The amount of cash premiums depend upon the type of ribbon awarded to the animal. Approximately \$300 will be distributed to those owners who receive ribbons.

## When Worship Is Wicked

Lesson for April 30, 1950

DO NOT THINK for a moment you could stand before some Recording Angel, with a memorandum in your hand showing the number of times you had attended church last year, and expect to see the angel break out into a beaming smile. "Fifty-two trips to church, 32 'Good Deeds'!" you would smile confidently at him. But he might freeze you with a look of complete contempt. "Fifty-two sins!" he might say. "Next, case!"

## Can It Be a Sin To Go To Church?

Church-going is not necessarily a good act. Worship may be a quite wicked deed. Most people are slow getting that into their heads. They think that one act of worship on Sunday will somehow make up for a lot of bad behavior Monday through Saturday inclusive. But it is not so. The first person in history to see and to say that worship need not be good and can even be very bad, was none other than the prophet Amos.

The Israelites to whom he spoke were of the type who would call a church-going people; they were certainly temple-going. They followed the same ritual that was used in Jerusalem, they offered tithes and sacrifices, they kept the Sabbath, they observed the feasts and they sang the sacred hymns.

Yet Amos denounces the whole business, and condemns the worshippers as guilty sinners. What was wrong?

It Looked All Right READERS of the Old Testament will remember that at Bethel, where the Israelites had one of their principal temples, golden calves had been set up to represent Jehovah their God. Now even though the people worshipped the true God, surely it was wrong to worship him in the form of an animal.

The form of their worship was all wrong, much further from any form of Christian worship is today; yet Amos does not condemn them for worshiping in this mistaken way.

He does not condemn the people for having a wrong hymn-book, or for not having a good choir. He hasn't a word of blame for non-attendance at worship; indeed he comes down hardest on those who do attend. Apparently church attendance in Bethel was excellent—that was not their trouble.

Again, he has no fault to find with the Israelites because their services were uninteresting. Maybe they were; but on the other hand they were probably full of color and of pageantry, something to see as well as to hear. Yet Amos was not impressed. Further, he makes no complaint about poor sermons.

## What Was the Trouble?

THE TROUBLE with those people, the thing that made their worship sinful, was not some defect in the act of worship itself. There was nothing they could do. Amos can find nothing they could do, to "improve the worship program" as we would say.

Religion, in short, cannot be shut off from the rest of life, as nearly everybody then thought and as too many people now think. Worship is simply no good if it is not linked up with a good life, a life good by intention and effort.

Jesus underscored this same point. If you are at the very altar of God, in the act of offering him a gift, and remember that your brother has something against you, go and make matters right with your brother before you offer the gift. Seek your brother before you see God! Or else God will not be at home to you.

# Plumbers in Discord on Coffee Grounds in Sink

MILWAUKEE, Wis.—Go ahead, housewives, pour those coffee grounds down the kitchen drain. It'll do the pipes good.

Not if it Coffee grounds will give you a plugged sink in no time.

Major plumbers attending the annual convention of the Wisconsin master plumbers' association were quizzed on the question: Should coffee grounds be poured down the kitchen sink?

Their opinions, all based on years of personal experience in opening clogged drains, showed that even the experts are by no means agreed on the subject. Here are some of their answers,

ranging from affirmative to neutral to negative.

John W. Hooker, Lake Geneva, with 20 years in the plumbing trade: "Coffee grounds are good for the drainpipes. They help clean out the grease that accumulates in the pipes. This collects in the basement pipes, usually, where the cold air solidifies the hot grease. The grounds help loosen this grease and carry it away. I tell everybody to pour grounds down the kitchen sink."

Edward Pivonka, 2600 N. 62nd st., who has 30 years in the trade: "Coffee grounds don't clean out the pipes, but they don't do any harm, either. The grounds are too

soft to clean out the grease. On the other hand, the grounds alone won't clog up the pipes. If it's more convenient to pour the grounds down the kitchen drain go ahead."

F. W. Michel, Lodi, a plumber 23 years: "I've found coffee grounds in pipes that have been plugged up. But it's the grease in the pipes that did the harm. The grounds just help a little. Most of the trouble on coffee grounds business is in restaurants, where they pour down a whole bushful of grounds at once. The grounds also tend to fill up the grease traps in septic tanks which is bad."

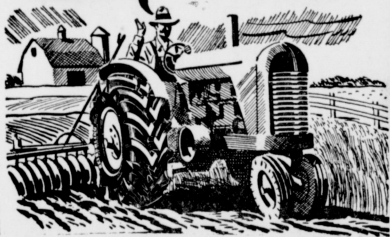
