Will Rogers Once Visited Stamford Cowboy Reunion

STAMFORD, June 18—Many traditions enrich the 24-year history of the Texas Cowboy Reunion but none is more deeply cherished than the memory of the visit of the beloved Will Rogers to the rodeo in 1935.

Their son, Bill (now a movie star himself and a former Congressman) had the measles and Mrs. Rogers was afraid that Will would catch the ailment too so she suggested he leave. Rogers had heard of the Texas Cowboy Reunion — in fact, he knew it was then in progress and so he decided to attend.

From his Beverly Hills home, he phoned the Los Angeles airport and found there was a plane leaving for Texas in an hour and a half. It was an hour's drive to the field but Will packed in a matter of minutes and he climbed aboard at 7 p. m. With him was his portable typewriter and he wrote the long syndicated article that many newspapers published on Sunday.

It was 6:40 a. m. on July 3 that he landed in Abilene, went into town and ate a hearty breakfast at the Wooten Hotel, then hired a taxicab for Stamford, 38 miles away. The driver was Johnnie Schug and the car was brand-new. As they passed through Anson, Rogers remarked, "This is the place Larry Chittenden wrote the ballad about." He was referring, of course, to "The Cowboys' Christmas Ball."

Nobody in Stamford knew he was coming as he hadn't known it himself till the night before. So, unannounced, he went to the box office, bought a bleachers ticket, seated himself and watched the activities in the rodeo arena.

Pretty soon, a spectator's eye alighted on the visitor and said spectator "did a double take", then whispered to his neighbor, "There's Will Rogers" and the word spread through the crowd. This was at the morning performance. At the afternoon show, W. G. Swenson, president of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, provided Will with "Tommy", a famed roping horse, and he acted as a pickup man.

"His roping was wonderful," Swenson declares. Rogers himself grinningly described his activities differently, "I was just messin' around, getting in everybody's way."

He greeted old-time cowboys, some of whom he had known in the days when he himself was a range rider. One friend on hand was the noted Texas Ranger captain, Tom Hickman. They had competed in the same rodeos before Will had become a star of stage, screen and radio.

CONTROL OF DEER POPULATION SUCCESSFUL DURING PAST YEAR

Field biologists of the Game and Fish Commission found that the special state law permitting control of deer overpopulation worked precisely to the original pattern, according to an article in the June issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine.

The law was applied exclusively to Mason and Gillespie Counties in the Edwards Plateau which contains most of the state's white-tailed deer.

Under the experimental program, tried out last fall for the first time, both buck deer and doe deer were harvested under strict supervision and within limits prescribed by biologists and landowners.

It was the first time antlerless deer had been legally hunted in Texas, and the action followed severe herd dieoffs.

"The need for means of controlling overpopulations of deer in Mason and Gillespie Counties has been recognized by some since 1941," reported Biologists Eugene Walker and Bob Ramsey who conducted surveys and compiled data as a basis for the historic 1953 hunt.

"The most lamentable aspects

concerning past overpopulation problems has been there was no legal means of controlling the deer through harvesting the surplus animals and thereby providing sport for a host of hunters, salvaging tons of edible venison that rotted in the woods, and reducing the load on ranges already hard-pressed as the result of carrying limit stocking rates of livestock and deer.

"No animal population, be it deer, cattle, sheep or goats can be controlled and stabilized by removing only a portion of males each year and retaining all females to reproduce and ultimately die of old age on the range. Ranchers operating on this basis would be bankrupt in short order; yet this is the method which has been used where overpopulated areas were known to exist.

"The buck law has been successful in that deer may be hunted and continue to increase until the saturation point has been reached. After that point is reached, however, continued hunting of bucks only has proved an inadequate means of controlling deer numbers. The ultimate results have been pastures overcrowded with animals of subnormal stamina and size, a reduced fawn crop, and depleted ranges."

Tips on Touring

Twenty million anglers can't be wrong about the fun of fishing. But they sure can make mistakes about the best time to fish.

Here are some portents for a lucky day's catch that you can look for when planning to drive off to your favorite piscatorial retreat.

Fish bite best when they can see best. This means they feed more when the waters are clear, not muddy. The moon seems to affect the fish's appetite too. In fact, there's a saying, "Fish bite best when the moon is bright, and this is true both day and night," that many fishermen swear by.

A good off-shore breeze is another lucky omen. The ripple on the water hides you from the fish. Rough water, however will hide the bait from the fish.

Many anglers consult a barometer before setting forth on their sport. They stay in bed if the barometer is low, but jump out early and fast when it is high or rising.

Incidentally, the warmer the water, the deeper should be your plugs, spoons or spinners as the fish seek out the cooler levels.

Actually, the enjoyment, for most people, is not in catching fish but just in "going fishing."
