Pony Show Set Saturday

The 11th annual Shetland Pony Show at Lazy "N" Stables will be produced Saturday, July 12, against a background of antique vehicles, which will be on display during the annual event.

The show is sponsored by the West Texas Shetland Pony Association, and is expected to attract ponies from a wide area of Texas and some from Oklahoma.

Judge for the show will be Col. (US Army Ret.) Anthony Lavite.

The display of antique vehicles will include a horse-drawn ambulance, plantation landau, surry with a fringe on top, miniature stage coach, a miniature farm wagon, buckboard, roadsters and a show buggy.

The show will begin at 1 p.m. No admission will be charged for this show, and those attending may register for a Shetland pony to be given away later in the afternoon. There will be no requirement for purchase of any type to be eligible for the door prize.

HOME TOWN Talk

There's a movement afoot to attempt to acquire the old depot of the Abilene Southern Railroad, to be remodeled along the original lines of the old building which served countless thousands during the railroad passenger days.

There is a movement afoot to attempt to acquire the old depot of the Abilene Southern Railroad, and convert it into a museum. This idea has been going around for quite some time, but there has been a bit more thought and talk about it of late, perhaps generated by the Bicentennial celebration, and the sudden realization that something should be done to preserve some of the remaining remnants of our physical heritage.

The "movement" hasn't built up much steam yet, but with a little stoking of the fires, the idea could grow.

Many towns around the country have acquired old depots for this purpose, and it seems a logical suggestion. Albany, for instance, has had a museum in their abandoned

depot for a number of years, and visitation is said to be quite high.

After all, what better place or building could be found for a museum than an old depot, which lived through the era of the railroad? Much of this country was opened for settlement with the coming of the railroad; and these depots were the centers of most of the activities of the towns and smaller cities in the early days. Through conversion to museums, these old buildings could regain to some extent their important role in the community life.

If, through some stroke of good fortune, Winters could acquire its old depot for a museum, it would require more than a little work and effort to carry out the plans. A museum—or any other worthy project, for that matter—would not "just happen." The responsibility of completion and continuance would fall on the shoulders of us all.

It can be done, if we want strongly enough for it to be done. Just talking about it won't make it happen, though. And it should be done while interest in the Bicentennial is high—a few months, and the idea probably would die from lack of interest. Many people are ready to begin if they are just given the go-ahead by the rest of us.

To Spend \$2,000 For City Meeting Place

The City Council Monday night appropriated \$2,000 to be used for remodeling the south section of the second floor of the City Hall, with plans to use the room for council meetings.

Buford Baldwin, city secretary, said the kitchen, which is located about the middle of the second floor, will be partitioned off from the planned council meeting room. It is hoped that the north section of the second floor, and the kitchen area, can be remodeled in the near future, he said.

In other action, the council accepted the resignation of Don Reese, who has been serving as city attorney. Reese will move from the city, it was stated.

The council also authorizes sending four firemen to firemen's training school, to be held July 20-25 at Texas A&M University.

Baldwin also said Texas Cablevision Co., of San Angelo, is "on schedule" in their project to bring cable television to Winters viewers. He said crews are surveying for installation of cables throughout town, and expects work to

begin soon on erection of a receiving tower in Winters. The schedule calls for completion in October, Baldwin said.

Winters Young Farmers will have an ice cream supper Monday, July 14, in the Winters Community Center, beginning at 8 p.m.

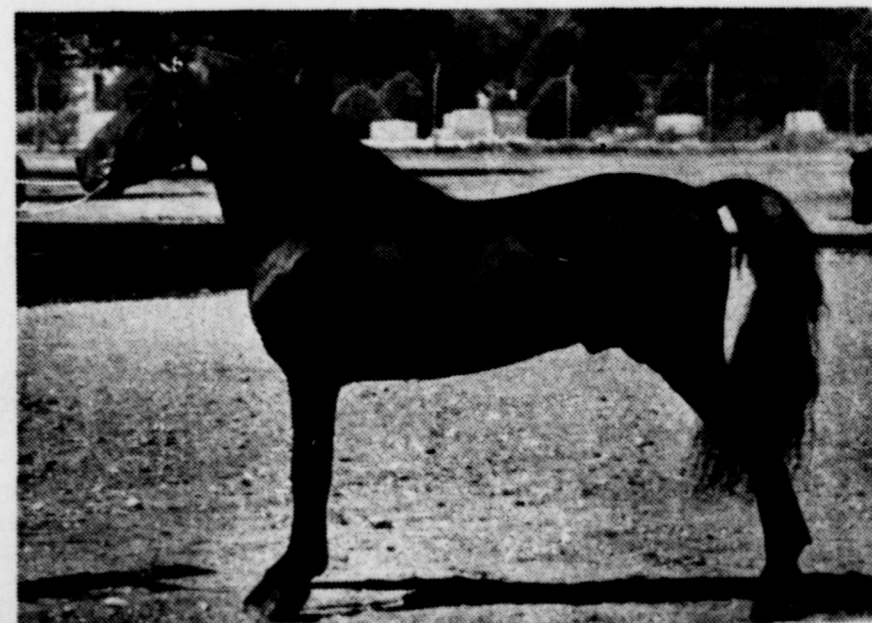
Members are asked to bring either cookies, cake or a freezer of ice cream.

ABILENE & SOUTHERN RAILWAY COMPANY, NOTICE OF PROPOSED ABANDONMENT

Notice is hereby given that the Interstate Commerce Commission is being requested to issue a certificate of public convenience and necessity permitting abandonment of the entire line of railroad of Abilene & Southern Railway Company extending from railroad milepost 0.0 near Abilene, Texas, in a southerly direction to milepost 39, the end of the line at Winters, Texas, a distance 39.0 miles, in Taylor and Runnels Counties, Texas. This line includes the stations of Abilene, Tuscola, Bradshaw and Winters. In a related application The Texas and Pacific Railway Company is seeking authority to acquire and operate Abilene & Southern Railway track from milepost 0.0 to milepost 7.31 near Abilene, Texas.

The interest of the employees will be protected by "the Burlington conditions" as set out in Chicago, B. & Q. R. Co. Abandonment, 257 I.C.C. 700.

REASONS FOR PROPOSED ABANDONMENT:

The reasons for this proposed abandonment are that the stations located on this section of line do not produce sufficient inbound or outbound traffic to allow the Applicant to operate these stations profitably. In 1974, the Applicant incurred significant losses on this section of line and does not anticipate any conditions which would allow profitable operation.

The line requires extensive embankment restoration and additional ballast. Five timber bridges require reconstruction or replacement in the near future.

In the opinion of the applicant, the granting of the authority sought in this application will not constitute a major Federal action having a significant effect upon the quality of the human environment.

In accordance with the Commission's regulations (49 CFR 1100.250) in Ex Parte No. 55 (Sub-No. 4), Implementation National Environmental Policy Act, 1969, 340 I.C.C. 431 (1972), any protests may include a statement indicating the presence or absence of any effect of the requested Commission action on the quality of the human environment. If any such effect is alleged to be present, the statement shall include information relating to the relevant factors set forth in Ex Parte No. 55 (Sub-No. 4), supra, Part (B) (1)-(5), 340 I.C.C. 431, 461.
