

State required tax rate publication Athletic Boosters causes some confusion

A tax notice published in this duces a misleading comparison benewspaper and paid for by Plains ISD may leave some local taxpayers scratching their heads in confusion.

the school tax rate will grow by 468%. But in publishing the notice, local school officials are only complying strictly with the wording of state law.

"This is one of those situations where the law doesn't make sense, but we must nevertheless comply with it or risk serious consequences," said Superintendent Pete Simmons.

Plains ISD is required by the state's "Truth in Taxation" law to publish an official notice reporting last year's tax rate, the proposed tax rate for this year, and the percentage increase. However, due to a drafting oversight in the new school finance law, the notice significantly understates the tax rate for last year and pro-

tween last year's and this year's school taxes.

Under the previous school finance The notice incorrectly states that law, the county education district (CED) levied part of the taxes used for operating schools and the school district levied the rest. Under the new school finance law, CEDs are eliminated and all school taxes are levied by the district. This includes the amount needed to comply with the reduction in wealth required under SB7. The voters of Plains ISD recently approved sending this "extra" tax money to the state rather than give up our property.

Last year, the county education district imposed a tax rate of \$.901 (per \$100 of value) and Plains ISD imposed a tax rate of \$.2376, a combined school tax rate of \$1.138 per \$100 of value. This year Plains ISD is proposing a total tax rate of \$1.35 per \$100. Due to 31, 1993.

the reduction in wealth required by SB7, Plains ISD will still suffer a 9.4% reduction in general revenue at that taxing level.

Because of the mistake in the new school finance law, Plains ISD is required to report a 1992-93 tax rate of \$.2376, a 1993-94 tax rate of \$1.35, and an increase in tax rate of 468%; when in reality the rate will increase by 18.9%, and the actual levy available to the district will decrease by 9.4%.

In an effort to correct the misinformation, Plains ISD is publishing alongside the tax notice an advertisement indicating that the official tax notice is wrong and misleading. The supplemental advertisement, also paid for by the school district, provides the correct tax information.

The new school finance law, Senate Bill 7 was passed into law on May



Cicada killers have arrived

A very large wasp, the "cicada killer" is making its annual appearance on the South Plains, said Terry Millican, Yoakum County Extension Agent-AG. This wasp is the largest in our area, being about one and one-half inches in length.

This wasp is much more interested in stinging the cicadas than people. They can often be seen dragging or flying and carrying paralyzed cicadas back to their nests.

At suitable nesting sites, the wasps excavate a tunnel into the soil at an angle for a distance of one to three feet. The main tunnel ends in a number of branches and cells. The burrow may be dug during the day or night. The excavation will often result in a large mound of dirt. The burrow entrances are left open during provisioning of the nest and may never be closed except when the wasps entire job is completed.

Depending on their size, from one to four cicadas are provisioned in each underground cell. The female lays an egg on the last cicada she places in a cell. As many as four females may provision a single nest simultaneously although only one of them made the initial excavation.

The wasp larva which hatches from the egg has a cicada meal waiting. After consuming the cicadas provisioned in a cell, the wasp larva remains underground until the following July when the adult wasp emerges again to repeat the cycle.

Cicada killers are not aggressive and seldom attack humans. The males are not capable of stinging. Only the females can sting.

Cicada killers are considered beneficial insects because they prey on cicadas. However, they can be present in sufficient number to be a nuisance.

EASY CHICKEN CASSEROLE

- 4 chicken breasts, (cooked, deboned and diced)
- 1 large bag Doritos chips

. . . .

- 2 cups grated cheddar cheese
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 2 cans cream of celery soup
- 2 cans evaporated milk2 cans diced green chilies
- 1 small jar diced pimentos

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a 9 1/2 x 11 baking dish place diced chicken. Crush Doritos and spread over the chicken. In a large saucepan heat soups, milk, chilies and pimentos; stirring until smooth. Pour this mixture over the crushed chips. Top with grated cheddar cheese. Bake for 20 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Cool five minutes before serving. (This is a great casserole for fellowships and other pot-luck type gatherings!)

POTATO DINNER ROLLS

1 medium-size baking potato (peel and cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces; about 6 oz.)

1 cup skim milk

1 package dry yeast

3 3/4 c bread flour, divided

2 tablespoon sugar

3/4 teaspoon salt2 tablespoon margarine, softened

1 egg, slightly beaten

vegetable cooking spray

Place potato in a small saucepan; cover with water, and bring to a boil.

Reduce heat, and simmer, uncovered, 15 minutes or until very tender; drain. Press potato through a sieve into a bowl. Set aside 1/2 cup potato (remaining potato can be discarded). Heat milk over medium-high heat in a heavy saucepan until tiny bubbles form around edge. (Do not boil.) Remove from heat; let cool until very warm (120 to 130 degrees).

Combine yeast, one cup flour, sugar and salt in a large bowl; stir well. Add one-half cup potato, very warm milk, margarine and egg; beat at medium speed of electric mixer until smooth. Add one cup flour; beat until smooth. Stir in one and one-fourth cups of flour to form a soft dough. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface. Knead dough until smooth and elastic (about ten minutes); add enough remaining flour to prevent dough from sticking to hands. Place dough in a large bowl coated with cooking spray, turning to coat top. Cover and let rise in a warm place 45 minutes or until doubled in size. Punch dough down, and turn out onto a lightly floured surface; knead lightly four or five times. Divide in half; cut each half into eight equal portions. Shape each portion into a ball. Place balls three inches apart on a baking sheet coated with cooking spray. Cover and let rise 25 minutes or until doubled in size. Bake at 325 degrees for 23 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes 16 rolls.





The Plains Independent School District is required by state law to publish the accompanying tax notice in this form, even though the notice is deceptive.

Because of an omission in the recently-enacted state law,

I.S.D. may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-93 school year. The effect of this is to understate last year's actual school levy and produce an inaccurate comparison of last year's tax levy to this year's tax levy.
