Projects to Help Local Aged Called For By Committee

Getting down to business and beginning some projects to help the older people in Eastland County was the rallying at an inspirational meeting of the County Committee on Aging held Tuesday afternoon at the Farm Bureau Building in Eastland.

"Let's not just keep meeting. Let's start some projects — a telephone-checking service, plan a fall fair for the display and sale of hand-crafts or something concrete for the older people here" one member said.

With a representative turnout of about 35 people, the members and guests heard speakers who are professionals with working with the aged.

Chairman Hiram McCannies of Cisco presided and talked on Ruby Springer of Ranger to report on the recent workshop at Brownwood. "It's a privilege for us to be working on this kind of projects," she said.

Mrs. Arlin Bint, in charge of the Project FIND survey in this county, called on workers to help get the survey completed and stressed the need for the survey.

Dorothy Griffin of Brownwood, survey chairman for this four-county region for the governor's committee on aging, explained that the purpose of the survey is to find the skills and resources available to help the older folk.

"There are any number of programs for the young people," she said, "But as far as I know this is the only one for older people." Her 4-county area is one of four in a 16-county region where 23.3 per cent of the population is over 65 years, she said, and it is for this reason that the governor's committee is conducting the survey, to find out the needs of the older people in this highest area in the state.

Defining "FIND", she said the survey is looking for two groups. In one are the Friendless, Isolated, Needy and Disabled. In the other group are those older people with time to help those who need help. "It's a home mission project," she said, and strongly urged working through the churches, and called for all-out concern on the part of all to help these senior citizens.

Home Demonstration Agent Janet Thomas introduced Principal Speaker Dorothy Mood of Austin, consultant on aging for the Department of Public Welfare, she came to this county Sunday and did a great deal of research in preparation for his talk with the aging committee.

Taking a sample 100 cases of the some 1,200 welfare cases in Eastland County, the Austin woman, projected an outline of the aged in this county. Her figures indicate good place to live, and that the older people are quite remarkable here.

In her sample 100 she found: 73 women; 27 men; 82 living in town; 18 in rural. Living by themselves were 14 men, 60 women, 12 were in nursing homes and 14 with relatives. (There are some 190 in nursing homes in the county, she said).

Ages ranged like this: of the 65 to 69, 3 were men, 7 women; 70-74: 10 men and 17 women; 75-79: 2 men and 16 women; 80-84: 7 and 21; 85-89: 5 and 8; and 89 to 94: 1 and 3. There are nine men and 15 women in the sample 100.

"Eastland County is rich in resources and knowledge," she said, "but your agencies can't do the job that needs to be done. It can only be done by interested individuals such as are assembled here today."

Recommended as first project is the completion of the survey information. Mrs. Springer reported that she will complete her survey in Ranger and Martha Graves accepted the job for Cisco. An Eastland survey chairman is to be named.

Mr. McCannies will call the next meeting.

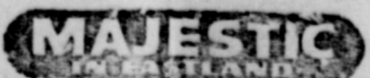

Jim Everetts Awarded Medals for Late Son

Mr. and Mrs. James C. Everett of Olden, parents of Everett White Everett killed in action in Viet Nam July 23, received three awards posthumously for their son.

Cmdr. J. A. Frost, commanding officer of the Abilene Naval Reserve Reserve Training Center, presented the awards to the parents in ceremonies held at the center Wednesday night. Naval officers and the family of the deceased were present.

Awards presented the Everetts were the Purple Heart, the National Defense Medal, and the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Ribbon Bar.

Young Everett was born October 28, 1945 at Gorman and was reared in Olden. He

was a 1963 graduate of Olden High School and attended East Texas State at Commerce before joining the Navy in 1966. He sustained fatal gunshot wounds from enemy rifle fire while on Operation Mameluke Thrust, near Quang Nam South Viet Nam. The body was returned to Eastland County by Navy personnel August 2 and funeral services were held August 4. Graveside rites were conducted at Eastland Cemetery.

Besides his parents, he is also survived by a brother, Jimmy, student at the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston; his grandmother, Mrs. Myrtle Everett of Olden; and grandparents, Mr. Wade White of Carbon.

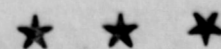

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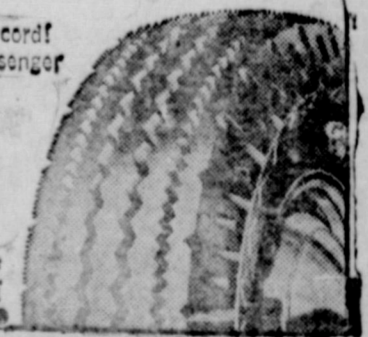

Drawing Planned For Bonus Deer And Quail Hunts

AUSTIN— Anyone wishing to participate in deer and quail hunts on the wildlife management area operated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department should submit their requests for applications, according to Robert G. Mauermann, deputy director of the Department.

Hunters may participate in both the quail and deer drawings but are urged to submit only one application for each since duplicates will be eliminated by computer.

The Department will issue 3,560 hunting permits for deer on eight wildlife management areas Statewide and 880 quail hunting permits on two wildlife management areas in the Texas Panhandle.

Since the number of applicants always exceeds the number of hunting permits available, those permitted to hunt will be chosen by public drawing to be held in Austin Oct. 31. To be eligible for the drawing, applications must be received in the Austin office on or before 5 p. m. Oct. 25. Applications received later than the deadline will not be considered for the drawing.

Mauermann stressed that these hunts are conducted primarily as a part of the Department's wildlife research

programs and not to provide public hunting. He also said that these hunts are not indicated of high game population and that the Department could cancel the hunts at any time the recommended quotas are met in order to prevent the reduction of game below desired levels.

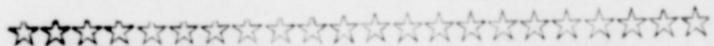

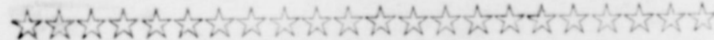
