Gold Star Girl To Be Named By County 4-H Clubs

Each year one Gold Star girl is chosen for Eastland County. This is the highest honor that a 4-H Club member can achieve in a county. This award is presented each year at the annual rally day held each spring.

The Gold Star girl for 1954-1955 will be selected sometime in August. A committee composed of two previous Gold Star winners and two members of the Triple EEE Committee of the Home Demonstration Council will select the winner. The committee will judge the records and visit each girl to see the work that she has done.

To be eligible for this award a 4-H girl must have:

1. Completed or be completing her third year in 4-H Club work.
2. Successfully completed a demonstration (one of the major demonstrations carried through this or a previous club year.)
3. Must not have been a Gold Star winner.

Attention Called To New Food Law

Dr. W. P. Lee, city health officer, reported Saturday that recent changes in the Texas food handling law placed the responsibility of health certificates, on both the employer and the employee.

He pointed out that H. B. 702 passed by the state legislature had amended the old law so that both the employer and employee were held responsible for the employee having the certificate.

The new law became effective on May 12, 1955. Health certificates are valid for six months and Dr. Lee advised all employers and employees of places handling food to check certificates in order to stay within the law.

Vets Questions And Answers

QUESTION: What changes were recently made in the Social Security Law?

ANSWER: The 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Law extended and improved the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance

the law extended protection to about ten million additional workers and their families and provided for increased benefit payments for present and future beneficiaries. Brought in the system for the first time in 1955 are self-employed architects, funeral directors, engineers, farmers, and accountants. The changes raised the earnings base to \$4200 and made an important revision in the retirement test. The new law preserves the benefit rights for the totally disabled and gives the insured worker the right to have up to five years of low or no income disregarded in determining his average monthly wage for social security benefit purposes. - INGREDIENTS:**
 1 cup uncooked white rice
 2 cups water
 1 teaspoon salt
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 1 cup chopped celery
 Dash of black pepper
 1/4 cup water or turkey broth

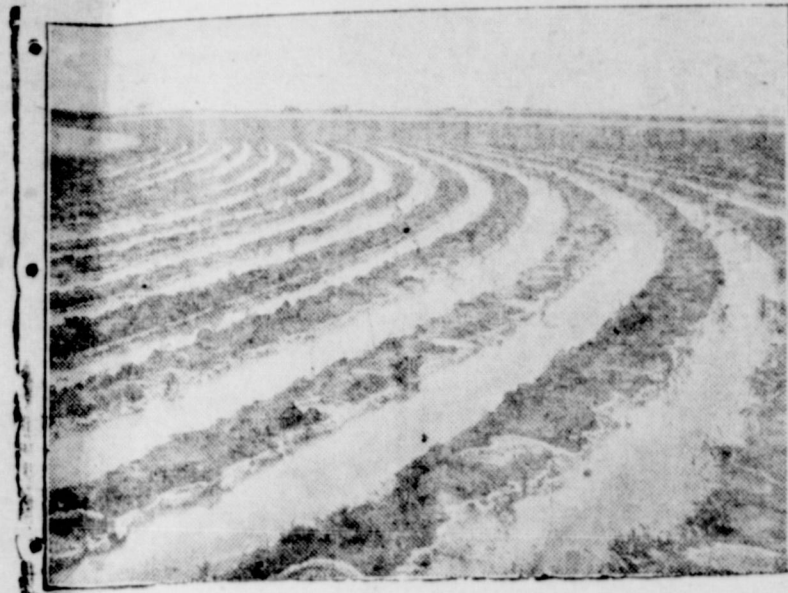
METHOD: Spread rice in a shallow pan and place in a 400° F. oven. When the grains turn slightly yellow, stir well. Continue to toast, stirring occasionally, until rice grains are a light

golden color. This takes 15 to 20 minutes. Put the toasted rice in a saucepan. Add the water and salt. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid and leave over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove from heat, but leave lid on 10 minutes.

While the rice is cooking, melt the butter or margarine in a saucepan. Add the onion and celery, occasionally. Add onion and celery mixture to the rice and mix in the bread crumbs, egg, salt, poultry seasoning, pepper and broth or water. Stuff lightly into the bird. Do not pack as the stuffing expands during the cooking. Stuff the bird just before it is placed in the oven. Do not stuff and refrigerate. This stuffing, however, may be prepared ahead of time so long as the liquids are not mixed with the dry ingredients until the turkey is to be stuffed and cooked. Extra stuffing can be baked in a separate pan or made into balls. The recipe makes about 6 cups of stuffing.

Allow 3/4 cup of stuffing for each pound of poultry, dressed weight, or 1 cup for each pound ready-to-cook weight.

FARM POND AND TERRACE WORK KEEPS SCS TECHNICIANS BUSY

Farm ponds were staked recently for Roy Lane farm, located 5 miles southeast of Carbon; C. M. Pogue, 1 mile east of Eastland; A. E. Howton, Jr., 8 miles north of Desdemona; F. R. King, 3 miles northwest of Ranger; Stanley Miller, 4 mile north of Kokomo, and J. T. Harlow, 6 miles northwest of Eastland. Soil Conservation Service Technicians assisting the district worked with the above land owners and contractors in locating and staking these farm ponds.

Diversion terraces were run to farm ponds on the Lane, Howton, King, and Harlow farms in order to furnish necessary drainage into these ponds.

Landowners recognize the need of a dependable water supply so distributed to encourage more even use of rangeland, without damage to their better native grasses.

Farm ponds were completed and final checks made on Eddie Bryant, 5 miles west of Gorman; Claude Allen, 12 miles south of Strawn; Ernest Reich, 6 miles south of Cisco; C. G. Stencheomb, 4 miles southeast of Cisco; U. E. Brown, 2 miles north of Nimrod; Martin Reich, 3 miles west of Carbon; C. M. Pogue, - mile east of Eastland, and Roy Lane, 5 miles southeast of Carbon.

Terrace lines were run on the Gordon Woods home on the Cisco and Breckenridge highway. Nearly 3 miles of terraces were completed and checked out for T. C. Hart, 4½ miles northeast of Cisco. A. R. Jennings, 3½ miles northwest of Ranger, and Bill Childers, 5 miles northeast of Cisco; plan to terrace their cropland soon.

Johnnie Aaron, 3 miles south of Eastland; R. F. King 3 miles northwest of Ranger; U. E. Brown, 2 miles north of Nimrod; Austin Flint 10 miles west of Cisco and others are giving their grass land a complete rest and deferment to increase the vigor and

spread of their native grasses.

Many of these ranges, where rested, will produce a seed crop. As pointed out after the flood of May 18, 1955 based in soil moisture penetration test made by local Soil Conservation Service Technicians bare or nearly bare ground lost 80 to 85 per cent of the total rainfall where land with a good cover of grasses retain about 80 to 85 per cent of the total rainfall that was received. Grass is a crop and like other crops require moisture to produce. Grass land management is a very important practice for all livestock men. It conserves much needed moisture and in turn produce a profitable crop of grass for livestock.

Supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District wish to encourage more ranchers to rest their pastures and experience the value of growing a good cover of high producing grasses.

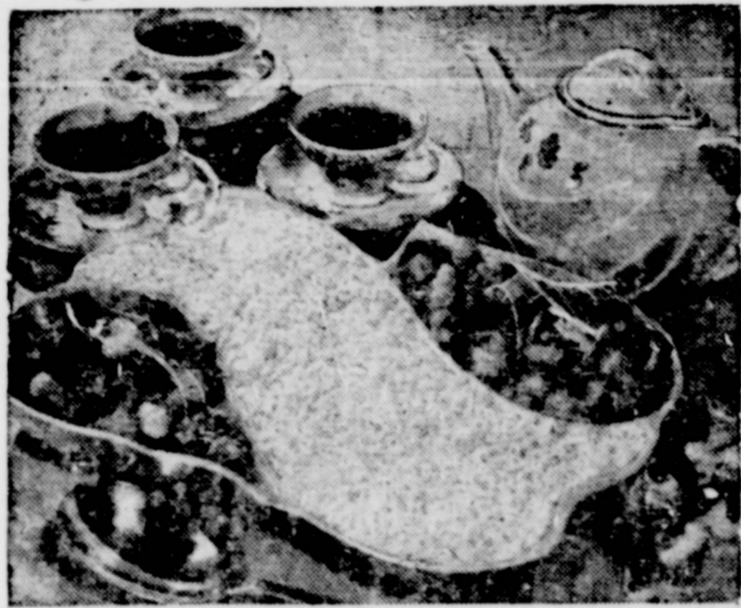

Almond Chicken With Rice

Chinese Chicken Almond With Rice, a delightful delicately flavored dish with chicken, celery topping, is sure to please your family. It makes an attractive "one main dish type meal" and is easily served to a crowd.

Fresh or canned mushrooms may be used for making Chinese Almond Chicken.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 1 cup sliced mushrooms (canned or fresh)
- 1 cup almonds — blanched
- 8 tablespoons salad oil, to be used 1 tablespoon at a time
- 1 clove garlic, cut in half
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup cubed bamboo shoots (canned)
- 1 cup thinly sliced water chestnuts (canned)
- 1 cup thinly sliced celery
- 1 cup diced, cold chicken (fresh or canned)
- 1 tablespoons liquid (1 tablespoon each, from bamboo shoots and water chestnut cans)

INGREDIENTS FOR GRAVY

- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 4 tablespoons water
- 4 teaspoons soy sauce

GARNISH

- 1 cup sliced green onion

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE—To make 3 cups fluffy rice: Put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt in a two-

quart saucepan and cover with a tight-fitting lid. Bring to a vigorous boil. Then reduce the heat as low as possible and steam for 14 minutes or until all the water is absorbed, leaving the separate rice grains with their full nutritional value. This makes very firm rice grains. (If you prefer more tender rice grains, add 1/2 cup more water and increase the slow cooking time 4 or 5 minutes.) Remove the lid, permit the rice to steam dry to the desired consistency and the grains will be separate and fluffy. Never stir rice; lift gently with a fork.

METHOD: Brown almonds in 1 tablespoon oil. Set aside. With table fork, mash garlic into salt in skillet. (Be sure there is a tight-fitting cover, which can be used later.) Add 1 tablespoon oil, then add chicken. Brown lightly. Add 1 tablespoon oil and then bamboo shoots and mushrooms. Brown lightly. Add liquid, drained from canned bamboo shoots and water chestnuts. Cover tightly. Cook over low heat 5 minutes. Add water chestnuts, celery and 1/2 of the almonds. Just heat through. Celery and chestnuts should remain crisp. For gravy... shake up in small jar, cornstarch, salt, sugar, water and soy sauce. Stir into mixture. Cook until liquid thickens and is smooth. Sprinkle over dish, green onions and rest of almonds. Serve with hot fluffy cooked rice. This will serve 4

Tips on Touring

Twenty million anglers can't be wrong about the fun of fishing. But they sure can make mistakes about the best time to fish.

Here are some portents for a lucky day's catch that you can look for when planning to drive off to your favorite piscatorial retreat.

Fish bite best when they can see best. This means they feed more when the waters are clear, not muddy. The moon seems to affect the fish's appetite too. In fact, there's a saying, "Fish bite best when the moon is bright, and this is true both day and night," that many fishermen swear by.

A good off-shore breeze is another lucky omen. The ripple on the water hides you from the fish. Rough water, however will hide the bait from the fish.

Many anglers consult a barometer before setting forth on their sport. They stay in bed if the barometer is low, but jump out early and fast when it is high or rising.

Incidentally, the warmer the water, the deeper should be your plugs, spoons or spinners as the fish seek out the cooler levels.

Actually, the enjoyment, for most people, is not in catching fish—but just in "goin' fishin'."

Easy TV Supper Features Chicken Cutlets With Cranberry-Apple Relish

Both the Chicken Cutlets and the Cranberry-Apple Relish for this TV Supper can be made ahead of time. At mealtime the Chicken Cutlets are fried to a piping hot golden brown while the sauce and the asparagus (or other favorite vegetable) are heating. Treat yourself to a real lazy and relaxing evening by serving this meal on paper plates or trays and end dish washing worries for the evening! You'll have fun fixing and serving this meal. You may want to treat your friends to this TV supper idea whenever they come around and you don't want to stay in the kitchen!

CHICKEN CUTLET WITH EASY SAUCE.
 Green Olive Garnish
 Buttered Hot Asparagus
CHILLY CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH
 Hot Bread Sticks
 Ginger Cookies to Pass

INGREDIENTS FOR CHICKEN CUTLETS
 1-1/3 cups water
 1 teaspoon salt
 2/3 cup uncooked white rice
 2 cups finely diced cooked chicken
 1 tablespoon chopped onion
 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/8 teaspoon pepper
 2 egg yolks
 2 egg whites, slightly beaten
 1 cup fine cracker crumbs
 Cooking fat for frying cutlets
 1, 10 1/2 oz. can condensed cream of chicken soup
 1/2 cup water

INGREDIENTS FOR CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH:
 2 cups cranberries
 2 apples, pared and cored
 1 orange
 1 lemon
 3/4 cup beet or cane sugar

METHOD FOR MAKING CHICKEN CUTLETS: Put the water, salt and rice in a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Turn off heat. Leave lid on for 10 minutes. Add the chicken, onion, lemon rind, salt, pepper and egg yolks to the rice and mix thoroughly. Separate the mixture into 6 equal portions of 1/2 cup each. Press into balls. Chill. Cover if mixture is left in refrigerator more than two hours. Press the rice and chicken mixture together firmly and shape into "pork chop shaped" cutlets.

Dip cutlets first into the egg whites, then into cracker crumbs. Chill. Fry in a skillet of hot fat, cooking one side to a golden brown before turning. Serve hot with a sauce made by heating together the chicken soup and water. The cutlets may be kept hot for about 30 minutes by placing them uncovered in a 250° F. oven.

This recipe makes 6 cutlets.

METHOD FOR MAKING CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH: Put cranberries and apples through a food chopper. Quarter oranges and lemon, removing seeds and put through food chopper. Add to the cranberry-apple mixture. Mix in the sugar. Chill in the refrigerator before serving. This relish may be stored in the refrigerator for several weeks. Pass the cranberry-apple relish or serve on the tray with the cutlets.
