

Hospice Auxiliary lights-up special Christmas tree


Yoakum County Hospice Auxiliary held their first annual "Light up a Life for Hospice" tree lighting ceremony recently at Plains State Bank.

Rites conducted for Juanita Crawford





"I am a home body but I love my church, my family and my friends," says Jo (Mrs. O.W. "Red") Harbour.

Jo also finds lots of pleasure in sewing and working with crafts. She likes to decorate and re-arrange the furniture in her home and says cooking is a satisfying part of homemaking.

Born in Dora, Okla., she grew up on a farm and learned "farm things" although she never helped with plowing and planting. She attended high school near Maud, Okla. and played basketball from the eighth grade through high school.

Jo's first husband, Ellis Ashby, was killed in France during World War II, only two short years after their marriage. During those two years, Jo followed Ellis to his different assignments and worked as a waitress, in a laundry/dry cleaning establishment and for Wilson Packing Plant during their stay in Abilene. She also recalls their stay in Indio, CA and Trenton, NI

After Ellis' death, Jo moved to San Angelo and enrolled in business college. She attended classes half days and worked at a bank in San Angelo. She married Marshall Wendell Smith in 1946 in Coleman.

Jo and Marshall became parents of four children. Marsha Jo Langford lives in Abilene and is secretary for Belmont Baptist Church. Gail Irene Jennings is a bank teller in Wimberley. Brenda Elaine Thompson teaches in Denver City High School. Michael Wendell Smith is a designer for Zion Commercial Mercantile, Inc. in Salt Lake City, UT.

For a year, Jo operated a licensed day care in her home and then, "at age 46," went to beauty school. She

worked as a beauty operator for more than seven years until they moved to Denver City. Marshall died of a massive heart attack in 1973.

Jo and Red met in July of 1977 and were married in December of that year. Her family increased with the addition of two dear step-children, Linda Kay Chapmond of Amarillo and David Michael Harbour of Lubbock.

Jo boasts eight grandsons, one granddaughter and five great-grandsons and in humor she says, "I've earned every wrinkle that I wear." Sharing three of her favorite recipes, they include baked fish, a one-of-a-kind chicken casserole and a gelatin salad.

BAKED FISH

Spray a baking dish with Pam cooking spray. Place haddock or blue hake fillets in dish and sprinkle with Molly McButter and Creole seasoning. Pour three or four tablespoons red wine vinegar over all and bake 15-20 minutes at 400 degrees. Serve alone or with wild or brown rice cooked in chicken broth.

JO'S CHICKEN CASSEROLE

Bake three or four chicken breasts. Take off skin and debone. Set aside. In large bowl, mix one can of cream of chicken soup, one can cream of celery soup, one cup milk, one tablespoon parsley, one-half teaspoon red pepper (or one tablespoon green chilies, but not both), 1 tablespoon garlic salt, 1 flakes, tablespoon onion one tablespoon chopped pimentos and black pepper to taste. Spray bottom of a deep casserole dish with Pam cooking spray - put in one flour tortilla, alternate with one layer of chicken, cover with the soup mixture, another flour tortilla, chicken and soup, until dish is filled, leaving room at top for bubbling. Cover and cook in 350-degree oven for 30 minutes. It will resemble the taste of chicken and dumplings.

PINEAPPLE BUTTERMILK SALAD 1 - 16 oz can of crushed pineapple, undrained

2 T sugar

1 - 6 oz pkg of orange sweetened gelatin

2 c buttermilk

1 - 8 oz whipped topping, thawed

1 c pecans

Combine sugar and pineapple in a sauce pan and bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat, stir in gelatin until dissolved. Cool. Add buttermilk and stir until combined. Fold in whipped topping, then pecans. Sprinkle top with pecan bits and chill.



Operation Christmas Card is underway again. Residents are invited to contribute funds to Plains Cemetery in lieu of mailing Christmas greetings to local friends and family.




