Old Glory Man Is Named Judge For Beef Calf Show

J. B. Pumphrey, Jr., prominent Hereford breeder of Old Glory, Texas, Stonewall County, has again been selected to judge the one day registered beef calf show at Carbon on Saturday, May 21st according to Sutton Crofts, President of the Cisco Livestock Show Association, sponsoring organization.

Pumphrey judged the first registered beef calf show last June Crofts said.

The registered beef calf show judged in pens of three animals of the same sex has attracted wide attention among breeders. It was explained that some breeders will show individual animals but not in competition as the calves will be. The calves may have been fed any way the breeder desired so long as the calf sucked its own dam. All calves must have been dropped on or after September 1, 1954 to be eligible for competition.

There will be no public sale or auction at the one day show. However breeders may sell at private treaty during the day if they wish.

All calves in the show will be purebred and subject to registration. There are more than 35 breeders of Hereford and Angus

Nine Eastland County 4-H Club boys will receive registered Duroc pigs at the county show barn, at Eastland on Saturday, May 14, according to R. B. Higgins, Jr., assistant county agent.

The pigs will be turned back from boys who received pigs last year. The pigs will be shown at the county show in Eastland in October and the winners will compete at the district show in Breckenridge. The pigs will then be bred and the choice gilt of the litter will be turned back to some lucky boy next year. After the pig has been turned back the gilt will become the property of the boy.

When you purchase a new sewing machine, you're making a lifetime investment. Its selection should not be a spur-of-the-moment thing.

If you've been thinking of replacing your older machine, you will want to give careful consideration to buying one of the many new types.

For plain sewing, patching or mending, a straight sewing machine is satisfactory. This type is also preferred for dress-making and tailoring, if now fancy effects are required.

Newer, "zig-zag" type machines are designed to handle specialty jobs like decorative stitching and embroidery. These machines cost more and also require a lot of practice to manipulate successfully.

Whether you choose a cabinet or portable machine might depend on the amount of space in your home, and the use to which you put your machine. If you choose a cabinet, look for comfort, sturdiness and convenience. If space is limited or if you need to move the machine often, a portable may be the answer.

Specialists add a word of caution about buying second-hand or rebuilt machines. Knowing your dealer is of the utmost importance here. Many second-hand machines are of the foot-threaded type which have been motorized. Beware of the "bait" ads of fly-by-night concerns who seem to offer tremendous bargains. Often these machines do not stand up and repair service is not provided by the dealer.

Lamb is one of the most delicious meats on the market and can become a family favorite if properly selected and prepared.

High quality lamb has a smooth covering of clear white, firm fat. The flesh or lean is firm, fine grained and a velvety pink. The bones are dark, porous and comparatively soft.

If the food shopper knows the various cuts of lamb, a selection can be made that best suits the pocketbook. The more expensive lamb cuts are loin chops, rib chops, crown roast, and leg-of-lamb. Less expensive and less tender cuts come from the shoulder, shank, neck and breast, and

should be cooked with most heat as braising or simmering.

Lamb should be served either hot or cold — never lukewarm. Hot lamb should be served on warmed plates.

Mint jelly and mint sauces are delicious with lamb, but many tart jellies and fruits are equally

good accompaniments.

Fruits such as pears, pineapple and peaches, are a treat when browned in the pan with roast lamb.
