14 LAND OWNERS COMPLETE 32 MILES OF TERRACES THIS YEAR

Conservation farmers and ranchers continue to apply conservation practices at a favorable rate. Fourteen land owners have completed approximately 32 miles furnishes much needed water and of terraces since Jan. 1, 1959. These terraces will be effective in handling the big rains which are past due and they will be equally effective in holding maximum rainfall in place from small rains. Contour farming with terrace systems do much to hold the soil and prevent erosion.

Terrace systems and contour farming will not do a satisfactory job alone since the land's greatest need is a good vegetative program, which will include such practices as winter and summer cover crops, crop residue management and strip cropping on the sandy soils.

Landowners doing terrace construction on their croplands are: J. C. Day, B. D. Craighead, W. D. Brown, J. D. Griffin, Sr., J. D. Griffin, Jr., Charles Stephenson, C. H. McBee, Leonard Murphy, and E. R. Wood of the Carbon and Pumpkin Center area; J. B. Fader of the Cisco area and Casey McKezell and B. W. Robertson of Eastland. D. A. Fawcett of Ranger and Kenneth Brown of Cheley have constructed terraces on their farms.

Forty-eight farm ponds have been completed thus far this year with several now in process of construction. A well located pond enables better control of livestock grazing. These ponds are situated pretty well over the entire unit area and county.

Peanut farmers are now in process of preparing their lands for this year's crop. Cover crop seeded last fall have given good

soil protection against erosion. The conservation cover crops in order to have this needed protection during normal "blow season."

The cover crop residue is left on or near the surface for continued soil protection. Strip crops are also an important part of the peanut farming operations. Strip crops are used in holding sands in place and preventing sand damage to the peanut plants. This space is prevented by the covering up of the soil and row next year.

Sudan grass, pearl millet, top cane and grain sorghum are most common cover crop strips. These crops are well fertilized and seeded less than two rows or four to eight rows of peanuts.

Spring brings a variety of hungry insects out of hiding. It's time to stock the garden shelf with ammunition to protect flowers, shrubs, grass and trees from damage.

There is no one miracle insecticide. You will need at least four different packages on the shelf. Include DDT, Chlordane, poison bait and malathion. Malathion spray or dust will kill aphids, lace bugs and red skider mites. Use a spray for white flies and young scale in the crawling stage.

A 10 percent chlordane dust

will kill cut worms leaf-eating caterpillars, sowbugs, termites, flea hoppers, grasshoppers, cedar bag worms and many kinds of beetles. It is our best control for red ants.

A 10 percent DDT dust will control thrips, blister beetles and other beetles, army worms and many other worms. It also kills some of the insects mentioned above such as lace bugs, pill bugs, sowbugs, and termites.

Use bait for slug and snails. It also kills sowbug and other insects. Finely ground bug bait is as effective as the large pellets and is not eaten by birds. To get best results from insecticides, read directions on the package carefully and follow them as given. Also, check for safety precautions in use. Some insecticides are very deadly.

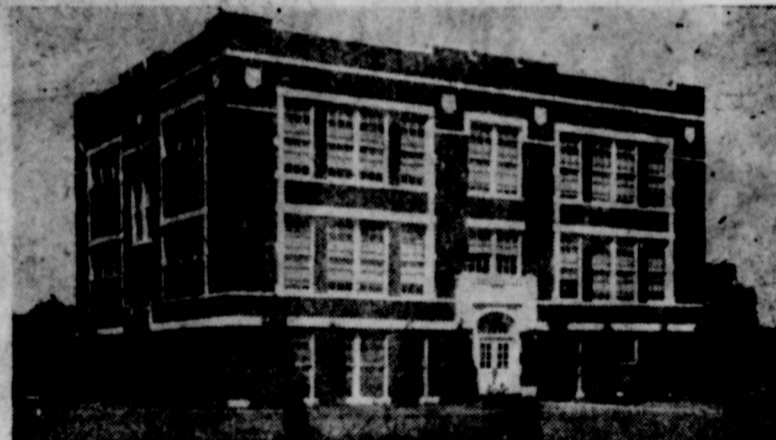
