County Retires \$17,000 In Bonds On Court House

Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved the purchase of \$17,000 worth of court-house bonds which would have matured in 1960, reducing the debt on the court house to \$15,000, it was reported here.

Another payment will not be due until March 16, 1960, and a check revealed that \$5,000 is still left in the court house bond interest and sinking funds.

It was estimated recently that the court house, which was built in 1928 at a cost of \$314,000, would now cost \$1,250,000 if it were replaced.

Upper Leon Soil District Slates Supervisor Vote

The election of a supervisor of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District will be held in Eastland Friday, October 7, at 7:30 p. m. in the Texas Electric Service Co. Conference room, according to an announcement by A. C. Spencer, executive director.

All persons who own a farm or ranch in this district are eligible to vote on the supervisor. The present supervisor, F. M. Spurlon, is running for re-election.

The Upper Leon Soil Conservation District was organized Dec. 14, 1940, and it now has 338,790 acres controlled by 5,300 operators. The Eastland area is Zone 5.

Six orchards will be visited on the third annual tour of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, Sept. 29, Oscar Schaefer, Cook, president of the group, announced today.

The J. W. Sitton orchard at Seranton, the R. H. Dunning and Lee Lieske orchards at Nimrod and the J. D. Inabnet orchard at Pioneer will be inspected that morning prior to lunch at Sadies Cafe in Rising Star.

The group will assemble and leave from the Petsick Fruit Stand on Highway 80 just west of Cisco at 9 o'clock on the above date, according to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper who assisted the committee in planning the tour.

A short program and business session will follow the lunch at Rising Star, Schaefer said. Randolph Terrell, Gold Kist Pecan Cooperative, Seguin, Texas, will be on the program and possibly others. Several committees are to be appointed during this business session to work on plans for the annual pecan show to be held in December.

The J. F. Petsick orchard near Rising Star and the Earl Conner orchards near Flat Woods will be visited during the afternoon session of the tour.

The tour planning committee was composed of Hank Sims and Guy Parker, Eastland, and W. D. Thurman, Cisco.

As a general rule the planted orchards on the deep sandy soils over the county have a fair to a good crop of nuts, growers have told Schaefer in recent weeks. A light crop of seedlings on the Leon River has been indicated.

Lapsed GI Insurance Can't Be Renewed

GI insurance for veterans who allowed their term policies to lapse after World War II, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, Texas said today.

Mr. Onstot said the statement was prompted by many inquiries from World War II veterans seeking to get back their long-lapsed National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) term policies.

News of a Congressional bill containing an amendment which would have provided for a general re-opening of NSLI to World War II veterans was widely circulated in mid-August, he added.

But, he emphasized, the bill was later changed to eliminate the NSLI re-opening provision.

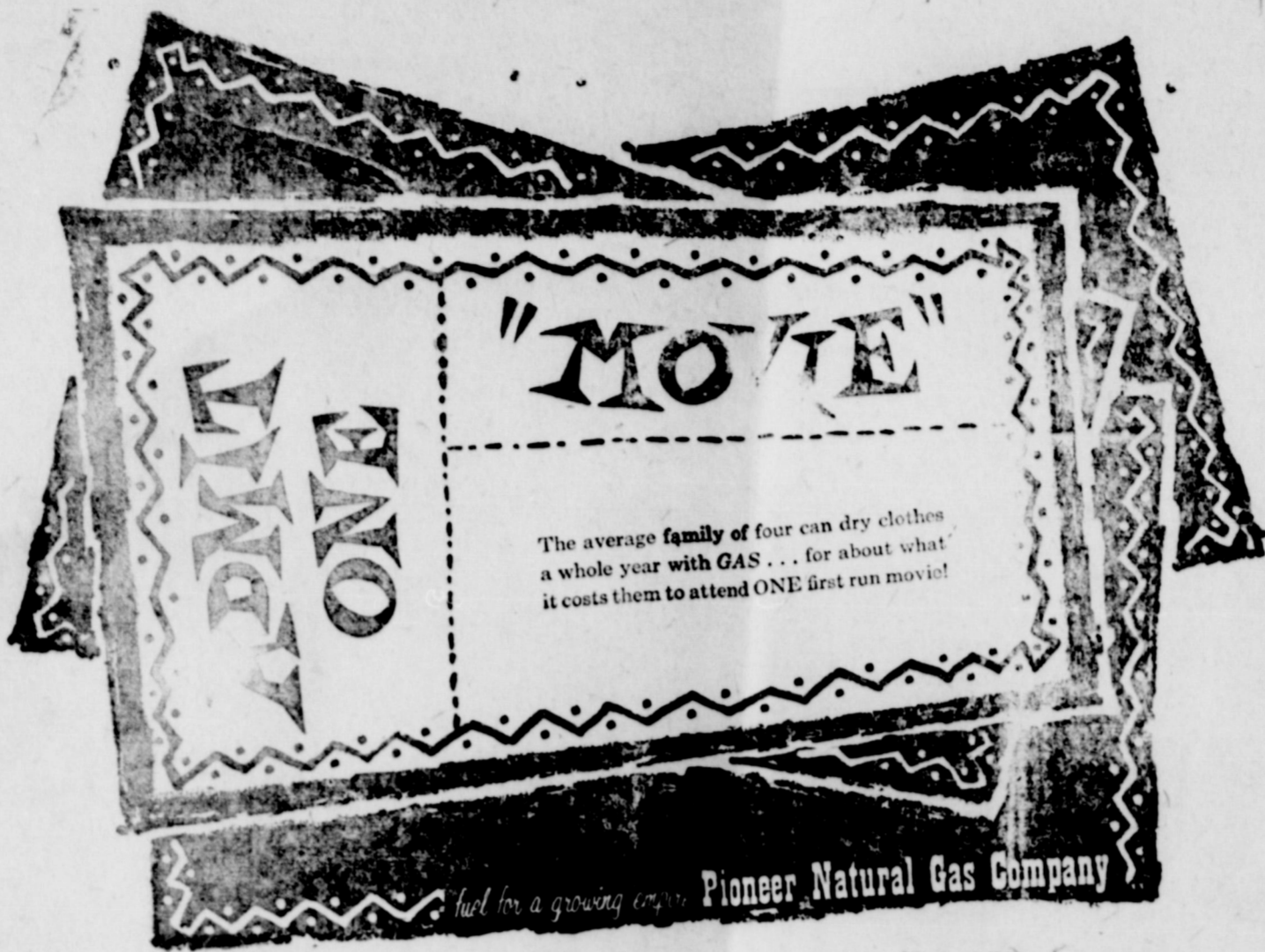

Fort Worth Show To Award Prizes Totalling \$193,481

FORT WORTH (Sp1) — The largest amount of prize money in the 63-year history of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show will be offered at the 1959 show, Jan. 30 through Feb. 8.

W. R. Watt, president-manager, has announced that \$193,481 in awards will be given to winning exhibitors in the various fat stock and horse divisions and to top cowboys in the exhibition rodeo. Prize money for rodeo winners, including entry fees, will exceed \$65,000. The horse show will award \$30,480 in premiums.

Cash awards for the fat stock sections of the open show are: steers, \$4,180; dairy cattle, \$7,635; sheep, \$8,930; swine, \$9,383, and

bull carlot-and-pen division, \$6,330.

Poultry, pigeons, turkeys and rabbits will be competing for \$2,286 in prizes.

The seven breeds of beef breeding cattle are allotted a large share of the premium total.

Awards for the breeds are: Herefords, \$13,800; Polled Herefords \$5,000; Shorthorns, \$4,532; Aberdeen-Angus, \$10,000; Brahm, \$2,000; Santa Gertrudis, \$800; Brangus, \$2,000 and Red Angus \$500.

For the first time at the Fort Worth show, Red Angus cattle and Landrace swine have been added to the 1959 judging schedule.

Premiums in the junior show total \$13,175, which includes \$4,731 for steers; \$2,930 for beef heifers; \$2,000 for dairy calves; \$1,128, lambs, and \$2,386, barrows.

Cash prizes in the judging contests total \$1,500 and about \$500 in herdsmen awards will be given.

In many of the divisions, awards have been increased to encourage an interest in producing finer stock, Mr. Watt said.

Deadline for cattle, sheep and swine entries is Dec. 15. Horses may be entered until Jan. 1, and poultry, pigeons, turkeys and rabbits until Jan 10.

The 1959 premium list will be mailed out later this year to thousands of exhibitors throughout the nation. Anyone wishing more information on awards and entry requirements for stock may write the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at P. O. Box 150, Fort Worth.

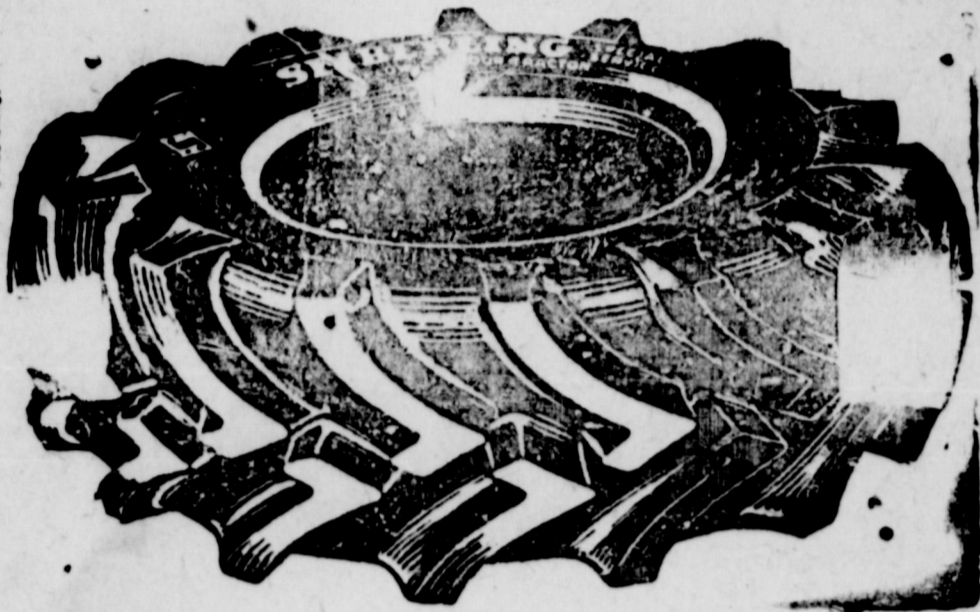

Franchise Asked For TV Circuit Setup In Eastland

The Eastland City Commission was recently asked to grant a franchise for a community television system to the Community Television Co. of Abilene, it was reported here. Cisco has already granted a franchise to the company.

The system would enable viewers to receive good reception from five channels including three major networks although the construction of a 400 feet high antennae would be necessary, the commission was told. Aerial surveys have been made, the company stated, and there are indications of good reception from five channels.

The company anticipates a \$10 tie-in charge for homes with a monthly charge of \$6, it was said.

Humble Tanks To Become Storage Depot For Grain

The Humble Pipe Line Company's three huge oil storage tanks at Putnam, surplus since the new 16-inch mail line was completed a few months ago, will soon become a grain storage warehouse, according to information here today.

The tanks have been leased by the Clark Grain and Storage Company of Corpus Christi. Gene Nash, an employee of the Clark company, has been here for several weeks supervising the job of cleaning out the tanks and installing air-venting equipment.

Mr. Nash said the tanks would be used initially to store milo maize. The three tanks — two 55,000 and one 57,000 — will hold more than 1,000,000 bushels of milo, he said. The firm is expected to have two or three permanent employees. Several men have been used in their work crew to prepare the tanks for use.
