Police School Classes Under Way at Cisco JC

Classes in the Basic Police School at Cisco Junior College sponsored by the Eastland County Commissioners Court and taught by an A&M University instructor, got underway Monday.

Two sessions are held daily, one a morning class from 10 a.m. to noon, and the other an evening class beginning at 7 o'clock and lasting until 9.

Arthur C. Butler of the Police Training Division of A&M University, is the instructor.

Nine had enrolled in the day school and twice that number in the evening classes at the beginning of the week.

The school will continue for two weeks, five days weekly.

Among the subjects to be dealt with are:

Constitutional Provisions; Authority of Police; Laws of Arrest without a Warrant; Laws of Arrest with a Warrant; Search and Seizure; Rules of Evidence; Code of Criminal Procedure; Patrol Methods, Procedures and Tactics; Preliminary Investigations; Investigative Tactics and Procedures; Report Writing; Court room Demeanor; Public Relations and Human Relations.

Officials, Employees To Get County Pay Boost

Eastland County employees and elected officials will receive a cost-of-living wage adjustment this month.

Judge Scott Bailey said the County Commissioners Court has given the required preliminary legal notice and will vote on the matter at the regular meeting at 10 a.m. Monday, August 11.

The raise in salary will be set at \$25.00 per month for each employee and will be effective for the first pay period of August.

County Auditor Earl O'Brien said the county paid 70 full time employees and officials in July, for a monthly payroll of \$19,367.20.

The Commissioners Court has voted to make five constables for the county full time employees and raise their salaries from \$15 per month to

\$250 per month. This was effective August 1.

Constables are Steele Hill, Precinct 1 in Eastland; Albert White Precinct 2 in Gorman; W. H. Kornegay, Precinct 3 in Rising Star; A. W. Dawson Precinct 4, Cisco; and R. W. Veal, Precinct 5, Ranger.

The move puts seven full time county enforcement officers on the job. Bailey said the court feels that this system will provide more adequate law enforcement throughout the entire county.

The constables met with the court Monday and pledged cooperation with other law enforcement officers of the county. They also agreed to serve any citation of court process necessary in their precincts and to serve when called as court bailiffs.

20s—Were the Days In Ranger

The composer of the recent hit tune "Those Were the Days" might well have been in Ranger in 1920 and attempting to recount the experience. Ranger Daily Times had a payroll of 34, 31 of whom were men. R. B. Waggoner was vice-president and general manager and Larry Smits, managing editor.

Slowly but no less surely, there were changes in the format of the eightpage daily, three-section Sunday paper. Most impressive was the increase in local news.

In 1920 the town of 16,000 population was, according to The Times, a town in turmoil; experiencing simultaneously construction and destruction (sixteen frame buildings were destroyed in one conflagration), battles between law enforcement officers and law offenders, murders, manslaughter, armed robbery, dope peddlers and petty thievery.

Completion of three new school buildings allowed students to return to full day attendance. Blue laws went into effect, plans for 15 blocks of "White Way" (lighted streets) a line and crepe de chine, \$4.00

and decision to build a City-County Hospital.

A sports column was added to the Times with baseball in the spotlight and the Ranger Nitros coming in for the lion's share of honors. A society column appeared and subscribers were invited to submit information. Articles were brief and to the point, two short paragraphs sufficient to record a meeting of the most elite club in town. Wedding pictures totally absent.

Guest lists of local hotels were published, Epworth League and BYPU briefly mentioned and a sale offered mes-value for \$1.00 per yard.

The body of Carl Barnes, for whom the local American Legion is named, was buried with honors.

Gen. Alvaro Obregon, President-elect of Mexico, visited Ranger.

There were stories of extreme cruelty and stories of heart-warming benevolence. Barney Google was added to the comic section and Aspirinol was declared to be better than whiskey for colds and flu.

Yes - Those were the Days.

One Newspaper Only In Eastland County In 1878

Editor's Note: The following item is taken from The Rising Star, a column written by Vada Arnold and titled "It Has Been."

In the year 1878 there was only one newspaper in Eastland County published by O. K. Davenport at Eastland. Each settlement in the county had a correspondent and each correspondent tried to excel the other with news. One news item from the Pleasant Valley Community (later the site of what once was Mangum) concerned a love affair that had an unhappy ending it was like this: "A medium sized young lady was engaged to a very tall young man in our community, but suddenly she broke the engagement. When asked why she did so, she replied: 'Well he was so tall that if I went to kiss him, I would have to get up on a stump and that does not suit me at all, so I broke the engagement'."

People were poor during that period. They had little and needed little. They worked hard to establish homes in this new country. They helped each other to bear hardships, visited and cared for the sick and dying.

There were only two Methodist preachers in this area at the time they were Rev. G. W. Fair who lived in Eastland City and Rev. J. M. Lane.

Homes were usually room structures built of logs cut from each homesteaders glass windows and only one door to the house. This door was made of scraps of goods boxes when available.

The road was rough but these courageous people blazed the way for the prosperity and blessings we now enjoy.
