





### Carried Gun on Mexican Chase But No Ammunition

The following from our correspondent at Bradshaw which reached us too late for last week's paper, is considered worthy of space because it relates some of the amusing incidents which occurred during the chase of the Mexican who killed Sheriff Satterwhite of Howard county and Constable Reeves of Merkel:

Bradshaw, Texas, March 26.—The Mexican slayer of Sheriff Satterwhite of Howard county and Deputy Sheriff Geo. Reeves of Taylor county had not been found at noon Thursday.

A report had been circulated that the slayer had been seen leaving a straw stack about three miles northeast of Bradshaw early Thursday morning, and that he had been surrounded by a posse of about 500 men. This report caused a general shift of all officers and men in the search to the mountains four miles north of Bradshaw.

Sheriffs and deputies from Taylor, Tom Green, Runnels, and Concho counties assembled near the Lemod Gap in the mountains. They were equipped with high-powered cars, rifles, machine guns, pistols, telescopes and bloodhounds, and were inquiring for men who were acquainted with the wigwag signalling so that as the posse made the drive for the Mexican, officers could keep informed.

Geo. Middleton, living near the mountains, said two Mexicans filling the description of the ones sought, came to his house Wednesday night and asked for food. He gave them their supper, and they sat on a watering trough and ate it, after which they offered to pay for the meals and wanted Middleton to take his car and carry them to Sweetwater. He refused.

While Middleton was talking with the Mexicans, his little boy, aged 8, went in the house, got the shotgun, loaded it with buckshot and started for the door toward the Mexicans, saying, "I'm gonna kill 'em." His mother took the gun away from him.

Excitement reigns wherever the big posse congregates. New recruits consisting of farmers, bankers, doctors and merchants, are added, bearing all kinds of guns from a 22 caliber rifle and single-barrel shotgun on up to a high-powered army rifle. One "gunman" arrived with a brand new .38-Winchester rifle discovered that he had not brought a single cartridge with him.

Rumors as to the Mexican's marksmanship and equipment get larger and larger as they are repeated. One man in the crowd stated that he positively knew that the Mexican shot Sheriff Satterwhite at a distance of four hundred yards.

Deputy Sheriff Reeves, one of the slain men, is a brother to Mrs. John Kay, who resided here in Bradshaw.

Bradshaw, March 26.—Morales, Mexican slayer of Sheriff Satterwhite and Deputy Reeves, was found in a box car at Lawn by Lize Jennings of the Abilene police force. Morales opened fire on Jennings and closely grazed his body, the bullet

going through the trousers near Jennings' pocket.

As soon as the posse arrived, about fifty rifles fired about 700 shots into the car, killing Morales.

Some of the riflemen were evidently very excited, as, notwithstanding all riflemen were at close range, several shots went through the railroad rails and others into the railroad dump, while other shots splintered the top of the car.

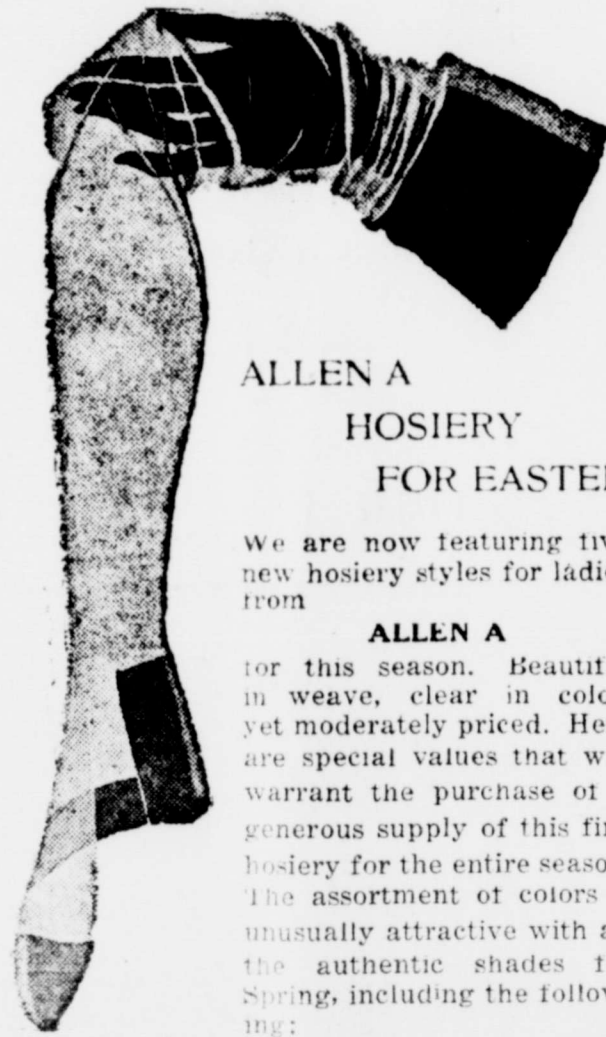

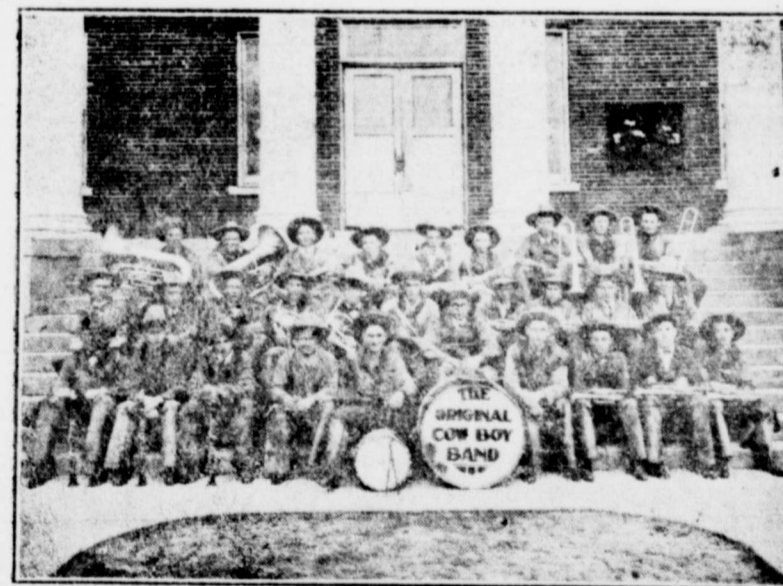

Be Encouraged by Other Interests."

He said that "there was no argument to this question. That the answer is obvious, and told the ways that the farmer and the business man may cooperate. "It is true," he said, "if the farmer does not prosper no one does. Everything depends on the fruitage of the soil, and if the farm products were to be cut off for a year what would be the results? How can cooperation be encouraged. Mr. McAdams has told you. We are learning some of the teachings of the Nazarene, in that 'he who serves the most is the one who serves the best.' But we should see who could serve the best and most acceptable. Some of the benefits to be derived from cooperation are a better understanding of each other, to know one another better and to discuss ideas. Cooperation gives fellowship in a united effort and nothing important was ever put over without cooperation.

"The business man that does not cooperate is standing in his own light. I approve and go on record as favoring cooperation among the farmers and believe that it should be encouraged by the business interests and all business should lend its influence toward furthering cooperation."

"Why I am a Cotton Association Member" was told by J. S. Neely. Mr. Neely said that he has "never regretted joining the Farm Bureau," and told of his experience of selling cotton, and the difference in the prices received, and that he has profited by being a member.

S. H. Meeks said that in his opinion the Farm Bureau was the best thing in existence for the farmer today, and that he believed in it, and that he was well satisfied with the results. He said that "cooperation among the farmers is more essential than anything."

B. H. Marks, who also discussed this subject, said he believed in cooperation between the farmers and business men, and that they should work hand in hand. That "we farmers need the bankers and the bankers need us." Mr. Marks expressed the

belief that the time was coming and that it was not far away, when everything produced on the farm will be sold on the cooperative market plan.

Lynn Stokes, president of the association, said the purpose of the association was to put prosperity on every farm, and mentioned the last distribution of checks, amounting to \$230,000, to Rannels county farmers, and the next one will be made in June, but will benefit those who

are association members only. He said that it was not the business of the association to sell cotton, but to stabilize the cotton market, the same as the steel market, interest on money, the dry goods that you buy, and more especially the orderly marketing of cotton.

The members of the Rannels County association are planning to give a big picnic and basket dinner at which some of the officials of the organization will be present and make

addresses some time in the future. A definite date has not been set and all arrangements have not been perfected, but announcement will be made at a later date.
