Paul Poe Of Cisco Dies Suddenly

Paul Poe, 61, Cisco business man and landowner many years, died shortly after noon Monday of a heart attack. He was stricken in his car parked on a downtown street and pronounced dead by a physician summoned to the scene.

Mr. Poe, who had moved to Eastland County with his parents as an infant, had been in ill health and semi-retirement for several years. He was the son of the late "Uncle Cap" Poe, prominent early resident who settled near Carbon.

Refund Checks

Won't Have Your Complete Name

"Don't fret if that tax refund check comes from Uncle Sam doesn't show your full name," says Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue.

Due to mechanical limitations on the high speed electronic machines now printing tax refund checks, only the taxpayer's first initial of the given name, or names, is being used.

In rare instances, where a taxpayer's surname is unusually long, one or more letters at the end of the surname may even be dropped.

The IRS representative advises taxpayers to endorse their refund checks exactly as drawn. Then, if letters are omitted at the end of a surname, a second endorsement should be made showing the full surname.

Pecan Growers Of County Win Several Awards

A number of Eastland County pecan growers were winners in the State Pecan Show, according to a recent announcement by Taber Shelton, president of the State Pecan Growers Association.

A Ranger man, B. B. Freeman, won reserve grand champion honors with his Ranger Variety nuts. They averaged 48 nuts to the pound and had a kernel percentage of 54.1.

W. D. Thurman of Cisco won first place in the Squirrel's Delight division, with 49.9 nuts per pound and a 54.9 kernel percentage. He also placed third with his nuts in the Eastern Schley division, with 54.8 nuts per pound and 59.2 kernel percentage. Roy Taylor, also of Cisco, won second place in the John Garner variety, his pecans averaging 53.8 nuts per pound and having a 61.3 kernel percentage.

Commissioner I. G. Mobley of the Putnam precinct of Callahan County is scheduled to appear on the program, which will deal with the various problems that face the officials.

Approximately 300 exhibitors will try for the \$1,400 in prize money to be awarded to winners in the annual Eastland County Livestock Show to be held March 20-21 at the new show grounds on the banks of Eastland Lake it was announced Friday.

N. B. Eaves will serve as general superintendent of the show this year, with Johnny Aaron as his assistant. Other superintendents will include Clinton Pierce, swine; Walter Kurklin, sheep and goats; Ernest Reich and Marshall Berry, dairy cattle; R. L. Stuard, fat steers; and Ed Harrison, beef cattle.

The city of Eastland donated the land for the new show grounds, approximately 25 acres, to the Eastland County Livestock Association and the Sheriff's Posse. A large metal building, donated by Bill Hoffman of Eastland, has already been moved to the site and another building is now being constructed.

Ben McKinnis, agricultural representative of Texas Electric Service Co. and secretary of the Livestock Association, stated that the Eastland County show, a yearly event for area livestock raisers, is one of the best county shows in this part of the state.

Sale Of Vehicle Tags In County Well Underway

No, that's not a highway patrolman following you. It's just someone who had the foresight to buy his 1959 license plates early.

Due to the early buying by a number of Eastland County residents, the new white vehicle tags are appearing like a rash all around Cisco and other county towns.

Although the deadline for purchasing license plates is April 1, County Tax Assessor-Collector J. C. Allison said Monday that sales of the new tags has been brisk since they went on sale Feb. 1.

They are now being sold in Mr. Allison's office in the courthouse, and at substations in Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star.

Cisco headquarters are in the Chamber of Commerce building, while tags may be purchased at May Insurance Agency in Ranger; at E. E. Todd's store in Gorman; and at Jenkin's Insurance Agency in Rising Star.

The cost of registration remains the same this year as last; as little as \$4.93 or as much as \$30.25, depending on the weight of your car.

Some 13,000 vehicles are expected to be registered in the county, with no noticeable rise over last year Mr. Allison predicted.

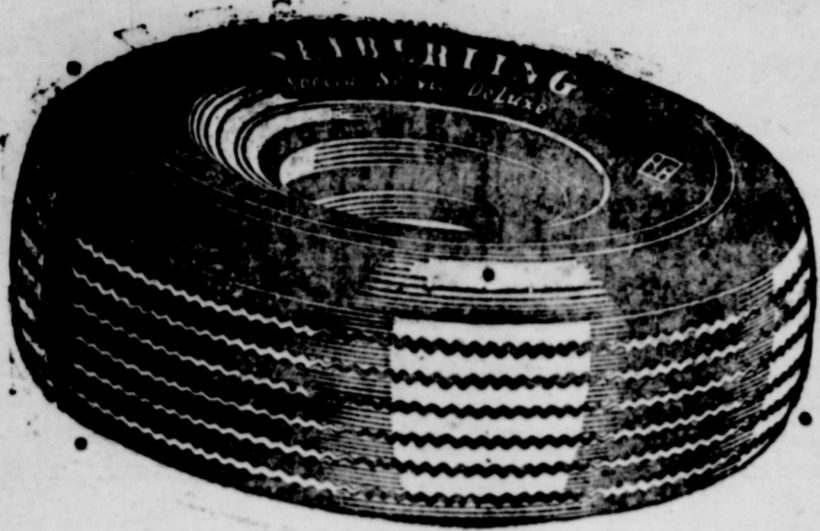

Grain Prices In Coming Year Are Due To Be Lower

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 26. — Feed grain prices in the 1958-59 marketing year are expected to average a little below the 1957-58 level, principally as a result of large supplies, predicts John McHaney, extension economist.

High yields have helped to boost feed grain production and stocks, McHaney points out. Near record yields in 1956 were followed by record yields in 1957 and 1958 and total utilization this year is expected to be 16 million tons below total production plus imports. This is expected to bring carryover stocks up to a record of about 75 million tons, a 27 percent increase, at the beginning of the 1959-1960 marketing year.

However, he adds, better quality of the 1958 corn and grain sorghum crops will make a larger percentage of these grains eligible for price support. Coupled with the 6 percent increase in the number of grain-consuming livestock to be fed, this will help to give some strength to feed grain prices.

The seasonal rise in the price of corn the first six months of 1959 probably will be much less than the 28 percent rise from January to June of 1958 because of record supplies on hand.

Grain sorghum prices in 1958-59 should average near those of last

year, but will probably be a little lower. The higher quality of the 1958 crop appears to be the main factor which is holding the price above those of a year earlier, despite the larger 1958 crop and the record supply.

Supplies of oats and barley are at record levels and, as a result, prices in 1958-59 will probably average a little lower.

Outlook for feed grains the next few years is dominated by the large stocks that will be on hand for 1959-1960 and the years to follow, McHaney said. Whether these stocks turn out to be an increasing problem of disposal or a desired reserve, they are now the most significant factor in the outlook for feed and livestock for the next few years.
