Babies Set New Survival Record

The 4,060,000 babies born during 1954 set a new mark in their ability to survive the hazards of early life, statisticians for a life insurance company report. Infant mortality for the year dropped to an all-time low rate of 26.7 per 1,000 live births. This represents a reduction of almost 5 percent from the previous low recorded in 1953, and of one third from the rate of a decade ago. The number of births was more than 2 percent above the previous high established the year before, and corresponded to a rate of 25.2 births per 1,000 population residing in the country, the statisticians note. The continuing boom in births has added more than 36,750,000 babies to the nation's population within the last 10 years.

Judges Selected In 'Texas Expert' Recipe Contest

The panel members are: Miss Frances Welch, director of the Dallas Independent School Lunch Program, and Miss Anna Bines, Home Service director for Texas Electric Service Company, Fort Worth, both representing THEA; Miss Jennie S. Wilmot, Associate Professor of Home Economics, the University of Texas, Austin, and a member of the TSNC; Mrs. Frances Hitt, chief dietician at Parkland Hospital, Dallas, and delegate-judge from the TDA; Carlton Lawler, president of Dunton's Cafeteria, Dallas, representing TRA; and consumer expert Mrs. Betty Rose Carvens, food editor of the Houston Chronicle.

eral fur market has slumped primarily because of the depressing effect on it by imported products.

Then, said Chief Clark, the drought has depleted some of the natural food items of the raccoon, such as crayfish, frogs and turtles ordinarily found around accessible water holes. Vegetation likewise has been reduced by the dry spell.

So the raccoons, all the while multiplying because of the trapping decline, are running wild. And their predatorial habits are proportionately enhanced, with damage to field crops such as corn and peanuts being listed.

The Chief Clerk said reports generally pinpoint daring raids by the raccoons. Game Warden Tom Waddell of Eagle Lake, investigated complaints that "bobcats were invading farm chicken yards." The "bobcats" turned out to be raccoons. Junction in the Hill Country, relayed stories about raccoons coming right into town seeking food. And the Amarillo News-Globe carried an item about a raccoon trying to crash the door of a city home, presumably attracted by cooking odors.

Strangely, the ringtail is a prime target for trappers since its fur is in great demand. And South Texas field reports say mink, concentrated around sarce water-holes, are yielding good trapping bags with prices per pelt ranging up to \$16. Some cowboys in the costal plains reportedly are picking up pin money by trapping mink in their spare time.

The trapping season under the General State Law continues through January. A state trapping license cost \$1.

Raisin-Pecan Timbales With Hot Lemon Sauce

You'll want to show off these dessert timbales because they look so clever with the bits of toasted pecans and plump raisins in beautiful color contrast to the snowy white timbales. The lemon sauce is easy to make and oh, so pretty, served hot over the Raisin-Pecan Timbales.

RAISIN-PECAN TIMBALES WITH HOT LEMON SAUCE

Ingredients for Timbales:

- 2 cups water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup uncooked white rice
- 1/2 cup beef or cane sugar
- 1/2 cup cooked raisins
- 1/2 cup coarsely chopped toasted pecans
- 1/2 pt. (1 cup) chilled whipping cream
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Ingredients for Lemon Sauce:

- 1 cup beef or cane sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind

METHOD FOR MAKING TIMBALES: Put the water, salt and rice into a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible.

Cover and leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Turn the heat off. Leave lid on for 10 minutes. Stir the sugar into the hot rice. Chill the rice. Fold in the raisins and the pecans. It is important that the pecans are toasted. Do this by placing the pecans on a greased shallow pan in a 350° oven for 10 minutes, or until browned. Whip the cream and stir in the vanilla. Fold the whipped cream into the chilled rice mixture.

Use a wet custard cup for molding the timbales. Press the rice into the custard cup and then unmold by running a knife around the edge of the custard cup and shaking out the timbales. Cover and store in the refrigerator until time to serve. To serve, garnish the top of each timbale with a toasted pecan and serve with the hot lemon sauce.

This recipe makes 6 timbales if a custard cup holding 2/3 of a cup is used for molding.

METHOD FOR MAKING THE LEMON SAUCE: Mix together the sugar, cornstarch and salt in a saucepan. Slowly stir in the boiling water. Cook over a medium heat stirring constantly, until clear and thick. Stir in the lemon juice and lemon rind. If desired, color with yellow food coloring. Serve hot over the Raisin-Pecan Timbales.

San Antonio Man Tells Of Killing King Of All Bucks

AUSTIN, Dec. 15. — How he hunted and bagged the world's record white-tailed buck trophy is described by Henderson Coquat of San Antonio in the coming December issue of Texas Game and Fish Magazine.

The giant white-tailed, officially recognized by the Boone and Crockett Club, had a rack spread of 27 inches. It was taken in Webb County in deep South Texas in the fall of 1949 but it was not formally designated as the king of the white tails until last March.

Coquat bought the scene of the historic harvest — the Old Apache Ranch — from the government in the fall of 1948. The ranch, on the east bank of the Rio Grande about fifty miles north of Laredo, was part of a bombing range during the last war. It bore so much shooting evidence that the new owner said he doubted "that much game had survived the mighty bombardments of our eager young pilots."

The champion went on in his narrative: "But I had not given full credit to the cunning and the courage of the whitetail. Not only had a goodly number of them survived, but they had learned what a man with a gun meant, and how to outwit him."

Coquat related how he had become increasingly intrigued by the tall tales brought back by his guests who referred to the enchanted bucks "with rocking chair-like heads that stared them into inaction."

Here is Coquat's own description of the climax to his quest:

"I was alert and quick in feeling that a huge-ghostly, gray deer was threading his way through the chaparral and cactus about 200 yards away. He may have been sneaking through the chaparral and cactus about 200 yards away . . . but whatever his business, he sensed my presence just as I sensed his, and started in the opposite direction with that quick, crazy, dodging motion that has saved the lives of millions of his kind.

"But I had seen his horns and realized in that millionth of a second that he was the deer I had hunted all my life. All the

years of hunting experience, and all the hunters' instinct, surged up in me in that flashing moment, and my .250 began to talk. The first two shots had hollow sounds, and I knew they had not touched him. Then just the right shot showed at just the right instant,

and the touch of the trigger was synchronized as happens in the best (or the luckiest) of shots. The crack of the rifle was followed by the thud of the bullet that said success. Down went the great rack of horns, and all was quiet except my pounding heart."

Texans Are Asked To help Restore Game Birds, Fish

AUSTIN, Jan. 5. — The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission suggested Texans interested in helping reinforce the hard hit birds and beasts and fishes "can find no better time to act than now." He said the present low population status of many species provides good opportunities for effective teamwork to help the inevitable comeback.

"Everything will be harnessed to the pickup in habitat when the rains finally come, said the Director of Restoration. "Nature will do the usual good job in pacing restoration of food and cover. But the squeeze has become so acute that hunters, land owners and nature lovers will find plenty of chances to help out."

He said persons interested, for example, in helping re-production of quail cover may write the Commission headquarters in Austin for special literature. There is a pamphlet prepared by Wildlife Biologist Dan Lay on quail culture which provides specific information on planting and cultivation of especially recommended plant cover, such as multiflora rose and bicolor lespedeza.

"There's not much that can be done while the drought lasts except to plan," said the Director. "Of course, in rare irrigated areas actual planting of cover may begin. Generally, interested persons may work with their local sportsmen's groups."

The Chief Aquatic Biologist (Marion Toole) said the dry spell provides a good opportunity to improve farm tanks for restocking with fish when water levels are restored. A special bulletin is available on that, too. He said so many requests have been made for the Commission to salvage game fish from shrinking tanks that the inquirers have to be informed that they should harvest the fish for the home "deep freeze" and look ahead to the time when restocking may be undertaken.
