Funeral Rites For George M. Clark Held Friday

Funeral rites for George Monroe Clark were held at the Carbon Methodist Church Friday at 4:00 p. m. with Rev. S. P. Collins of Abilene conducting the services. Mr. Clark passed away at his home here Wednesday, July 13 after several years of failing health. Interment was in the Carbon cemetery.

Mr. Clark was born to John and Martha Clark in Falkville, Ala. on October 29, 1869. He moved to Texas in 1899 and worked as a carpenter in and around Cisco. He became united with the Methodist Church in 1908.

On September 27, 1914 he was married to Miss Bettie Brown at Sabarno, Texas. Thirty-three years ago he and his family moved to Carbon where he operated a general merchandise store for many years. In 1936 he retired from business due to ill health.

The deceased is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bettie Clark, two children, Mrs. Marion M. Hagler of Eagle Pass and James F. Clark of Lake Surapee, New Hampshire, and one grandchild, Mary Lynne Clark.

S. S. Reports To Be In

Glenn McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Army Recruiting Office in Eastland at 10 a. m. Thursday, July 28. Any persons wishing assistance with retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call to see Mr. McNatt at that time.

Mr. McNatt announced that the Abilene office issued 717 original social security cards during the month of June. In addition, 283 duplicate cards were issued to persons who had lost their cards, or whose cards had become mutilated.

Most of the 717 new cards were issued to students preparing to take summer jobs. Any student, whether he is working part or full time, should have a social security account number card if he is working in commerce or industry.

Farm Roads Approved For Eastland County

In Eastland County, the following described roads are hereby designated as Farm-To-Market Roads subject to the availability of funds under the terms of Senate bill No. 287 and subject to the condition that Eastland County will furnish the required right-of-way free of cost to the State.

From end F. M. 1027 in Ulm north to road intersection, a distance of approximately 3.5 miles.

From end F. M. 569-South to road intersection at Ninrod, a distance of approximately 4.0 miles.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this Order by the proprietors of Eastland County the State highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$65,300.00 and when right-of-way and funds are available to proceed with construction and to assume the roads for maintenance upon completion of construction.

KEEPING HEALTHY
 Just 'Enough' Food Isn't Enough
 By Dr. James W. Barton
 WHILE SOME COUNTRIES most-ly are interested in getting "enough" food to eat, there are others—United States and Canada particularly—who are most interested in getting enough of the right "kinds" of food to maintain physical and mental strength in adults and, in addition, proper growth in children.
 One of the few benefits obtained from World War II was the emphasis placed on the proper diet for the armed forces and also for civilians at home doing their part to win the war.
 There was no lack of food in the United States and Canada. In fact, so abundant was the supply that in order to make it more attractive to the eye and taste, food manufacturers left out certain food elements (vitamins and minerals), with harmful effects upon the structures and working processes of the body. That is why we see these food elements being added to bread, milk and other daily products.
 Research workers have shown that through delay in marketing food loses much of its nutritional value, as does heating food in the kitchen instead of in the refrigerator.
 As some of the valuable food elements are not eaten at the home by children, our school authorities—recognizing the importance of food to growing children—now supply school lunches outlined by food experts.
 In addition to keeping the child robust physically, it has been found that where these especially prescribed school lunches are eaten regularly, the children are more interested in their lessons, are better behaved and attend more regularly.
 As boys at school, we thought that "domestic science" as taught to the girls, was just a play hour. We have only to think of the school lunch to realize that the training of the young girl in the right kinds of food to eat, their preparation and preservation before use, will mean much to her home and its health and happiness.
