4-H' students to offer tips on heart healthy foods

Shopping smart to help your heart will become easier for Plains residents who visit Pay-n-Save between 4 and 6 p.m. Monday and Tuesday next week. Local 4-H students will be assisting with Heartfest, a nationwide event sponsored by the American Heart Association. Heartfest aims to teach Americans how to avoid heart disease by eating a diet low in total fat, saturated fat, cholesterol and sodium.

"It's easier than ever before to find tasty, delicious low-fat foods for your family," said Joan Chandler, county extension agent and Yoakum County chairperson for Heartfest. "Plains citizens can get our new brochure, 'How to Shop Smart to Help Your Heart'. It shows shoppers how to cut the fat in their diet easily and painlessly."

In addition to the brochure, coupons for low-fat food products will be available from the 4-H students.

Companies sponsoring these coupons and brochure include Campbell Soup Company, The Quaker Oats Company, ConAgra (Healthy Choice), Guiltless Gourmet, Keebler and the Morningstar Group (Second Nature Real Egg Product).

"Heartfest will also show shoppers how to understand the new nutrition label requirements from the Food and Drug Administration. These new label requirements will simplify the shopping for foods low in saturated fat and cholesterol," added Chandler.

Heart disease is America's number one killer and claimed 26 deaths in Yoakum County in 1991. Local American Heart Association volunteers are dedicated to the research and educational efforts of reducing disability and death from cardiovascular diseases and stroke.

Extension Homemakers select new name at State Convention

The National Extension Homemakers Council, Inc. changed its name in February, 1992, to become the National Association for Family and Community Education, or NAFCE.

All state affiliates were encouraged to adopt the same name, inserting the state's name instead of "national", thus changing the Texas extension Homemakers Association to become the Texas Association for Family and Community Education, or TAFCE.

The delegates to the 1993 Annual TEHA State Convention in Waco in September addressed this proposal, presented from McLennan County and recommended by the state Bylaws Committee. The proposal passed with the two-thirds majority vote necessary for a bylaws amendment.

The mission of the organization has not changed. The mission continues to be continuing education, leadership development and community service. "This change does not diminish the fact that we are homemakers and proud to be homemakers-but we are so

much more. We care about families in our local community, but we are concerned about families in an even larger global community," a spokesman said.

"Homemaker" has a different meaning to different people. While members view "homemaker" to mean more than operating a household, many do not. Many others view it to primarily mean cooking and sewing.

"We think the new name will bring a true awareness of our organization. We members know who we are... others do not. The new name is already opening new doors," said Bea Pippin, Yoakum County FCE Chairman.

Locally, the Yoakum County Extension Homemakers Council will be known as the Yoakum County Family and Community Education Council, or Yoakum County FCE Council. The State Line and Turner Extension Homemakers Clubs will be known as State Line and Turner Family and Community Education Clubs or FCE Clubs.

Yoakum SWCD will elect Zone 5 director Oct. 7

Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District will hold an election for Zone 5 director at 8 a.m. Oct. 7 in Plains Community Center. Zone 5 is the 12 square mile area centered around the traffic light in Plains.

Present director is Linda Powell. She was appointed in 1990 to fill the seat vacated by Dicky McGinty's death. She plans to seek election for the four year position. Other candidates will be selected by a nominating committee. Nominations may also be made from the floor at election time.

In order to serve as a director, a person must be an eligible voter as defined below, who owns land within the numbered subdivision for which the election is held and must be actively engaged in the business of farming or animal husbandry.

Eligible voter for the election is an individual who holds title to farmland or ranchland lying within Yoakum County which is the area covered by the District, a resident of the county and 18 years or older. Title is considered to be

owned by both husband and wife in this community property state. If a family farm corporation owns farmland or ranchland in the District then the corporation is entitled to one vote. The corporation shall designate one corporate officer to vote for the corporation. The designated officer must be eighteen years or older and be a resident of the county.

Harold Bob Bennett, State Executive Director of the Texas ASCS, will be guest speaker at the election. All persons interested in conservation activities in the District, State and Nation are invited. Refreshments will be served.

Mr. and Mrs. John Matus of Denver City, dressed in cowboy clothing, entertained with songs including some original poems and songs written by Mrs. Matus.

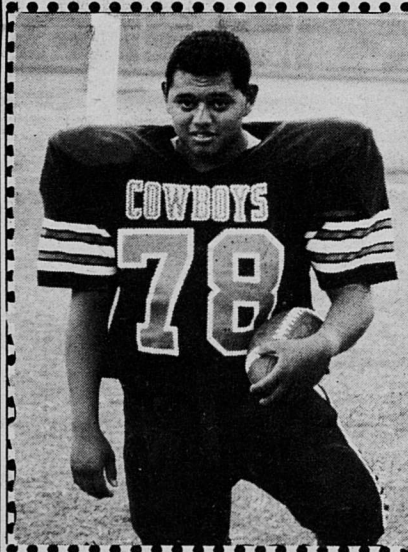

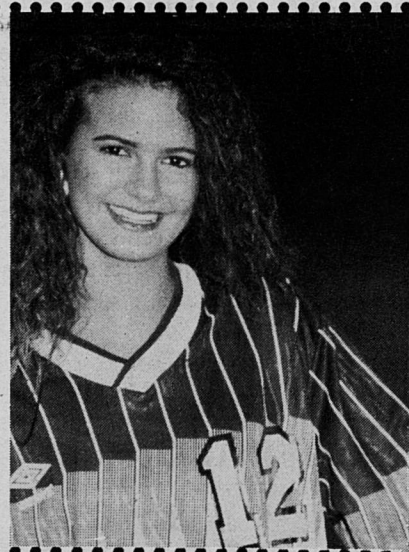

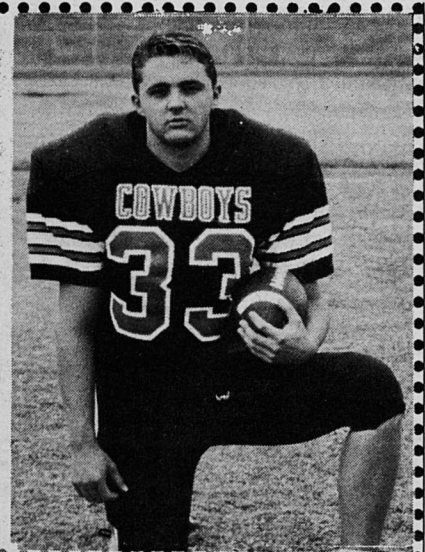

Cowboys - Buffalo game

The Cowboys were not letting grass grow beneath their feet at Forsan Friday, Sept. 17. They won the coin flip and with the kick of the ball went right to work.

David Bitolas took the kick, got some great blocking (including one from Shannon Ward that gave him an open field) and returned the ball 75 yards for the touchdown. Victor Bernal's kick was good.

Jerry Dominguez dropped the Buffalo return man at the Forsan 35. On the first play Forsan fumbled in the back field and Brad McMinn picked it up and rambled in for a TD. However, the man in the white hat called the fumble a muff and said the ball could not be advanced. Plains took over at Forsan's 27. Ace Williams took the ball on the first play and scampered for the touchdown. Bernal's kick was good. With only 35 ticks gone off the game clock, Plains was ahead 14-0.

Forsan mounted a drive that took them to the Cowboy 13. The Plains defenders stopped the advance there and took over the ball.

Several good plays moved the Cowboys down field, including an 18 yard run by Bitolas. Williams carried 32 yards and had a first down at the Cowboy 43 yard line. After a two yard loss, Ward ran for nine yards, Williams got another first down at the 33 and a Bernal pass to McMinn took the team to the 16. Williams carried to the three and Bitolas scored from there. The kick was good. The first quarter had 28 seconds left and Plains was ahead 21-0.

Later in the second quarter, the Cowboys struck again when Ward took a punt at the Forsan 40 yard line and returned it to the Cowboy 25. Eric Ramos recovered a Cowboy fumble at the 25. A quarterback sack and a

penalty moved the ball to the Cowboy 46. Williams took the ball and following a good leading block by Stoney Garland scored the TD. Bernal's kick was true. Halftime score was Plains 28, Forsan 0.

The Buffaloes received the second half kick. They fumbled at their own 34 yard line. The Cowboys recovered the fumble. Carries by Bitolas, Williams and Bernal moved the ball to the 16. Williams followed another good leading block by Garland into the end zone. Extra point kick was good.

Bernal's kick sailed into the end zone, bringing the ball out to the 20 for Forsan. Kirk Parrish twice stopped the Buffaloes for no gain. They were forced to punt.

Scotty Rains took the punt at the Cowboy 35 and returned it to the 49. Bitolas carried for three, then for a first down at the Cowboy 31, as the third quarter ended. A pass to Dominguez was good for six yards. Bernal then connected with McMinn for a first down at the ten. The Cowboys lost five yards on a quarterback sack. A pass to McMinn put the team at the Forsan 1. Stoney Garland plunged in from there for the score. The extra point try was blocked.

Forsan mounted a drive that moved them down field for their only score of the night. The two point conversion try failed.

The Buffaloes tried an on-side kick. It was covered by Joey Guerra for the Cowboys. However, the Buffaloes did get one more chance when they recovered a Cowboy fumble. A Forsan Buffalo scampered to the Cowboy 20 where he was run down by Rains as the final horn sounded.

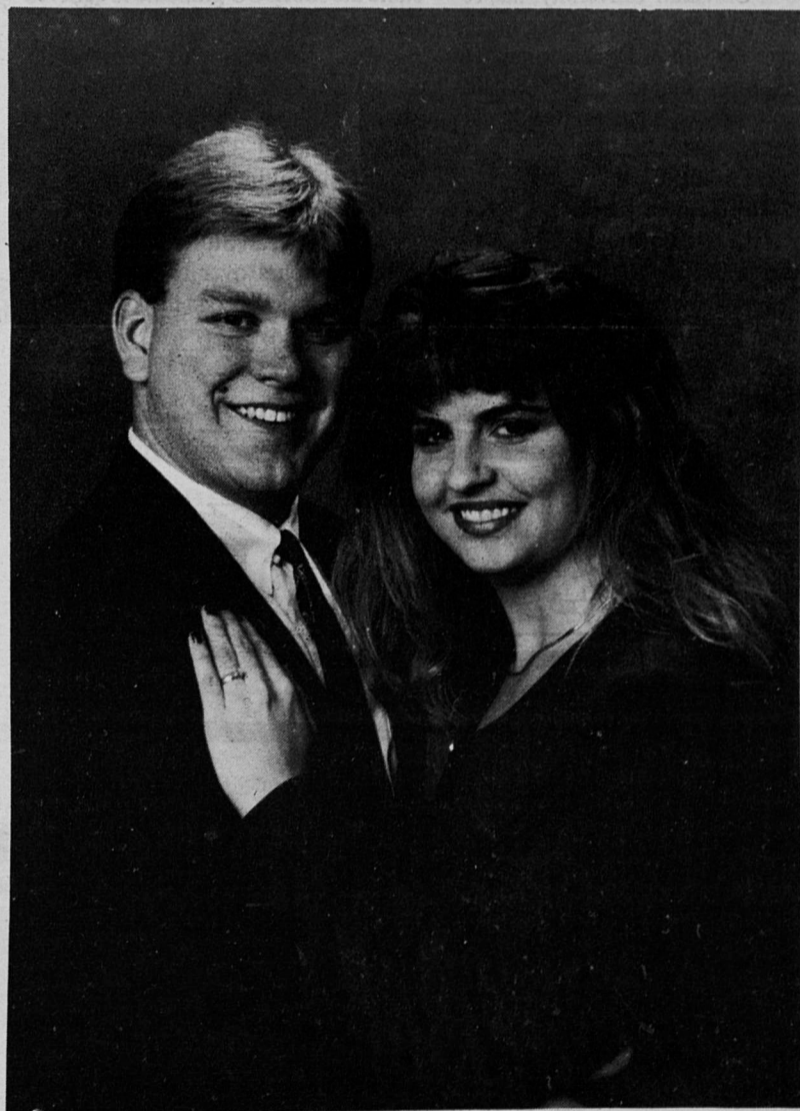
Wedding plans revealed

Son of L.J. and Virginia Sanders, he served more than 11 years in the U.S. Air Force as instructor and reconnaissance pilot. He entered pilot training at

Reese Air Force Base in 1982 and became the first LCU graduate to earn Air Force pilot wings.

During assignments spanning the globe, he logged more than 3,000 flight hours in WC-130 weather reconnaissance aircraft, T-37 jet trainers and U-2/TR-1 high altitude jets. Additionally, he served during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, logging more than 100 hours over enemy territory flying reconnaissance in the U-2, a once-

secret plane made famous by the Soviet Union's shoot down of Francis Gary Powers almost 30 years ago.

Sanders' contributions were recognized by the Air Force with 14 medals for extraordinary achievement and meritorious service to the nation. He was also presented special recognition for providing nine hours of reconnaissance data to marines engaged in battle, despite a malfunction of his aircraft's onboard navigation equipment.

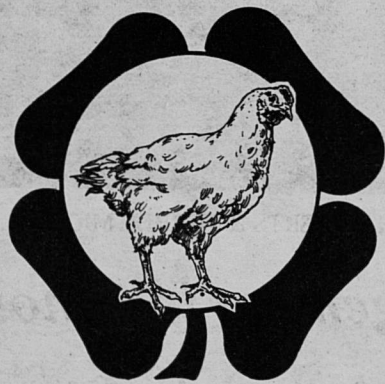
Lubbock to honor Girl Scout executive

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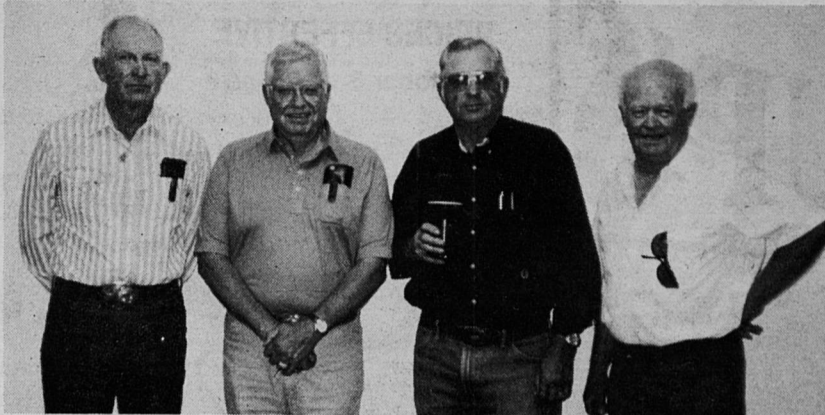

renew friendships**

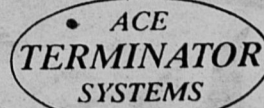

Plans have been made for a "reunion of the 1940's decade" next summer during Old Settlers Reunion. All previous graduates are invited.



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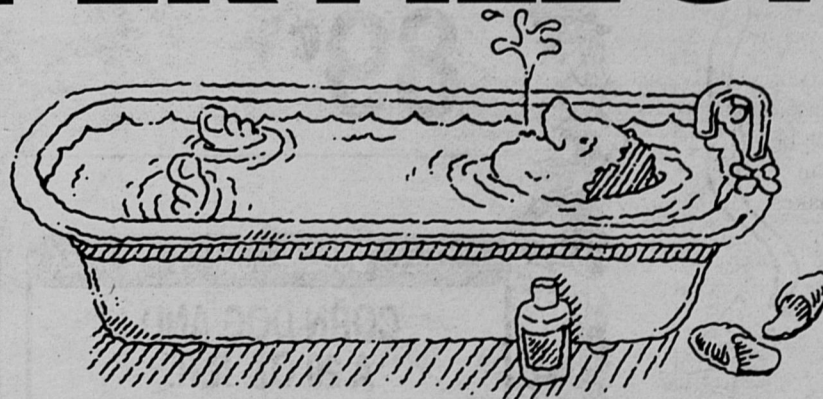

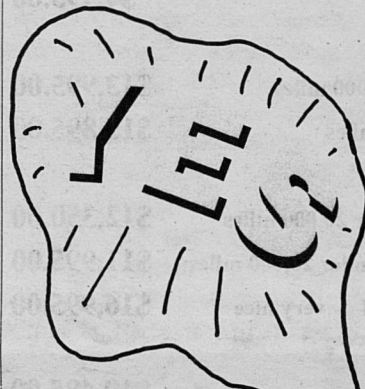

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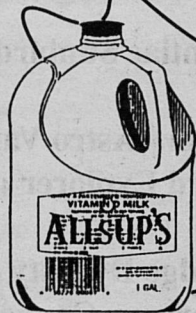
