Yoakum SWCD taking orders for windbreak tree packets

Windbreak trees may now be ordered from the Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District. The district sponsors a program to purchase windbreak trees for use in yards, fields, wildlife and other conservation plantings.

The evergreen species which are available for ordering are Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Red Cedar, Rocky Mt. Juniper and White Pine. The Afghan Pine and Arizona Cypress, two popular evergreens, have already been sold out. The hardwood species available are the Bur Oak, Catalpa, Desert Willow, Flameleaf Sumac, Honeylocust, Mulberry, Nanking Cherry, Native Plum, Osage Orange, Pecan, Russian Olive, Sandcherry, Shumard Oak and Skunkbush Sumac.

Windbreaks, if properly designed and maintained, can help protect life and property for many years to come. Windbreaks help decrease heating costs in winter and cooling costs in summer for homes and buildings. Trees planted in windbreaks also help to reduce soil erosion and damage to

crops, provide shelter for livestock, and supply food and improve habitat for wildlife. In addition, windbreaks significantly increase the monetary value of a homesite and the aesthetic quality of rural life.

Wildlife packets for Quail and Pheasant, Deer, Turkey and Squirrel are also available at a very low price. These packets consist of 25 plants of four species which wildlife prefer. The Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District encourages wildlife plantings to promote wildlife habitat development in this county.

The selections of trees and wildlife packets are available as of Oct. 15, 1993, however, some varieties are selling fast. The deadline to order trees and wildlife packets is Feb. 24, 1994. Delivery is scheduled for March 3, 1994.

Program on recycling given for Tsa Mo Ga members

"Promote and Participate in Recycling Programs" was the theme of Monday's meeting of Tsa Mo Ga Study Club. Program leader was Ann Graham.

Gary Walker, District Manager of Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District, reported the Yoakum County landfill was opened that day. He praised Yoakum County Commissioners and Judge Dallas Brewer for their efforts in seeing the landfill project become a reality. He noted that the collection fee of \$10 would have been an increase of \$40 per month had not the landfill been opened.

Walker also stated that the landfill meets EPA rules and that any individual of Yoakum County can dump a load in the fill for only \$1.

Extension Agent-HE Joan Chandler directed a session on recycling with the assistance of Dottie Mayes, chairman of the recycling committee, and Lesli Rowe, 4-H member.

Mrs. Mayes demonstrated tips on what can be recycled and steps to take in recycling. She stated that no oil containers can be recycled. Steel cans and lids and aluminum cans must be rinsed, flattened and placed in their separate containers at the recycling bins located on the east side of Precinct Four.

Miss Rowe gave statistics on waste and recycling. She pointed out that persons must buy and use recycled commodities for the plan to succeed.

Miss Chandler reported that a bailer is being sought so that recycled items might be hauled to Lubbock. She distributed pamphlets with information on what can and cannot be recycled.

She stated, "If the public follows rules in recycling by crushing and cooperating with this project, our liner at the landfill will last much longer. A liner is very expensive and can last two years or more. Clubs will be asked to participate in taking turns in keeping the recycling containers cleaned."

The used tire collection for residents of Yoakum County was an-

nounced. Plains residents may take old tires to the collection site at the northwest corner of Highways 214 and 380.

Mary Jo St.Romain presided over a business session. Holiday gift wrapping paper will be sold by club members and each was asked to take orders as soon as possible. It was noted that the paper is made of recycled paper.

Helen Hunter displayed a bulletin board she compiled of work by kindergarten classes of Ann McGinty's and Linda Simmons'. Photos were furnished by Bonnie Earnest.

It was announced that the club will decorate a tree in Pioneer Plaza for the annual tree lighting ceremony. Special appreciation was noted for the work Kathy Jones did with the club yearbooks. She was voted honorary membership.



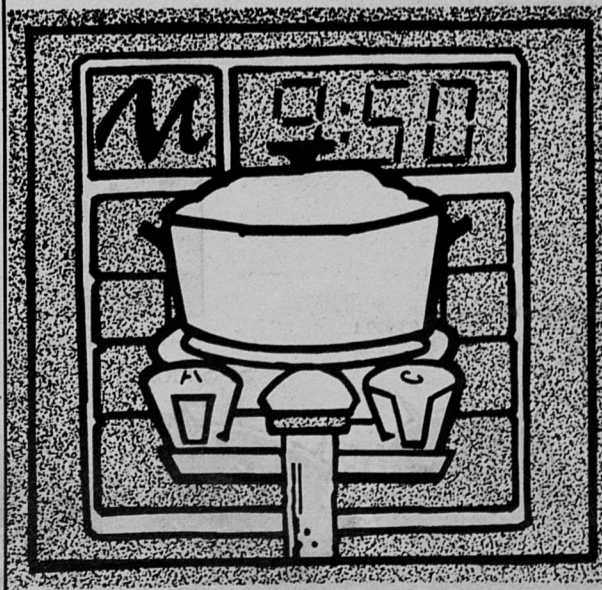

Cowboys, Hornets & Longhorns

The Cowboys faced top ten rated teams in their last two outings and came out on the short side with both. Sudan came to Plains on Sept. 24 and did nothing to make Homecoming enjoyable for the Cowboys or their fans.

The Hornets scored once late in the first quarter, then again soon after the start of the second quarter.

Brad McMinn intercepted a Sudan pass and returned it 46 yards before being brought down. Three plays later, a 45 yard pass from Victor Bernal to Shannon Ward gave the Cowboys their only touchdown of the evening. Bernal's kick was good. Halftime score was Sudan 14, Plains 7.

Sealing the game, the Hornets scored a TD in the third quarter and one in the final stanza. However, they missed both extra point tries. Final score was Sudan 26, Plains 7.

The Cowboy offense moved the ball against Sudan well, getting inside the Hornet 20 yard line four times and to the 29 another, but they were unable to put the ball into the end zone. Five interceptions - one returned for a touchdown - certainly did not help the Cowboy cause.

Next, the team traveled to Hart, where the Longhorns were even less friendly hosts. Plains started the scoring for the evening on a drive that began at the Hart 37 yard line. Hart had

been forced to punt, and the ball sailed over the punter's head. A pass from Bernal to McMinn put the ball on the 25. Ace Williams scampered into the end zone from there. The kick was good.

Hart did not get on the scoreboard until the second period. They scored three times during that quarter, including the last one on a blocked Cowboy punt. Their extra point try on that score was blocked by Ward. The halftime score was Hart 20, Plains 7.

In the third quarter, Ward gave the team new hope when he returned a Hart punt 51 yards for a TD. The kick was blocked and the Cowboys were unable to sustain any further drives.

Hart scored twice more in the fourth quarter, converting only one of the extra point tries.

Once again the Cowboy offense had trouble hanging on to the ball. They fumbled three times, the last leading to a Longhorn touchdown.

The final score was Hart 33, Plains 13.

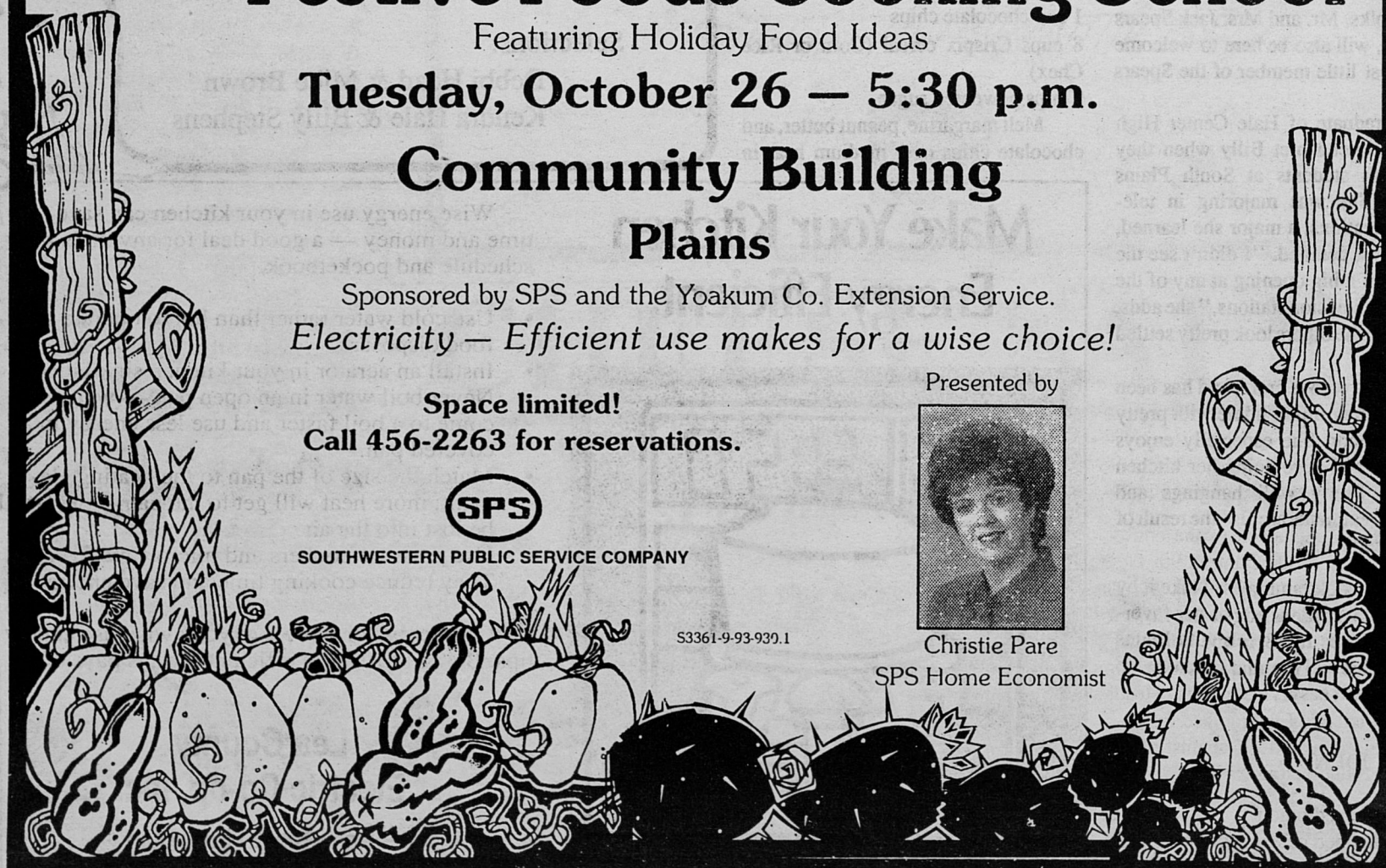

7TH GRADE

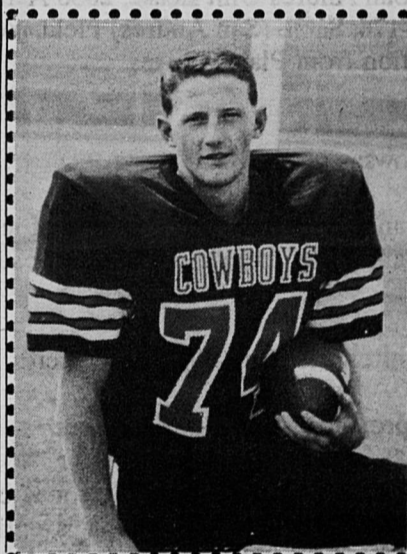

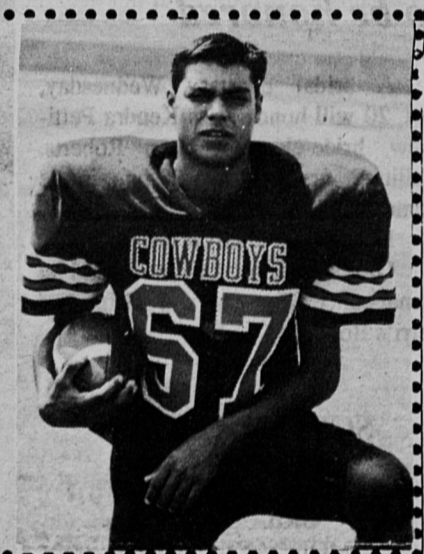

Local residents may dispose of used or scrap tires in a collection for Plains and Denver City Friday through Sunday, Oct. 22-24. Disposal site for Plains is the northwest corner of highways 214 and 380 where a recycling bin has been placed by the Yoakum

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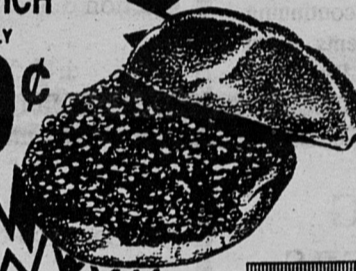
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
