Red Cross Asks For Disaster Aid

Stanley Webb, chairman, Eastland County Chapter, Red Cross, has received an appeal from E. Roland Harriman, head of the national organization, declaring:

"Needs continue to grow in the disaster affected areas. It is estimated the number of families who will register with the Red Cross for rehabilitation assistance exceeds 10,000 and continues to mount.

This will require funds in excess of \$8,000,000. Your chapter has been assigned a rock bottom quota of \$540 and we expect you to make every effort to have it substantially oversubscribed."

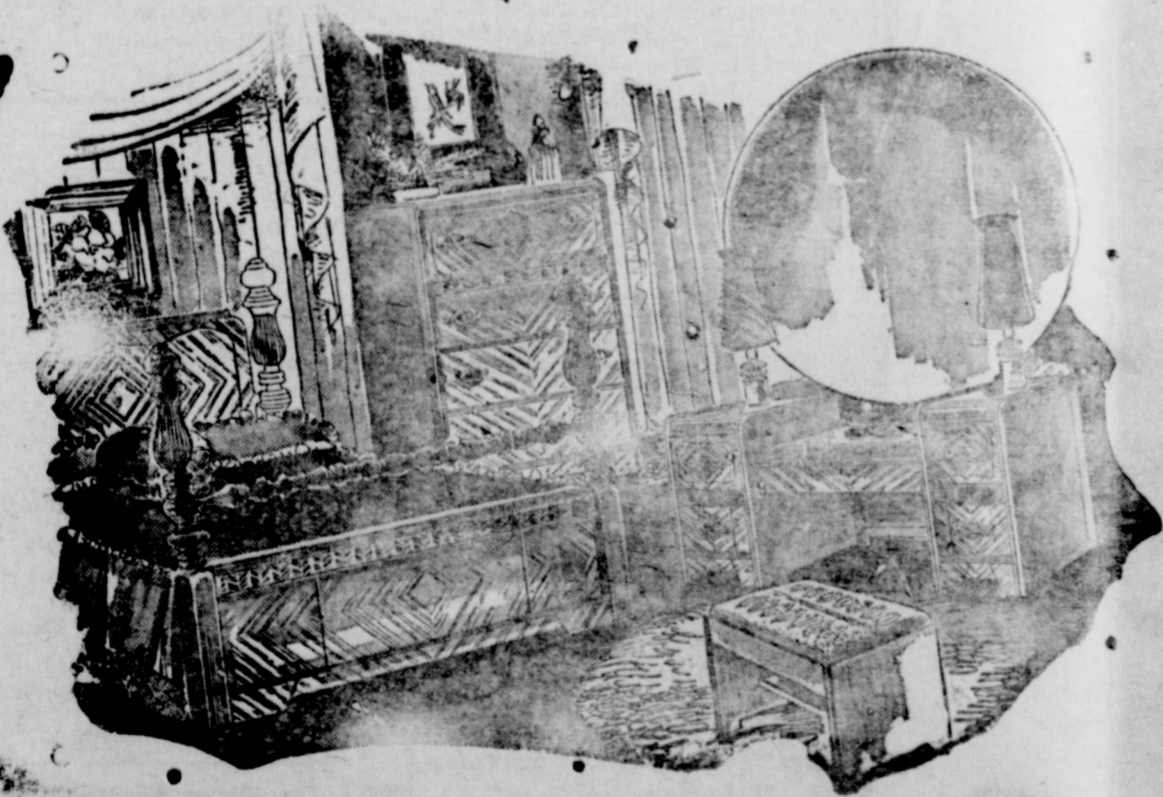

**Vets Questions
And Answers**

Question: When a person receives in social security payments as much as the total amount he has paid as taxes on his earnings under social security, will his benefits be discontinued?

Answer: The answer is "no." A person's retirement benefit is based on a formula applied against his average earnings. Earnings up to \$4200 a year can be counted toward his social security beginning with 1955. When he retires at 65 or later, his benefit is payable for the rest of his life. Although his benefits may be suspended by reason of employment or for other causes, his entitlement to benefits will not be terminated until his death. In other words, the "total" benefits paid are not restricted by the amount of tax that a worker has paid but are determined by the number of months he lives after his retirement. Another point to remember is that even after the beneficiary's death, payments may continue to his widow for her life time.
