





Little on his farm west of Winters. Twenty varities of cotton have been planted in one field by Mr. Little and the experiment is being watched with much interest by the farmers of west Texas.

By the means it is expected to be determined the best variety of cotton adapted to this section, the one that will stand the season best, make the heaviest plant and produce the largest amount of cotton with the best staple. Of course, Mr. Little! expects to reap a return from the experiment but at the same time he will be benefitting the farmer in this part of the State as the experiment will be the means of showing them the best kind of seed to plant.

"The reason I am planting these twenty varities is this," he said. "I have observed that from year to year farmers continue to plant the same two or three varities of cotton and it has been hard to convince them to! try just one kind of cotton that they had not planted before. They did not seem to care to plant any cotton except the varities they had always

"I have always been in search of something to better my condition and help my brother farmer. Two years ago I ordered eight varities of cotton and began to experiment to see! if I could find a variety that would beat the old kinds that I had always
