Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I have a National Service Life Insurance term policy, and I've just gone back on active military duty. Will my premium be waived automatically, no that I'm in uniform?

A — No. If you want your premiums to be waived while you're in service, you must apply in writing. Waivers are not automatically granted without an application. Your unit's insurance officer can give you full details.

Q — I'm in the organized reserves, and I just spent some time on training duty. Does that time count toward my entitlement for training under the Korean GI Bill?

A — No. Training duty by members of the organized reserves may not be included in determining entitlement to Korean GI training.

Q — I'm drawing a pension for a total and permanent non-service connected disability. Would that entitle me to training under Public Law 16? I am a World War II veteran.

A — It would not. The law requires a veteran to have a compensable service-connected disability, in order to be eligible for Public Law 16 training. There are other requirements he must meet, as well.

Q — I understand I must have my original discharge papers before I can apply for GI benefits. I lost mine. Is there anything I can do?

A — Yes. You can apply for a certificate in lieu of the discharge paper, from the branch of service from which you were discharged.

Fall and Winter Gardening Hints

It is true that most Spring Gardens in the county were not very productive because of the drought and hot dry winds, but there is still a chance for a fall garden.

Take a look around in your garden that you started last spring and see if there are any plants that have survived the hot summer weather. They may still produce this Fall if you give them a little help. Such plants as tomatoes, okra, peppers, pole butterbeans and possibly black-eyed peas can be rejuvenated. Feed them fertilizer, working and watering into the soil around the plants. About a half cupful of 5-10-5 around each plant should be sufficient. Be sure to water thoroughly. If the plants have not been previously mulched spread hay about three or four inches deep around the plant over an area of about three to four feet. Mulch keeps moisture in the soil longer, keeps the ground cool, and keeps down weeds and grass. In dry weather these old plants will need to be watered about every five to seven days.

There are other vegetables that you can plant now for vegetables in early Fall and Winter. Germination at this season of the year is usually poor. It is well to increase the rate of seeding about 25% over that used in the spring garden in order to obtain a good stand. If you soak seeds overnight before planting be sure to irrigate the soil well before planting seeds. The ground should be pressed down firmly

around the seeds. Cover the row with a mulch of hay or similar material to a depth of about 2 inches until the plants begin to come up. Stir the soil frequently to conserve moisture and prevent soil packing. If gardens are irrigated it is a good idea to stir the soil just as soon as it is dry to pulverize. Avoid deep cultivation. In irrigation use about three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 5-10-5 to a 100-foot row space. Keep a sharp lookout for insects and have a supply of insecticide on hand to take care of any pest outbreaks.

These vegetables may be planted now to mature before frost: Greenbeans (Tendergreen, Topcrop, Stringless Green Pod) Mustard (Tendergreen, Florida Broad leaf), Irish Potatoes (Bliss Triumph), Radishes (Scarlet Globe), Squash (Early Prolific Straight-neck). These will withstand light frost: English Peas (Laxton's Progress), Turnips (Purpletop, Shogoin), Lettuce (Great Lakes, Salad Bowl), Cabbage (Copenhagen, Charleston Wakefield), Beets (Detroit Dark Red), Swiss Chard (Lucullus). These will withstand heavy frost: Collards (Georgia, Louisiana Sweet), Spinach (Bloomsdale), Carrots (Danver's Half Long, Shantenay).

Health Leaders Seek To Improve Food Sanitation

AUSTIN, Aug. 29. — "Texas health officials are making every effort to improve the sanitary conditions of public eating places and in addition schools are conducted to instruct foodhandlers. Moreover there are laws, rules and regulations requiring the uses of approved equipment and methods in such establishments. Nevertheless, one of the most forceful influences for sanitation is not being used and this is the public's unfavorable reaction toward dirty and unsanitary places," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The public cannot do the job entirely, nor can health departments bring about desirable and essential practices without the help of the public. As for hygienic practices, persons serving food and drink should be clean; should not cough and sneeze over the utensils and material served; should keep their hands away from their mouth and nose, hair and face; should handle all utensils by the outside instead of putting their fingers on the inside of service utensils. These are conditions a person can see, and unless these safeguards are practiced, disease may result."

Also, milk served can be appraised by the patron. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap, state grade of milk and whether it is raw or pasteurized. However, if milk is brought to a patron in a glass, he cannot know whether it is from graded supply or whether it is raw or pasteurized, but if served properly in its original container, with covered cap and legal label, the patron can secure from the label the information he should have before ever being willing to drink strange milk.

The patron should note sanitation conditions in food establishments. Are the floors, walls, ceiling clean? Are tables and counters clean? Are pies and other ready-to-serve foods protected from dust, dirt, and flies? Are flies prevalent?

"Be assured that what can be seen as a patron at the table or counter usually will be many times better, cleaner, and safer than conditions in the kitchen and other places out of sight of the patron," Dr. Cox warns.

**Strange Creature
Is Studied At UT**

AUSTIN, Sept. 4. — Univer-
sity of Texas scientists are study-
ing a strange creature which is
part plant and part animal.

Dr. Jack Myers, zoology pro-
fessor, says the creature is mostly
animal. It has the two most im-
portant animal characteristics, he
points out. It is mobile — swims
around — and can swallow solid
food.

However, its system contains
chlorophyll and between feedings
it is sustained by photosynthesis,
the mysterious process whereby
most plants utilize unlight for
growth, he adds. Experiments in-
dicate the "animal's" growth is
due mostly to feedings, while
photosynthesis only helps keep it
from starving.

Dr. Myers describes the crea-
ture as a minutely-small green,
single-celled "animal" of the most
primitive type. The scientists are
studying it in an attempt to learn
more about basic processes which
cause animals and plants to live.

Dr. Myers will describe tech-
nical studies of the creature at
the Society of General Physio-
