Annual Campaign For Polio Agency Will Be Planned

GONZALES, Aug. 6. — On August 9, approximately 150 Divisional and Campaign chairmen, from all sections of Texas, will meet with officers and staff of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children, to discuss final plans for the annual fund-raising campaign which is scheduled to open in September.

Of paramount importance to the success of the campaign is the opportunity this session affords many of these leaders to visit the Foundation for the first time, thus enabling them to acquire knowledge of the operational procedures, treatment program, and the necessity for conducting this annual drive for funds.

During the campaign these chairmen will seek to raise a portion of the funds necessary to maintain and expand the facilities of the Gonzales treatment center of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. These facilities are available to any Texas child regardless of race, creed, or financial condition.

This non-profit, non-sectarian hospital was developed through the contributions of generous Texans from every corner of the state and has earned the approval of the American College of Surgeons as well as other accrediting agencies. It accepts patients from all over Texas, if referring physicians and the Foundation medical staff feels the child will benefit from the treatment program of physical medicine and rehabilitation.

Small Towns Lead In New Building

AUSTIN, Aug. 10.—Small cities led the state in per capital value of June building permits, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Top cities included: Irving (\$183.14 per person), San Marcos (\$76.75) and Canyon (\$41.93).

The value of June building permits was 20 per cent higher than May, and 11 per cent more than the normal seasonal rise. Most of the increase was in non-residential construction, which climbed 82 per cent, and in additions, alterations and repairs, up 22 per cent, the Bureau says.

Museum Attracts School Children And Adults Alike

AUSTIN, Aug. 10.—More than 21,800 school children were 1951-53 visitors of the Texas Memorial Museum, located on the University of Texas campus.

Director E. H. Sellards said the count includes only children who made supervised tours of the Museum, a center for rare documents and other materials illustrating the state's civic and natural history.

Approximately 75,000 persons will have visited the Texas shrine by the end of the current fiscal year, Aug. 31, Dr. Sellards estimates.

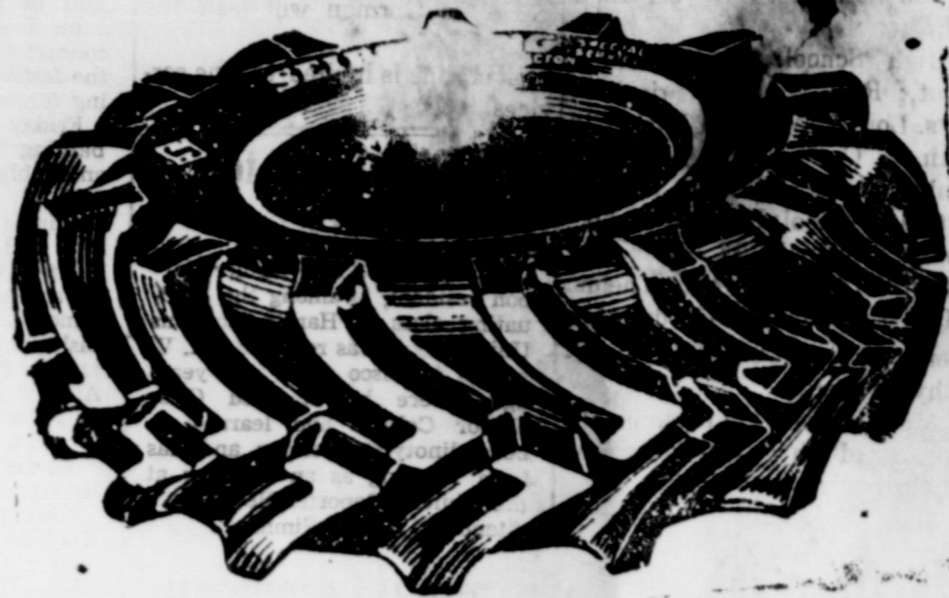

Federal Budget Cut To Save Texans In Taxes

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has estimated that Texas taxpayers will save \$538,020,000 in Federal taxes that they will not have to pay because of the \$12.6 billion in appropriations cut by the Administration and Congress from the Truman budget.

Calculating that Texas taxpayers bear 427 per cent of all Federal taxes, the Regional Chamber applied this percentage to the \$12.6 billion figure to derive its estimate.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce said, "In cutting \$12.6 billion of appropriations from the Truman Budget for 1954, the Administration and the Congress paved the way to substantial tax savings in the next few years."

The Chamber added that the cut in appropriations "cannot be expected to produce a similar reduction in Federal expenditures in 1954 from the Truman estimate of \$70 billion." It explained,

"The main reason for this is the fact that a large part of the appropriations from the Truman Budget for the new Administration and the Congress, such as for aircraft and other hard goods, were scheduled for actual expenditure in 1955 and later rather than in 1954. Consequently the savings from those cuts will not appear until 1955 or later."

The WTCC estimated that Federal spending in 1954 would total \$72 billion which is \$4.5 billion below the Truman estimate.

Almond Chicken With Rice

Chinese Chicken Almond With Rice, a delightful delicately flavored dish with chicken, celery topping, is sure to please your family. It makes an attractive "one main dish type meal" and is easily served to a crowd.

Fresh or canned mushrooms may be used for making Chinese Almond Chicken.

- INGREDIENTS**
- 1 cup uncooked rice
 - 1 cup sliced mushrooms (canned or fresh)
 - 1 cup almonds — blanched
 - 2 tablespoons salad oil, to be used 1 tablespoon at a time
 - 1 clove garlic, cut in half
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup cubed bamboo shoots (canned)
 - 1 cup thinly sliced water chestnuts (canned)
 - 1 cup thinly sliced celery
 - 1 cup sliced cold chicken (fresh or canned)
 - 2 tablespoons liquid (1 tablespoon each, from bamboo shoots and water chestnut cans)

- INGREDIENTS FOR GRAVY**
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 1 tablespoon water
 - 1 teaspoon soy sauce

GARNISH

- 1 cup sliced green onion

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE—To make 3 cups fluffy rice: Put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt in a two-

quart saucepan and cover with a tight-fitting lid. Bring to a vigorous boil. Then reduce the heat as low as possible and steam for 14 minutes or until all the water is absorbed, leaving the separate rice grains with their full nutritional value. This makes very firm rice grains. (If you prefer more tender rice grains, add 1/4 cup more water and increase the slow cooking time 4 or 5 minutes.) Remove the lid, permit the rice to steam dry to the desired consistency and the grains will be separate and fluffy. Never stir rice; lift gently with a fork.

METHOD: Brown almonds in 1 tablespoon oil. Set aside. With table fork, mash garlic into salt in skillet. (Be sure there is a tight-fitting cover, which can be used later.) Add 1 tablespoon oil, then add chicken. Brown lightly. Add 1 tablespoon oil and then bamboo shoots and mushrooms. Brown lightly. Add liquid, drained from canned bamboo shoots and water chestnuts. Cover tightly. Cook over low heat 5 minutes. Add water chestnuts, celery and 1/2 of the almonds. Just heat through. Celery and chestnuts should remain crisp. For gravy . . . shake up in small jar, cornstarch, salt, sugar, water and soy sauce. Stir into mixture. Cook until liquid thickens and is smooth. Sprinkle over dish, green onions and rest of almonds. Serve with hot fluffy cooked rice. This will serve 4.

Twenty million anglers can't be wrong about the fun of fishing. But they sure can make mistakes about the best time to fish.

Here are some portents for a lucky day's catch that you can look for when planning to drive off to your favorite piscatorial retreat.



Fish bite best when they can see best. This means they feed more when the waters are clear, not muddy. The moon seems to affect the fish's appetite too. In fact, there's a saying, "Fish bite best when the moon is bright, and this is true both day and night," that many fishermen swear by.

A good off-shore breeze is another lucky omen. The ripple on the water hides you from the fish. Rough water, however will hide the bait from the fish.

Many anglers consult a barometer before setting forth on their sport. They stay in bed if the barometer is low, but jump out early and fast when it is high or rising.

Incidentally, the warmer the water, the deeper should be your plugs, spoons or spinners as the fish seek out the cooler levels.

Actually, the enjoyment, for most people, is not in catching fish—but just in "goin' fishin'."

Summer Is Good Time To Drop A Few Extra Pounds

AUSTIN, Aug. 6. — Summer with its abundance of low-calorie fruits and vegetables is a good time to shed those few extra pounds put on during the winter months, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, states.

People do not need as many starchy foods which produce energy in warm weather as they do in the winter, he said, because in the summer the warmth which starchy foods give to the body is not needed.

"Green leafy and yellow vegetables and all types of fruit which are plentiful during the summer months provide an excellent, low-cost diet for the person who is overweight," Dr. Cox said. "Many of these foods can be eaten raw and are very nutritious this way provided the food is carefully washed to remove all dirt and insecticides which may be present."

Dr. Cox stressed the importance of properly storing food during the summer. He explained that certain foods such as cold cuts, cream deserts, potato salad, and sandwich spreads have a tendency to spoil quickly during hot weather. Foods of this type should be kept in the refrigerator until just before they are served.

"By using good common sense in choosing and serving the proper kinds of food, you'll feel better and have a much more enjoyable summer," Dr. Cox concluded.

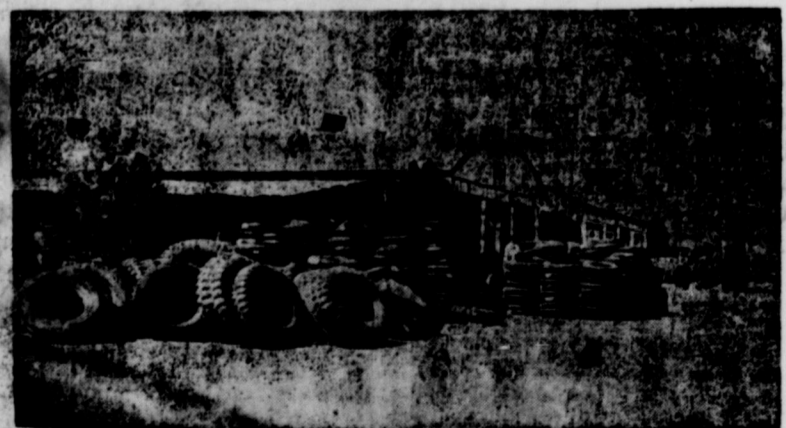
