## Nurse Shortage Continues Over State, Cox Says

AUSTIN, April 8.—Increases in hospital and nursing home beds and a jump in the number of people carrying hospital insurance are the two chief causes of the nursing shortage in Texas and elsewhere, state health officials say.

The fact that there are more and more hospital beds for insured persons to take advantage of during brief illnesses indicate that nurses have to spread their time thinner and thinner to meet the demand.

Other factors mentioned in the shortage are increasing numbers of dependent children and oldsters, and a shortage of high school graduates who are psychologically adapted for nursing duties.

Nursing re-registrations in Texas last year totaled 21,889, according to figures kept by the State Board of Nursing Examiners. A board spokesman pointed out that figure did not include new registrations, but did include some out-of-state nurses who wanted to maintain their Texas licenses.

Nursing licenses in Texas are distributed throughout hospitals and schools of nursing, in public health units and school systems, and in industry. While state health leaders were pointing up nursing shortages in Texas, World Health Organizations authorities were doing the same thing on a world basis. World Health Day was observed April 7 with the theme: "The Nurse-Pioneer of Health."

The heart of the nursing profession, WHO officials say, is contained in a line written 100 years ago by Florence Nightingale of Crimean War fame.

"A loving heart is not enough," she wrote. "The art of caring for

**Senate Bill Asks  
Money To Provide  
School Buildings**

AUSTIN, March 31. — Senator

Wagonseller is the co-author of a Bill in the Senate that will go far toward improving the additional facilities for the Texas School for the Deaf, he says.

The Bill calls for an appropriation of \$2,500,000 to provide safe, fireproof facilities for more than four hundred children.

The Governor, in his address to the Special Session of the 53rd Legislature, described the replacement and renovation of buildings that the Texas School for the Deaf "probably the most urgently needed" of all emergency legislation.

At the regular session of the 53rd Legislature, Senator Wagonseller introduced the same bill providing for additional appropriation for a building program at the Texas School for the Deaf. However, the Bill failed to pass at that session. It was an emergency then; it is an emergency now, he said.

This is one of a series of bills pertaining to the Texas School for the Deaf that the Senator has introduced since he became a member of the legislature in 1946. He has handled practically every major phase of legislation for the Texas School for the Deaf since the beginning of his service in the Legislature.

"Let fire break out in one of those buildings," cautioned the Senator, "and the result could be nothing less than tragedy."

"The Senate has already passed this bill, and it is hoped that the House of Representatives will do so without hesitation. The Bill will call for no new taxation, as the comptroller has estimated that the money is now on hand for such an appropriation."

"Even under the best conditions," Senator Wagonseller stated, "the Deaf Child has the greatest and most difficult road to travel in securing an education."

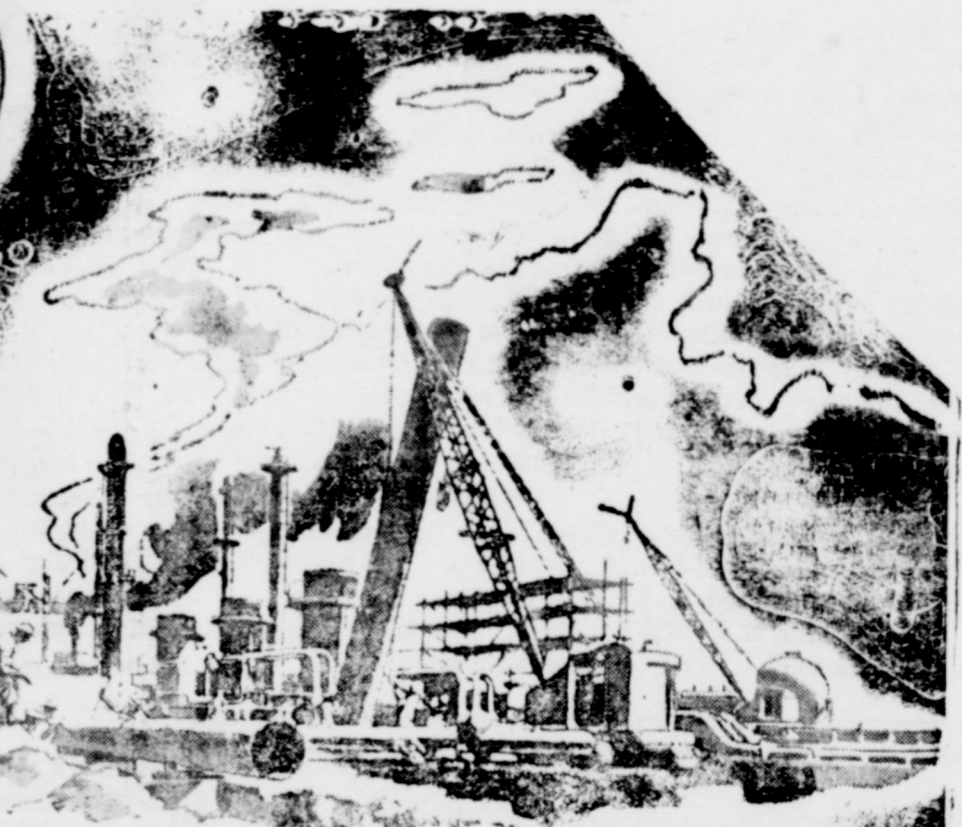

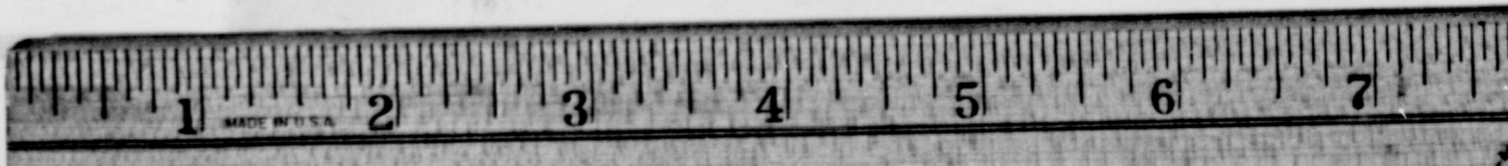

The entire nation will be better off when the shortage of trained nurses is overcome.

**Tarleton Plans Garden Courses**

STEPHENVILLE, March 30.—L. J. Tolle, Jr., assistant professor, department of floriculture and landscape gardening at A & M. College, will teach three 3-week training courses in floriculture at Tarleton this summer.  
Designed for both professional and amateur flower gardeners, the courses cover home gardening, flower store management, and commercial production methods.  
Production methods will be taught from June 7-25 and will cover environment factors, soils and fertilizers, propagation, insect control, disease control and greenhouse management.  
Flower store management will be taught from June 23-July 16, and will cover floral design, business management, shop layout, care of cut flowers, pot plants foliage plants, and techniques.  
Home gardening will be taught from July 19-August 6 and will include soils and fertilizers, insect control, environment factors, garden flowers, and floral arranging.
