Meetings Set To Discuss Blackeyed Pea Planting

Dates have been set for three meetings to be held in Eastland County to discuss planting black-eyed peas this year, County Agent J. M. Cooper, announced last week.

The meetings scheduled will be held Friday, Feb. 23 at 7:30 p. m. in the Rising Star Vocational Agriculture room; Saturday, Feb. 24 at 10 a. m. in the Gorman Theatre, and the same day at 2 p. m. in the Carbon High School auditorium.

L. R. Barron, the Athens black-eyed pea buyer who contracted for last year's crop of dried black-eyed peas in the county, is scheduled to attend the meeting.

Over 30, tons of the peas were sold in the county last harvesting season, despite the fact that a number of farmers ground some of the peas to flour in their combines before they learned how to set the machines.

The peas produced 400 to 800 pounds per acre in the county, and brought five cents a pound, Cooper said. Thus the return per acre averaged about \$30, and the crop brought farmers of the county an estimated \$3000 on about 100 acres, mostly planted in small plots as an experiment.

Tasty Chicken Dishes Enhanced by Proper Use of Seasonings

A FREQUENT meat appearing on menus is chicken because it's versatile and delicate flavor are a favorite with most. Even though you serve chicken frequently, you can have unlimited ways in which it's brought to the table.

High in protein, rich in iron and phosphorus and valuable for its vitamins, chicken can be served to both adults and children. You may have it in simple fricassee form with dumplings, an old-fashioned favorite, or baked or barbecued, as something special when you entertain.

HERE'S A NEW portrait of a tried and true favorite that you can easily duplicate with this simple recipe:

Chicken Pot Pie (Serves 6)

- 1 four pound fricassee chicken
 - 1/2 pound salt pork
 - Water or stock
 - Salt and pepper
 - Dumplings
- Cut chicken into convenient pieces for serving and dice the pork. Place together in a good-sized saucepan, cover with water or stock and bring to boiling point; cover closely and simmer from one to two hours depending on the age of the chicken, seasoning when about half done. Thirty minutes before serving time put in dumplings and be sure to keep pan closely covered while they are cooking. Arrange meat in center of dish with dumplings around it, pouring gravy over meat.

Dumplings

- 1 1/2 cups flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons all-phosphate baking powder
 - About 2/3 cup milk
- Sift flour, salt and baking powder. Mix thoroughly but quickly with milk and drop by small tablespoonfuls into hot stew gravy. Cover closely and cook 12 to 15 minutes without removing lid from saucepan.

***Barbecued Chicken (Serves 2-4)**

- 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pound young chicken (broiler)
- Barbecue Sauce:
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 medium onion, chopped fine
- 1 cup tomato puree or catsup
- 1/2 cup fat
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Cut chicken in half or in quarters. Arrange in a baking pan. Brush with hot Barbecue Sauce. Cover, then bake in moderate oven (350°) until about half done. Uncover, continue cooking, basting frequently with the hot Barbecue Sauce until tender and nicely browned. Total cooking time: 1 to 1 1/2 hours depending on size and weight of chicken.

Barbecue Sauce: Blend salt, pepper, paprika, and sugar in saucepan. Add onion, tomato puree or catsup, fat and water. Heat to boiling. Remove from heat. Add lemon juice and Worcestershire sauce. Use for basting during cooking, and to serve with the cooked chicken.

Baked Chicken Goulash (Serves 8-10)

- 2 3/4 pound young chickens
- Flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons paprika
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup fat or salad oil
- 4 cups sliced onion
- 1/2 cup hot water.

Wash chicken; dry; disjoint. Mix 1/2 cup flour, paprika and salt. Dredge chicken with flour mixture. Brown chicken in fat or salad oil. Remove chicken; brown onion in same pan. Alternate layers of chicken and onion in casserole. Add water. Cover; bake in moderate oven, (350°), 1 1/2-2 hours, or until chicken is tender. Thicken stock with flour mixed to smooth paste with cold water.

Chicken with Mushrooms (Serves 6)

- 1/2 cup canned green peas
- 1/2 cup mushrooms
- 2 cups cooked chicken, diced
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 tablespoons blanched almonds
- 1/2 cup milk or cream
- 1/2 cup chicken broth or water
- Salt, pepper
- Dash of ginger

1 teaspoon chopped parsley
Sliver or chop the almonds. Saute mushrooms. Melt butter, blend in flour and stir in the milk and broth. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add all remaining ingredients. Place in ramekins or a large pudding dish and set in a pan of water. Cover with rich cheese biscuit triangles. Bake in a hot (450°) oven for 5 minutes, then at 400° for 15 minutes or until the biscuits are golden brown.

Rich Cheese Biscuits

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup butter
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 cup grated American cheese

Sift flour, measure and sift again with salt and baking powder. Cut in butter; add grated cheese and milk, mixing gently. Roll to 1/4-inch thickness and cut into triangles or other shapes desired, using floured biscuit cutter. Place on top of chicken in ramekins and bake as directed.

Chicken Creole (Serves 6)

- 3 1/2 pound chicken
- Salt, pepper, paprika
- 1/4 cup chicken fat or shortening
- 1 onion, sliced
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 1 can (No. 2 1/2) tomatoes
- 1 green pepper, seeds removed

Dress, clean and cut chicken into serving pieces. Season with salt, pepper and paprika. Brown onion in chicken fat, add chicken and brown lightly. Cover and let simmer for 1 hour. Add remaining ingredients and place in casserole. Cover and bake in a moderate (350°) oven until tender, about 1 hour.

Frozen Lemon Pie Is Toothsome Dish

FROZEN lemon pie is a toothsome dinner dessert for the family that's been working hard all day, says the Country Cooking editor of Capper's Farmer.

Graham cracker crumbs are crust and topping for the chilled yellow filling, she writes in the nationally-circulated farm magazine. Pie-shaped pieces are made by cutting diagonally across the refrigerator tray in which pie is frozen.

The dessert which will be an ever-popular family favorite, serves 8, the Capper's Farmer expert advises.



FROZEN LEMON PIE

4 eggs, separated
1/2 c. lemon juice
Rind of 1/2 lemon
1/2 c. sugar

1 c. evaporated milk, whipped
1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs
or, cookie or cake crumbs

Beat egg yolks; add lemon juice and piece of rind sliced from lemon and all but 2 tablespoons of the sugar. Cook over low heat 15 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove rind and cool. Beat egg whites until stiff; add remaining sugar and fold into cooked mixture. Add whipped evaporated milk. Line refrigerator tray with waxed paper. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup of the crumbs. Pour in lemon mixture; sprinkle with remaining crumbs. Freeze with temperature set at coldest. Serves 8.

Glory and Service

Lesson for February 25, 1951

THERE ARE two sides of the
Christian life that don't seem to
mix. One of these we can call
Glory. The very word suggests
something not of
this world; it calls
up mystic visions,
inner raptures, the
light of heaven. We
think of Saints and
angels in glory, for
that is where they
belong. But we our-
selves can have a
bit of it here and
now.

When Glory Comes
NOT every Christian has an ex-
perience of glory in this life.
But those who do, usually find that
it comes only at rare intervals,
when one is alone, after long and
perhaps painful prayer.

Sometimes it is an actual ex-
perience of something like
great and blinding light; some-
times a hearing of voices as
from another shore; sometimes
a feeling of unutterable peace
and joy such as nothing in this
world can give. Whatever form
it takes, the experience we are
calling "glory" is always con-
nected in the mind and heart
with the felt presence of God.

However it comes, one longs
above all things for it to remain.
And while it does remain, one
wishes to hear no human voice.

When Service Calls

BUT the Christian life is not all
glory, by any means. If the
glory-side is spiritual, the service-
side is material. If the glory cannot
be shared, the whole idea of service
is sharing. For moments of glory
there can be no date nor schedule,
no predicted time and place, but
acts of service must often be done
by calendar and clock.

Glory may not come to every
one but service is the duty of
all. Yet service, like glory,
may come to us from without.
At a time when one least ex-
pects it, one will be called on
for a service one is scarce pre-
pared to give.

Service calls us every day; wear-
iness and pain may at times bar us
from glory, but only the last wear-
iness and the most disabling pain
will disbar us from service. Glory
may be for those far advanced in
the spiritual life; service is for
these too, but also for the be-
ginners.

The Weaving of Gold and Grey

NOW the trouble is that glory
and service seem to get in each
other's way. We actually feel like
different persons, in glory and in
service.

Let us say on a morning in
church, when the winter sun is
streaming through the windows on
the communion bread and wine,
and in the silence the solemn words
are heard once more: "This is my
body, broken for you."

But the next day, when one is
teaching a class of mischievous
boys, or helping a neighbor fix a
flat tire, or baby-sitting, or spading
up a garden,—one does not
feel like the same person. Can
religion, the Christian religion,
take in both glory and service?

Some Christians have thought
not. Some have gone in for one,
some for the other. Some live
only for the high hours of
worship and rapture, counting
all the time between their ra-
diant hours as "dark nights of
the soul." Others leave worship
to others; they are seldom to be
found at communion, but
they can always be counted on
to help with church suppers or
community chest drives.

Jesus showed us the better way.
It is not a choice between glory
and service; his life included both.
Jesus took both sides of religion
and made them one. There was
glory in his service and there was
service in his glory. (In the very
hour of his transfiguration, did he
not speak of his death?) The true
Christian life, like that of Jesus,
weaves the gold and the grey to-
gether, the shining gold of life's
high moments, and the long-wear-
ing grey of the years of service.

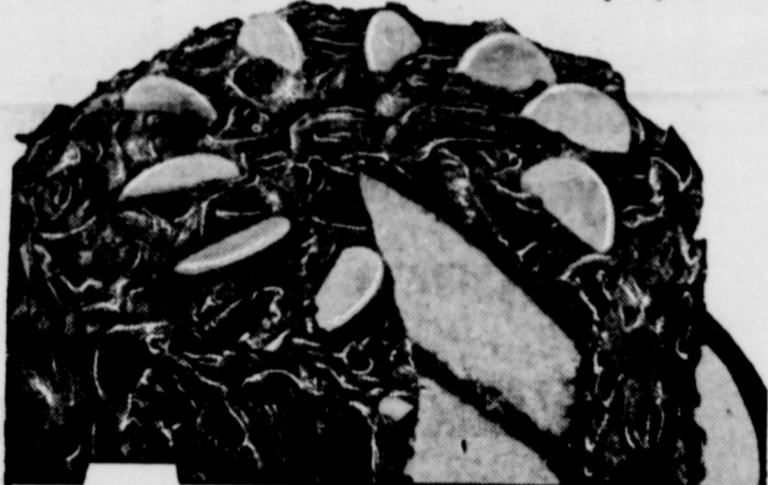

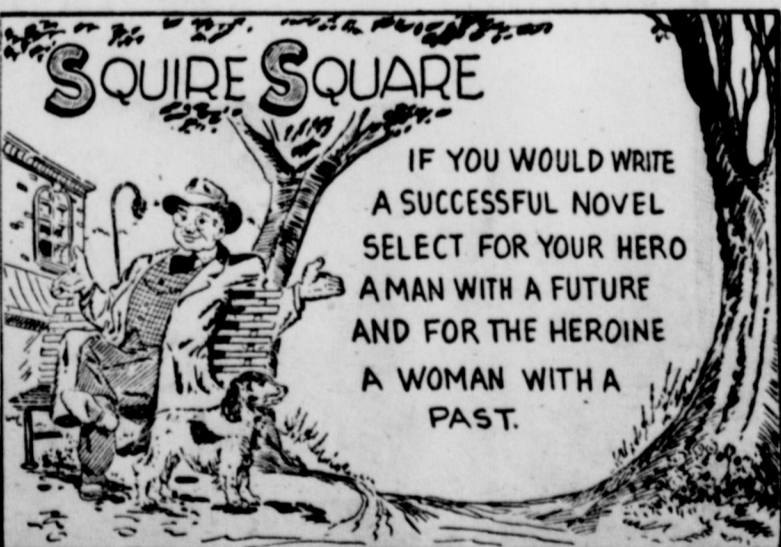

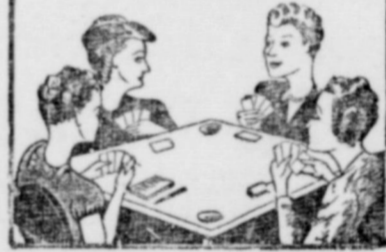
