient's family, advising them how best to handle the many practical and emotional problems involved.

Hospice is becoming increasingly known and more widely used. In the past two years, for example, 158 terminally ill persons received hospice care in our service community (Lea County New Mexico and Gaines and Yoakum County Texas), and nationwide the total was well over 210,000 patients. Hospice has become so accepted that it is now covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurers.

Unlike Dr. Kevorkian, hospice operates openly. Ours is a community-based organization that opens its arms to everyone. Further information about our service can be obtained by calling or writing to us at: Hospice of Lea County, P.O. Box 249, Hobbs, N.M., 88241 (505) 393-4717.

Although our service is only provided to terminally ill patients, experience has taught us that the earlier hospice enters a case, the more effective our help can be. For this reason, and because it is also good personal planning, we invite all inquiries - even those where there may be no immediate need for hospice.

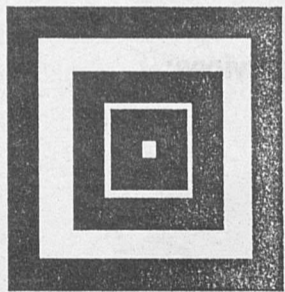
