Guar Beans for This County? -- It's Possible

Some Eastland County farmers are looking for another cash crop that will produce income on land that is not planted in peanuts. Recent price increases for guar beans makes guar an attractive alternative crop for Eastland County. At the present time about the only alternative that farmers in this area have for farming land besides peanuts are grain sorghum and forage crops. The net returns for both grain sorghum and forages are generally low. Any acceptable cash crop would generally be welcomed by most farmers.

There is no research data this area. However, a great amount of information is available from the Rolling Plains area around Vernon. In that area yields have averaged about 300 pounds per acre with a spread from 400 to 1500 pounds per acre. Since the rainfall in Eastland County generally exceeds that of the Rolling Plains area, we should expect yields equally as good or better in this area.

The price for 1969 crop beans has been pegged at \$4.60 per hundred pounds. A yield of 300 pounds of beans per acre would net approximately \$20.00 per acre after all pro-

duction and harvesting costs including hating. This much net per acre will probably double the average net return for grain sorghum on the same land. In years of good moisture the better land in Eastland County could easily exceed 800 pounds per acre. Yields of 1,000 to 1,500 pounds per acre can be expected some years.

Guar has been approved as a crop to be planted on grain sorghum dryland acres above the mandatory diversion level. In such cases the diversion payments is reduced by 50%, but the extra income from the guar beans can make the total significantly more than the diversion payments. If you plant guar on diverted acres for bean production, you must report this to the ASCS office. If you are interested in planting some guar this year, please contact me.

Brush-Control Program To Be Launched in Area

The Brush Control and Range Improvement Association's campaign for funds to support research in brush control and range improvement will be launched in Central Texas, on April 11. County Chairman of the association, County Agricultural Agents and other leaders from a 20 county area will receive a briefing on the program at a meeting in Hamilton, says DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent.

Association funds will support basic research and education on various methods of brush control. This new organization hopes to obtain one cent per acre from each cooperating landowner each year for five years according to Gordon.

Details on the brush program, how funds will be collected and used by the assoc-

iated with the Texas A&M University and Gariyn Hoffman, Range Brush and Weed Control Specialist for the Extension Service, will all speak.

Joe Fambro of Huckabee, who is district chairman of the association, will outline plans for the work in his district.

Eastland County will be represented at this kickoff meeting by Gordon and several local ranchers.

Local SCD Enters Top District Competition

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District has entered the 23rd annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 53 conservation districts, according to Joe B. Criswell of Rising Star district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event sponsored by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio.

Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from January 1, 1969, through December 31, 1969, will be considered.

Grand award for the 53 districts selected nationally will be an expense-paid, work-study trip to Arizona in Decem-

ber 1970, for one member of the district's governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district. The 106 men selected will be guests at Goodyear Farms, a 14,000 acre general farm operation near Phoenix.

This district has taken part in the competition 10 times in the past. District supervisors are: Joe B. Criswell, Rising Star; Gene Gilbreath, Dublin; E. F. Harrison, Gorman; J. T. Wilkinson, De Leon; and Norman Moore, Sidney.

Criswell said the district's outstanding cooperator will be selected from the 4,600 farm operators enrolled in the district program. Nationally over 2,000,000 farmers in over 2,950 districts have signed cooperative agreements with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Turkey Put On Plentiful Food List for April

COLLEGE STATION — Turkeys, perhaps America's most festive birds, are featured on the April plentiful foods list, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Current cold storage holdings are large and prices reasonable, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, so you'll find it a good time to include turkey on your shopping list.

Other items on the April "plentiful" list of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service include prunes, canned and frozen green beans, and sweet corn, onions, rice, dry beans and peanut products.

Last year's rice production broke all records and ran 18 percent above 1967. Estimated dry bean production figured at 17.7 million hundredweight, or 16 percent more than last year. At present, pinto beans are in best supply but others include pinks, blackeyes and baby lima beans.

Some 400 to 500 fairs, expositions and festivals are held annually in Texas.

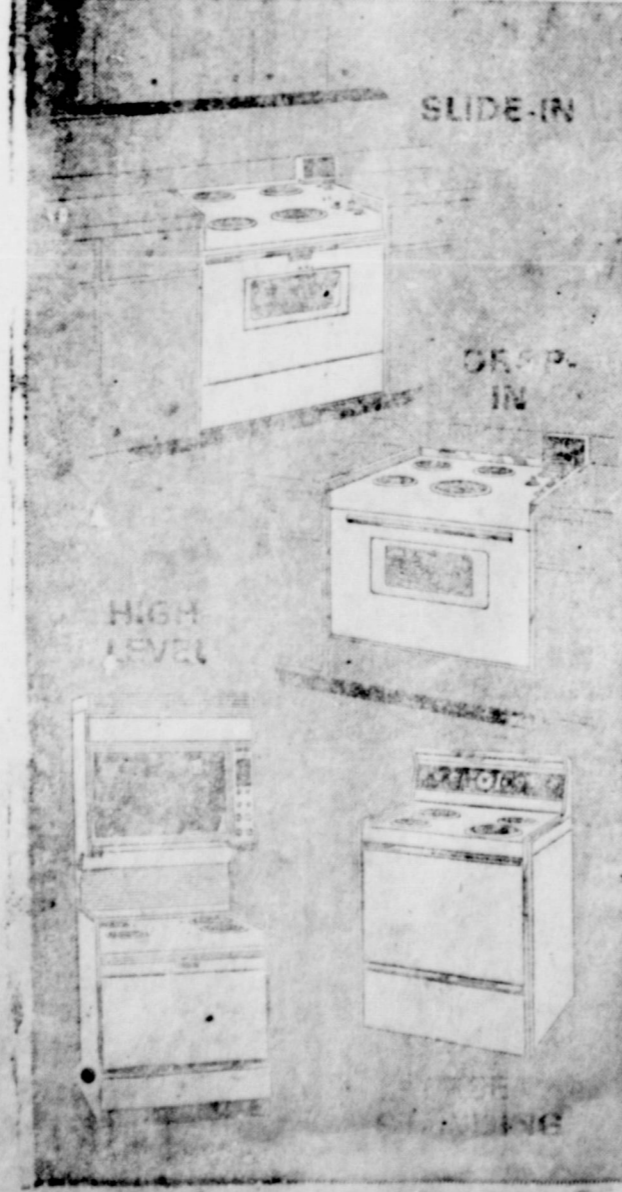
