Toasted Rice Turkey Stuffing

This stuffing is a "must" for that turkey you're roasting. Toasted grains of rice have a delicious nutty flavor that's just right with turkey. This stuffing is so good and easy to make, you'll use it with chicken, too.

TOASTED RICE STUFFING
 Giblet Gravy
 Sweet Potato Casserole
 Buttered Broccoli
 Cranberry Relish
 Grapefruit Salad
 Pumpkin Chiffon Pie

INGREDIENTS:
 1 cup uncooked white rice
 2 cups water
 1 teaspoon salt
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1/4 cup chopped onion
 1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 1 cup chopped celery
 Dash of black pepper
 1/4 cup water or turkey broth

METHOD: Spread rice in a shallow pan and place in a 400° F. oven. When the grains turn slightly yellow, stir well. Continue to toast, stirring occasionally, until rice grains are a light

golden color. This takes 15 to 20 minutes. Put the toasted rice in a saucepan. Add the water and salt. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove from heat, but leave lid on 10 minutes.

While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Add onion and celery mixture to the rice and mix in the bread crumbs, egg, salt, poultry seasoning, pepper and broth or water. Stuff lightly into the bird. Do not pack as the stuffing expands during the cooking. Stuff the bird just before it is placed in the oven. Do not stuff and refrigerate. This stuffing, however, may be prepared ahead of time so long as the liquids are not mixed with the dry ingredients until the turkey is to be stuffed and cooked. Extra stuffing can be baked in a separate pan or made into balls. The recipe makes about 6 cups of stuffing.

Allow 1/4 cup of stuffing for each pound of poultry, dressed weight, or 1 cup for each pound ready-to-cook weight.

Frosted grapes are a lovely inexpensive and eatable garnish for turkey. Just dip grapes in slightly beaten egg whites and then into beet or cane sugar.

Health Program Urged For Schools

AUSTIN, September 1 — Every school should have a definite health program. Situations such as, the kind of drinking water, arrangements for the school lunch, the lighting, seating, ventilation and cleanliness of the schoolroom, and the personal practices of the teachers and children are the basis of the school health program, said Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of health.

Every school has tremendous opportunities to promote the health of its pupils and of its community. From early childhood to early manhood and womanhood, most children are enrolled in schools and are under the supervision of school staffs for a substantial part of the day for approximately half the days of the year. The conditions under which they live in school, the help which they are given in solving their health problems, the ideals of individual and community health which they are taught and the information and understanding that they acquire of themselves are factors which operate to develop attitudes and behavior conducive to healthy, happy and successful living.

Schools alone however cannot enable children to attain all the desirable goals of individual and community health. Considering the magnitude and multitude of the diverse and continuing efforts that must be made to satisfy the health needs of children, it is fortunate that many people and groups, in addition to schools, are greatly interested in promoting health. Parents have a prime responsibility.

Physicians, dentists, nurses, health officers, social and welfare workers and their official organizations, such as medical, dental and nursing societies, health departments and voluntary health agencies are all rightly concerned with health activities in their communities.

SLIGHT DECREASE IS REPORTED IN TEXAS, U. S. TURKEY CROP

AUSTIN, Sept. 1. — Texas turkey growers are raising 2,817,000 turkeys this year compared with the revised estimate of 2,822,000 last year, according to figures released by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Heavy breed varieties are estimated at 2,427,000 birds or 101 per cent of last year, while light breeds are estimated at 390,000 birds or 95 per cent of a year ago.

It should be noted that information developed from data obtained on the "Weekly Poults Hatched" reports and other phases of the intensified program of turkey statistics has resulted in a downward revision in the level of estimates of turkeys raised. Figures prior to 1954 as yet have not been revised and therefore, are not on a comparable basis with these estimates.

Farmers in the United States are raising 63,066,000 turkeys this year — 4 percent less than revised estimates of numbers raised in 1954. About the same number of heavy breed turkeys are being raised this year as last, while light breeds show a decrease of 15 percent. Light breeds are 26 percent of the total raised this year, compared with 29 percent in 1954.

Revisions for 1954 reflect significant changes in the level of quantitative estimates for a number of States and in United States totals. Therefore, these estimates for 1954 and 1955 are not strictly

comparable with earlier published figures.

Heavy breed increases from last year of 9 percent in the West North Central and 2 percent in the West offset decreases of 6 percent in the East North Central, 9 percent in the North Atlantic, and 12 percent in the South Atlantic States. There was no change in the South Central States.

Light breed turkeys raised this year show decreases in all parts of the country. Decreases from last year are 6 percent in the East North Central, 7 percent in the West, 8 percent in the South Atlantic, and 23 percent in the West North Central States.

Last January farmers expressed their intentions to raise about the same number of heavy breed turkeys as in 1954 and 11 percent fewer light breed birds. This followed the record crop of turkeys in 1954 with the lowest August-December turkey prices since 1942. Although feed prices during the January-July 1955 hatching season averaged 4 percent lower than in 1954, the turkey-feed price relationship during this period was the lowest since 1937.

In this report light breed turkeys include Beltsville Small White, Jersey Buff, Royal Palm and Wild turkeys. Heavy breed turkeys include all other breeds.

Curried Rice and Tuna Make a Tasty and Thrifty Filling for Luscious Tomatoes

Rice brings together the deep sea goodness of tuna fish and the Oriental excitement of curry in this versatile main dish. The curry powder contributes exotic flavor and intriguing color enhanced by the bits of green pepper and the brilliant red of the tomatoes.

Served piping hot from the oven or cold and refreshing on a bed of greens, this "something special" for the family is also something quick and easy for Mom to fix.

INGREDIENTS:
 8 medium sized ripe tomatoes
 4 tablespoons minced onion
 2 tablespoons minced green pepper
 4 tablespoons butter or margarine

1 7-ounce can tuna fish
 2 cups cooked rice
 1 teaspoon curry powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1/2 cup water

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: To make 3 liberal cups of fluffy rice, put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover saucepan with a lid and leave over this

low heat for 14 minutes. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat. Use exact measurements of uncooked rice and water. Time the cooking accurately.

For real convenience and economy of time and effort, keep unused rice in the refrigerator in a covered container at all times. Use it for many quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

METHOD: Peel tomatoes easily by scalding, plunging into cold water and then peeling. Slice off stem end of tomatoes. Carefully scoop out pulp. Cook onion and green pepper in the butter or margarine until tender. Add the tuna fish, rice, curry powder, salt, pepper and water. Mix thoroughly. Fill the tomatoes with the tuna and rice mixture and bake at 350° F. about 15 minutes or until the tomatoes are tender. Serve hot. Garnish with green pepper rings if desired.

For a cool and refreshing salad, chill the tomatoes after they are stuffed and serve on salad greens. This recipe makes 8 servings or 3 cups of the curried tuna and rice mixture.
