## Farm Building Work Keeps SCS Officials Busy In This Region

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by members of the Eastland Soil Conservation staff.)

Livestock farmers and ranchers of this area continue to construct good farm ponds for a two fold purpose. First, ponds are generally the most practical source of livestock water; and, second, well located ponds are essential in order to get better control of livestock and grazing.

Twenty-one ponds have been completed since July 1 and five ponds are now nearing completion. Landowners of the Cisco area who have built ponds are R. M. Benton, T. C. Cozart, Albert Hansen, J. R. Mitchum, J. H. Penn, J. G. High, Roy Adams and A. V. Cagle.

Ponds in the Eastland area include J. D. Yancy, Tip Arthur, Waverly Massengale, J. G. Harlan, Paul Triplet and H. H. Durham. Carbon landowners completing ponds are G. O. Warren, L. N. Koen, Rufus Been and M. A. Olson. E. F. Porch of Ranger has also constructed a farm pond.

Farm ponds are one of the most popular and useful conservation practices; yet they are like guns, they must be treated with due precautions. For example, the second largest accidental death loss on farms and ranches in our nation is caused by drowning. Too often the loss of life are those of children. More than 900,000 ponds have been constructed on the farms and ranches of the nation. Approximately 64,000 new ponds were completed last year.

The local SCS work unit at Eastland checked out 10 completed ponds last year, and have averaged nearly 100 completed ponds per year. Some safety precautions might well include the following rules:

1. Non swimmers should wear life jackets in boats.
2. Encourage children to learn to swim through various organizations.

to swim through various organizations.

3. Mark safe swimming areas.
4. Place warning signs at danger spots.
5. Never swim alone.
6. Use boats that will float if swamped or capsized.
7. Place life saving devices such as bouys, ropes or long poles at swimming areas.

Farm ponds should not be built near farmsteads if suitable sites can be found elsewhere. This greatly lessens the danger to small children going to such ponds alone.

The Soil Conservation Service has an excellent bulletin on farm pond safety available to interested pond owners.

Remember, the Soil Conservation Service stamp on sale local post office Aug. 27. It is a very attractive stamp in three colors, yellow, green and blue. It portrays a modern farm showing that conservation farming brings heavy as well as bounty to rural living.

The stamp shows contour strip cropping, terracing, pasture improvement, tree planting and a farm pond. In addition the silhouette of a city in the background symbolizes that urban as well as rural people are highly dependent upon the care and wise use of land as a principal source of food, water, shelter and clothing.

### Color Trends for Fall

Vivid color effects give way to subtleties this fall. "Muted" is the word often used in writing and talking colors. Quiet, gentle, grayed, subtle, rich, deep and beautiful are other adjectives used to picture colors we'll be seeing in fabrics and ready-to-wear.

Yellow and brown are doing much influencing. A golden amber added to beige, for example, gives a warm vicuna. A faint touch of it in blue gives us the flattering teal. In greens, it makes soft moss and lichen green, in reds it creates paprika. Muted gold, represented by Mustard Gold, camel, vicuna, and the nut tones are strong with yellow brown influence. Sungold, or sparkling gold, will be important for accents and for evening wear.

Graying makes the new colors smoky — taupe brown, heather green, mist gray. The grays are important in their own right and are seen in everything from medium or men's wear gray to Oxford and on to almost black charcoal.

Reds are influenced by yellow or blue; in the first category, we have paprika and brick; in the second, burgundy, plum, cranberry, mountain berry and candy apple. Some bright reds will be seen, such as Red Hot, Scarlet, and Fire Engine.

Greens are more muted than they were last year. There are new subtle versions of olive and forest green and loden; such greens are used in plaids and prints. Deep blue greens are destined for dress wear. Parrot and emerald greens will make sharp accents for trims and accessories.

Blue with a green cast, teal, is very much in the picture. Sapphire, clear, sharp electric blue and inky blues will have a select spot in junior appeal. Purplish versions are high fashion, especially for dress wear.

It's going to be a great time for black, particularly combined with these will be for formal wear especially.

## New Trespass Tax Will Become Effective Oct. 14

AUSTIN — A new trespass law will be effective in Texas October 14, it has been announced by the assistant secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. The law which is covered in HB 36, will become effective without the signature of the governor.

It provides penalties of up to 30 days in jail and a \$500 fine and forfeiture of hunting and fishing licenses for a period of three years, upon conviction.

The law makes it illegal for any person to hunt, fish or camp on the enclosed property of another person without the consent of the owner or other person in authority.

The new law is enforceable by any peace officer and arrests may be made without a warrant.

"The trespass problem is a major one in the protection of wildlife," the secretary said. "Per-

sons who climb fences to illegally hunt on the property of others don't usually regard either the season or the bag limit. As a result, prosecutions have been heavy.

"Under the new law, however, enforcement of the trespass law is the work of peace enforcement officers, which precede the game warden. Now when the game warden finds a poacher the only thing he can do is to notify the landowner. The landowner then can make a complaint and cause the arrest to be made by a peace officer."

The first item of business was a barbecue supper served to all the members and guests. After everyone had finished eating, the coon hunters were ready to show the spectators how their hounds could perform.

After some 15 hounds were entered, Les Threet gave the contestants their instructions. Each dog was to be allowed 30 seconds to bring a live coon out of an open barrel. The hound that made the best time would be declared the winner and given a trophy. Any hound owner whose hound could bring the coon out of the barrel in 30 seconds time would win a 25 pound bag of dog food, donated to the club by the Thornton Feed Mill of Cisco.

Bud Ainsworth of Cisco was the official time keeper for the contest. After checking the time cards, the time keeper declared a hound of the "Plot" strain named Jack the champion with
