F. F. A. News

Closed Waterway Be Important Conservation Unit

A vegetated waterway can be the most important single conservation practice on the farm.

Too many farmers applying sound conservation measures are becoming discouraged when these measures fail to produce expected benefits. Many times a full recognition and recognition of the need for a vegetated waterway in connection with other conservation practices will solve their problem.

A terrace system in this area is generally no better than its outlets. Terraces emptying in road ditches or other gullies won't last because they soon become fully makers instead of gully healers. Terraces whose outlets are allowed to silt up or otherwise get blocked usually break and if not constantly repaired will cause deep erosion at each break.

In some fields it is necessary to sod a vegetated terrace or waterway before the outlet can be safely terraced. Use of the outlet or waterway should be made as a natural outlet or a natural heavy sod.

Waterways should be sodded, if possible, and sods should be added to the outlet. Sod, grass, and Bermuda grass are commonly used in the Rising Star area. The U. S. Civil Service Conservation Service will cost share payment for application of this practice. Upper Leon SCD has grass drills and bermuda sodders that can be rented for a small acreage charge.
