Youthful, Too If you're in the half of the U.S. population that's under 30, you may think social security is something remote and unimportant to you right now. Not so, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager for the Abi-lene district.

"In this generally healthy and youthful group, nearly 2-1/2 million people receive benefits because they are disabled or are dependent upon disabled workers. Over 3 million widowed mothers and young children get monthly social security checks as survivors of workers," Tuley stated. "Half a million students age 18 to 22 and a quarter of a million people who became disabled in childhood get monthly benefits as the children of retired, deceased, or disabled workers," he went on. "Disabled children get social security benefits as long as they are not

Excellent Dove-Hunting In Leon-Bosque Conservation Area

Excellent dove hunting can be found in the Loon-Bosque Resource Conservation and Development Project. Of the five counties within the area, Bosque and Earth have yielded the most birds to hunters. Demand for the sport is high in surrounding areas and local landowners have good opportunities for leasing hunting rights.

Before landowners can "cash in" on this resource however, certain problems need to be resolved. The tradition of free hunting has caused some problems. Many landowners have had unfortunate experiences with the public and are now reluctant to al-low hunting on their lands for free or fee. Some farmers

Another problem is related to the size of land-holdings and use of the land. Small units cannot always provide good wildlife habitat in sufficient quantity to attract large populations of game animals. Even though this problem is not nearly as significant for doves as for some other game such as deer, quail and turkey, it is still important. Opportunities exist for farmers and ranchers to pool their lands and form hunting organizations. Neighbors can cooperate to improve wildlife habitat over a larger area, thereby increasing game and improving hunting.

Need for many light even

about. By areas into wildlife food plots the game can be and concentrated in certain areas. This will improve hunter success. Sunflower patches and grain fields at-tract the birds. Barren areas can be disked or otherwise mechanically disturbed to en courage croton, ragweed and other seed-producing forbs. These "weeds" provide good quail and dove food. Food and cover developments near waterholes are expecially good since doves need water daily.

Proper use of grazing lands should leave adequate vegetation to provide good wild-life food and cover. Overgrazing reduces food supplies and nesting cover so most birds move on to areas of better pickings.

Advertising for hunters is essential. The availabliity of hunting needs to be publicized. This can be done indivi dually or through organized tions, but the potential hunt-er must be informed of the opportunities awaiting him-



Rising Star has experienced three major floods beginning with one in 1908, when head waters of Copperas Creek, which fises in the (north and south) out of their bounds, after unusually heavy rainfall.

Fields were washed out, pas-

tures were to boggy to enter and melon crops were destroyed. Peanut farmers almost despaired, for the land they had planted in peanuts was covered with deep, deep mud. Highways were flooded and telephone lines were out. Wa-

ter was every where.

More than three and one half inches of rain fell one morning in May 1957 dumpig two and three feet of water in a number of stores. Streets resembled rivers.

The south branch of Cop-peras Creek surged out of its small channel flooding stores from the Elite Cafe to Higgin-botham Motor Company on South Main Street and swept through buildings on the opposite side of the street as far

as the palace Drug Store, Rutherford and Steel building Material Compeny was among the hardest hit with an estimate of \$1,500 damage on millwork, building supplies etc. Avelons Beauty Shop and Star Electric, Joyce Insurance Agency, Roach Motor Company, the Post Office, Hisginbotham Motor Company and West Texas Utilities suffer-West Texas Utilities suffered considerable damage.

Planks were placed aganist back doors and earth piled up and packed down creating dikes that kept more water

from flowing in.
Stocks were moved to higher levels. Post office employees sacked mail and piled it onto higher fixtures cut of the reach of water.

Along the north fo s of the Copperas Creek which flows north Jones Brothers Feed and Seed Store, Watkins Food Market Hardins Cleaners, Cafes and other saved themselves extensive damage by piling bags of salt at their doors and by erecting dikes and moving stocks to higher locations.

Some residential sections were flooded. The City Park

was a sheet of water. Areas in the south part of town on Hiway 183 were isolated for a time. Members of the State Highway Department were on

People of the comunity cleaned up damage stock, and debris for weeks after the waters subsided and were thankful that no lives were lost and that a reported tornado failed to sweep through the flooded area.

On Saturday following the flood on Thursday, Yellow Branch, four miles north of town ragged to a height not reached in 25 years or more.

Highway 183 was inundated, bridges were washed out and traffic was halted for hours. Homes of Bob and Cecil Shults were isolated, with much damage done to crops,

pastures and livestock.

Mayor J. Walter Smith reported that the guage registered 24 inches of rainfall since January 1, 1957. More than ten inches of this rain fell in
