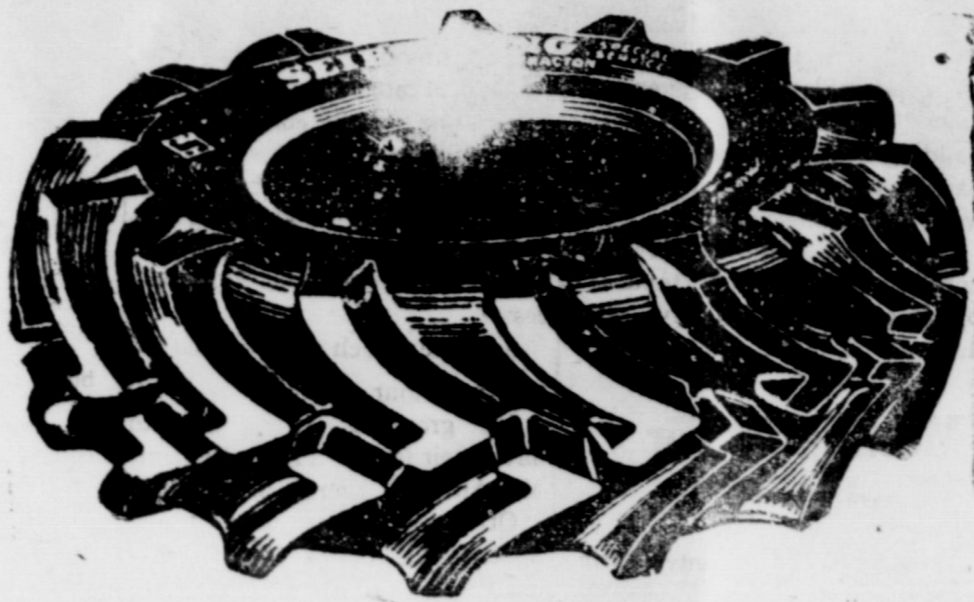

Texans Appear Contented With Duck Hunt Plans

AUSTIN, Aug. 15. — Texans
seem generally contented with
the 1953 waterfowl harvest regu-
lations, according to the Execu-
tive Secretary of the Game and
Fish Commission.

He said the response to the
state's season on ducks and geese,
running from November 6
through January 4, has been favor-
able. The fact the season ex-
tends through the Christmas holi-
days has pleased gunners on the
Gulf coast.

The Executive Secretary said
north Texas hunters understand-
ably were disappointed again at
not being zoned like the mourn-
ing dove upper state shoot. He
said prospects of a late flight
from the north as reported in
Washington should help compen-
sate for the difference.

The United States Fish and
Wildlife Service, which has final
authority over seasons for migra-
tory waterfowl, generally follow-
ed the request by the Game and
Fish Commission for a sixty-day
season, a limit of five and ten for
ducks and a limit of five for
geese.

The Executive Secretary said
the barring of baiting for water-
fowl will not affect many Texas
hunters since the practice has not
been widely followed in this
State.

The extra hour tagged to the
day's shooting period, extending
legal gunning to sunset, will have
no appreciable affect, he said.
"Waterfowl are too smart," he
explained. "It will be rough on
them for the first few days but
they soon catch on. After they
get wise, they simply won't move
around much until after the
shooting stops. In this case, the
ducks and geese simply will have
to delay moving into feeding
grounds and back up their sup-
per another hour."

Easy Rice and Cherry Pie With Coconut Crust is a New Idea for Heavenly Eating

This is a pie to remember! It is
so good you won't be able to
forget it. The rice and cherry
filling is tinted a luscious red.
The sweet and chewy coconut
crust turns a golden brown as it
bakes in the oven. As a fitting
halo for this rice dessert, which
is positively out of this world,
clouds of fluffy whipped cream
swirl over the luscious rice and
cherry filling.

The family can enjoy this sump-
tuous pie all the time because
the rice and cherry filling cooks
in a hurry and the coconut crust
takes only seconds of attention
before the oven takes over.

The three magnificently good
parts of this pie—the coconut
crust—the rice and cherry fill-
ing—the whipped cream top-
ping—combine to make one of
the year's most talked about pies.

INGREDIENTS:

- 3 tablespoons soft butter or
margarine
- 1 5 oz. package or can of moist
coconut (1 1/2 cups)
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup beet or cane sugar
- 1 1/2 cups canned tart, red cher-
ries, drained
- Red food coloring, if desired
- 1 cup whipping cream, chilled
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 cup beet or cane sugar

**PREPARING THE FLUFFY
WHITE RICE:** To make 3 lib-
eral cups of fluffy rice, put 1
cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of
cold water and 1 teaspoon of
salt into a 3-quart saucepan and
bring to a vigorous boil. Turn
the heat as low as possible. Cov-
er the saucepan with a lid and leave

over this low heat for 14 min-
utes. Turn off the heat. Do not
remove lid nor stir rice while it
is cooking. After rice has cook-
ed, remove saucepan from heat
—but keep the lid on until you
are ready to use the rice.

Use exact measurements of un-
cooked rice and water. Time the
cooking accurately.

For real convenience and econ-
omy of time and effort, keep un-
used rice in the refrigerator in
a covered container at all times.
Use it for many quick, delicious
and inexpensive soups, salads,
casserole dishes, hot breads and
desserts.

METHOD: To make the coconut
crust, spread butter or margarine
evenly over an 8 or 9 inch pie
pan. Sprinkle the coconut into
the pan and press into the but-
ter. It helps to use a moist tea-
spoon to press the coconut
against the pan. Bake in a 350°
F. oven until crisp and golden
brown.

To make the rice and cherry fill-
ing, mix together the rice, eggs,
sugar and cherries and cook
over a low heat, stirring con-
stantly, until the mixture thick-
ens. The egg whites make the
mixture foamy, but soon cook
into the rice. If desired, add red
food coloring. This makes a
more delicious looking filling.
Pour the filling into the coconut
crust. Cover with wax paper or
aluminum foil and chill in the
refrigerator.

To serve, Whip the cream and
fold in the vanilla and sugar.
Spread over the rice and cherry
filling.
Cold baking makes 8 servings.

Tips on Touring

Twenty million anglers can't be wrong about the fun of fishing. But they sure can make mistakes about the best time to fish.

Here are some portents for a lucky day's catch that you can look for when planning to drive off to your favorite piscatorial retreat.

Fish bite best when they can see best. This means they feed more when the waters are clear, not muddy. The moon seems to affect the fish's appetite too. In fact, there's a saying, "Fish bite best when the moon is bright, and this is true both day and night," that many fishermen swear by.

A good off-shore breeze is another lucky omen. The ripple on the water hides you from the fish. Rough water, however will hide the bait from the fish.

Many anglers consult a barometer before setting forth on their sport. They stay in bed if the barometer is low, but jump out early and fast when it is high or rising.

Incidentally, the warmer the water, the deeper should be your plugs, spoons or spinners as the fish seek out the cooler levels.

Actually, the enjoyment, for most people, is not in catching fish—but just in "goin' fishin'."
