Announcement was made this week of the sale of Swift & Company's Carbon properties to the Gorman Peanut Company. This sale includes the warehouses, office, scales, water tower and rail road track spur. The total purchase price was not disclosed.

Melvin Shell, president and manager of the Gorman Peanut Company, disclosed that buying and storing of peanuts at Carbon would be continued and that all personnel would be retained. This would include Oda Monroe as field man and manager and Mrs. J. E. McDaniel in charge of the office.

Mr. Shell emphasized that in the future a market would be provided in Carbon for any and all types of peanuts and that previous restrictions would be eliminated. He thinks that this policy, along with better storing and handling facilities will expand the buying capacities at Carbon. The office will be opened September 1st and buying will start as soon as the crop is harvested.

## Fewer Workers On Payroll Of Farm Agency

Farmers Home Administration will operate its program in Texas this year with 117 fewer employees than it had a year ago at this time, according to a statement this week from Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director. Since the break of the drought, the agency, statewide, has reduced its force by more than 27 percent and has discontinued seven of its field offices on a full-time basis.

Insofar as the employees who lost their jobs, McKay said that in practically every case the training and experience they gained during their employment with Farmers Home Administration enabled them to step into jobs with banks, PCAs and other private and cooperative credit institutions—many of them at salaries better than they had

with the government.

In connection with the services available to farm families, there will be no change, according to McKay. He said that during the past three years more than 12,000 farmers and ranchers paid their loans in full to Farmers Home Administration, and for the most part had reached or regained a position where private and cooperative sources can now handle their credit needs.

Farmers Home Administration will continue to make loans to eligible applicants for farm and home operating expenses; for the purchase of livestock and equipment needed to put their farm programs on a sound basis and to finance farm real estate and improvements.

**Questions & Answers**

Q — I have a \$10,000 World War II GI insurance policy. I am thinking of adding VA's total disability rider to the policy, which would pay me \$100 a month if I become disabled for six months or more so I could not work. Would I have to go on paying the policy premiums to ensure my family would be protected?

A — No. As long as you qualify for the disability payments, your payment of premiums would be waived, and there would be no reduction of the protection your family now has under the policy.

Q — I am planning to take evening courses under the Korean GI Bill, leading to a college degree. I am going to have to spread the school work out over a long period, since I work full-time at an office job. How much time will I have to complete training? I was discharged from service two years ago, in mid-1957.

A — Korea veterans have eight years from date of discharge or until January 31, 1965, whichever comes earlier, in which to complete training. In no event may a veteran take training after January 31, 1965.

**Attention Called  
To Laws Relative  
To Grain Hauling**

Several laws that will effect the hauling of small grains away from the farm were called to the attention of farmers and truckers today by Captain C. W. Bell of the License and Weight Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Captain Bell called attention to a new law that became effective May 30, 1959, that will have considerable bearing on owners who plan to transport seasonal agricultural products this coming season.

This new law permits owners of commercial motor vehicles, truck-tractors, trailers, or semi-trailers to haul agricultural products to market, or to other points for sale or processing, the owner may, by paying an additional fee, receive a short-term permit allowing him to haul loads of larger tonnage, not to exceed the gross or legal axle weight limitations, for a limited period of less than one year. These permits may be obtained for periods of three, six, or nine months by making application to the County Tax Collector of which the owner is a resident.

Captain Bell further stated that the law permits non-resident owners of a commercial vehicle to buy (30) thirty day temporary registration permits to be used in the movement of small grains limited to a 75 mile radius of the place of production.

"We hope all farmers and truckers in this area will comply with these laws as we know they will want to avoid any unnecessary delay that might arise from violations that might occur," Bell stated.

License and Weight Patrolman will be on duty in this area and will be glad to assist in any way they can to help the people meet the requirements of these laws," he concluded.

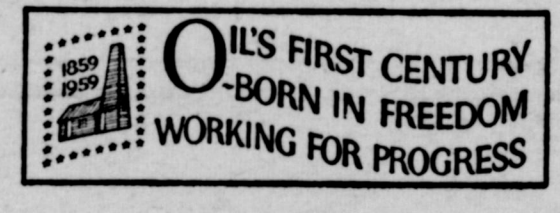

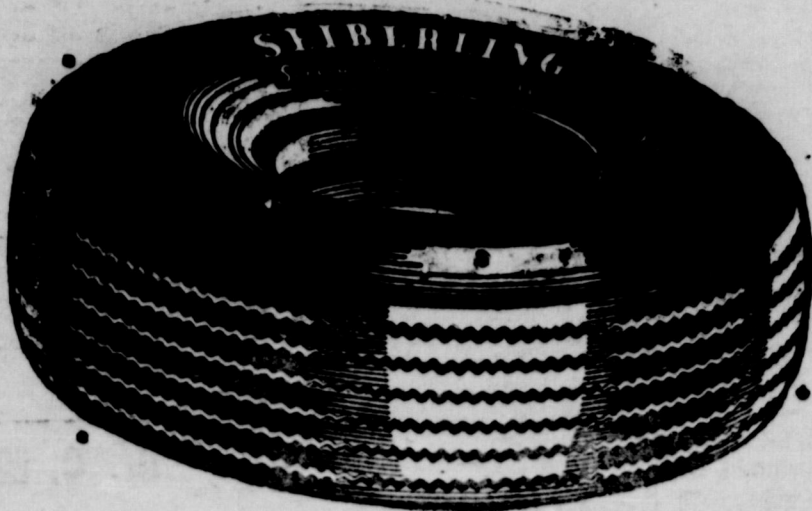

### Cotton Support Price Revealed In ASC Bulletin

Producers in the county who have Choice "A" cotton to be sold will be eligible to receive price support of 33.99 cents per pound based on middling, white and one inch staple. The Choice "A" cotton will be purchased outright, but Choice "B" cotton price support will be in the form of a loan at 23.29 cents per pound, it was revealed in a recent news bulletin from the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office.

The ASC stated that most of the cotton and peanut farms have already been measured, but those which have not been should be measured soon. Farmers who overplanted peanuts and wish to destroy them were warned to get their allotment now or be faced with a delay in the fall. Excess peanuts cannot be baled for hay, the report stated.

Farmers interested in the 1960 Soil Bank Program should turn in their applications for farm rates between August 24 and Sept. 10. Applications for contract can be filed from Sept. 14 to Sept. 25, the ASC office said.

If the application covers all eligible land on the farm, the basic annual rate per acre will be higher than for a part of the farm. Practice payments for the establishment of grass cover will be limited to 50 per cent of the cost of carrying out the practice, the news release announced.

If the farm had a tenant in 1958 or 1959, it must have a tenant in 1960 and he must share in the conservation reserve payments, the ASC office stated. Land purchased in 1957, 1958 or 1959 is not eligible for a contract, nor is land that was idle during 1958 and 1959.

The value of the crops produced on the land from 1955 through 1959 will largely determine the price to be paid under the 1960 program, the report continued. To establish a rate per acre for the farm, the acreage, yield and value of the crops produced during the mentioned years must be known.

Further information concerning the 1960 Conservation Reserve Program may be obtained from the ASC county office in Eastland.
